Thiside Today Today Thaka offers exclusive EPZ for Japanese investors

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia vesterday offered to establish a special export processing zone near Chittagong exclusively for Japan besides the Japanese investment in and outside the EPZ, reports UNB.

She also offered various other facilities to Japanese investors in the country.

"We have opened up all our facilities to foreign investment ... the single most important factor is that we are prepared to listen to investors in improving our services to them." she told a high-power Japanese investment delegation which arrived in Dhaka yesterday afternoon.

The Prime Minister extended the offers to the 40member delegation, known as Keidanren mission, when it called on her at the International Conference Centre.

The four-day investment climate study trip of the delegation, led by Kazuo Haruna, Chairman of the Marubeni Corporation, is the follow-up to the invitation extended by the Prime Minister to the Japanese investors during her visit to Japan last March.

Keidanren, the Japanese Federation of Economic Organisations, is a private non-profit organisation representing all branches of economic activities in Japan. The delegation also includes representatives of major Japanese undertak-

Begum Zia, in her introductory remarks, said Bangladesh has switched over to the free market economy to attract investment. Successful macro reforms have been put in place for liberalising the economy and encouraging the private rapidly, she added.

"These have already resulted in acceleration of private investment in the country," she said and pointed out that the Japanese private sector investments in manufacturing and other sectors had started deriving the desired

"We have perhaps the cheapest trainable labour in the region. Moreover, we have the generalised system of preference (GSP) and generalised system of trade preference (GSTP) facilities as a least developed country, which make investment more viable and attractive," Begum Zia said and called upon them to avail of the facilities and incentives.

"We are also equally interested in high-tech industries," she said and sought Japanese investment in energy. telecommunications, power generation, textiles and oil and gas exploration-the public sectors being planned to be privatised.

Budget '94-95: Figure of Speech

The Finance Minister was very clear about it : Petrol will cost no more than what it does now. With this announcement his budget proposal for 1994-95 went through the first change. And, this change was made even before the Minister had completed making his budget speech!

In the first part of his two part budget speech the Minister for Finance announced reduction in the prices of kerosene, diesel and furnace oil. He then went on to say that the loss in revenue to the government will be made up in part by 'raising the price of petrol to taka 15 per litre" compared to the current price of taka 13.70.

After this there was a short recess. The recess over, the Minister resumed his speech. Rightaway he departed from the written text that had been circulated to say that the price

of petrol will not be increased. Obviously, the second announcement was not to correct a printing error. Nor is it a minor adjustment of the various numbers that lie behind the Finance Minister's budget proposal.

While the Finance Minister was clear about what the price of petrol is growing to be, his statements about current investment level is not as clear. Two figures for investment - GDP ratio have been mentioned in the Finance Minister's budget speech. In paragraph 15 of the written text the ratio is stated as 14 per cent while in paragraph 39 it is 14.5 per cent. This is not a minor discrepancy. The half per cent difference means investment of around Tk 500 crore which is not insignificant for Bangladesh. 
