Morrison to miss rest of tour

BRISTOL. England. June 13: Injury-riddled fast bowler Danny Morrison will miss the rest of New Zealand's tour of England, the team announced Monday, reports AP.

Morrison aggravated a serious hamstring injury during a three-day match against Gloucestershire on Sunday.

"We've had to accept the inevitable," tour manager Mike Sandlant said. "It's a big blow but it's clear Danny is not going to recover in time."

Morrison, the Kiwi's premier paceman, arrived in England in April with a groin strain, then tore his left hamstring during the opening oneday international at Edgbaston more than three weeks ago.

Morrison missed the first Test at Trent Bridge, but made his long-awaited comeback Saturday against Bristol, bowl ing 17 overs without difficulty.

On Sunday, however, Morrison left the field for more treatment after a six-over spe-Il, and stayed in the pavilion Monday morning.

"Because of Danny's importance to the squad as our se nior bowler he was given every chance to recover," Sandlant said. "But it became obvious that his hamstring injury was far worse than we first thought."

The team did not say if Morrison will return home immediately or see out the rest of the tour as a spectator. A replacement is expected to be named later this week.

MISSION VIEJO. Calif. June 13: His knees carry the crescent-shaped scars of nearly two decades of

professional soccer, indoors and outdoors.

Yet US defender Fernando Clavijo still looks boyish, although he has two boys of his own, reports AP.

In 58 international appearances. Clavijo hasn't had a single goal. Much of his soccer experience is with the nowdefunct Major Indoor Soccer League. Yet some younger players have become friends and he's become a coach's favou-

He says the last game of the World Cup also will be his last as a player.

"It's not because I feel inferior physically," he said. "But at one point, you know when it's time to let it go. Playing for the US in the World Cup, you can't ask for anything better than that.

"It's time to go to the next step, which is coaching."

He said the secret to staying in the game so long is a matter of how much a player wants to be in the game. It's a matter of learning new tricks and keeping at something one truly enjoys.

"Coaches and fans don't have to second guess that I'll pull my leg away from a play because I'm thinking of my future," he said. "I know this is the last of my playing days. Out of Fernando, they'll get 100

BRISTOL, England, June 13: Martin Crowe hit 73 off only 53 deliveries as New Zealand notched up 295 before declaring their first innings for five on the second day of their three-day match against Gloucestershire on Sunday, reports Reuter.

The former New Zealand captain looked to be on course for the season's fastest century until he was caught behind when he fenced at a lifter from

medium-pacer Mark Alleyne. Crowe had seemed to be set to beat the 71-ball century hit in Wales last week by current New Zealand captain Ken Rutherford.

By the time Alleyne ended his fun, Crowe had scored all but 16 of an 89-run partnership with Blair Pocock.

Determined opener Pocock, who earlier helped the in-form Bryan Young (87) to add 164 for the third wicket, went on to complete an unbeaten, fourhour 103 before New Zealand

declared at nine runs ahead. Pace bowler Chris Pringle, now fully recovered from back trouble, removed Glouscestershire's Tim Hancock and Rob Cunliffe, leaving the home side 81 runs ahead on 90 for three at the close.

"They shoot hard. From time to time I was suffering from a little anxiety," said defender Rune Bratseth after his stint in the goal.

"Bratseth will have nightmares tonight," joked reserve goalkeeper Frode Grodas; who took it easy during Sunday's practice after receiving a shot of cortisone, a drug used to treat inflammations. Bratseth, of Germany's Werder Bremen, limited his running due to a sore thigh.




