## A Philosophical Bend

If you invite someone to a philosophical discussion, there is every possibility that he will not appear. Because most of the people are afraid of the intricate journey into the maze of thoughts and the shades of language. Yet, in Dhaka, some 35 young people gather every Thursday afternoon at Rina Dale on 22/2 Free School Street just to enlighten themselves with philosophical discourses.

Dr Liakat Ali, a man with thin hair and black beard conducts this philosophical class. Sitting on a carpet in a rectangular room, the participants talk, laugh and make illuminating arguments in an extremely relaxed atmosphere.

Dr Liakat Ali also gave an outline of his fu-

Dr Ali, now a principal research officer at BIRDEM, also has an active interest in literature, art and social sciences. He had started the circle with a small group at the end of 1990. And it was a long and hard journey over the past few years. Most of the members of the first batch dropped, except only seven dedicated boys, who are now in their final year of studies in different disciplines of Dhaka University.

Starting from Thales and other pre-Socratic philosophers, the sessions have been conducted through Plato, Aristotle, Euclid, Al-Sandrian civilization, ancient India, ancient China, and Muslim philosophers like Al-Kindi, Al-Farabi, Ibn Sina, and Ibn Rashed. Finally the quest concentrates on the twentieth century ideas Marx, Lenin, Russel etc.

### Nat'l plantation drive

#### Biswas plants Nageshwar sapling

#### 136 textile units registered in five months

A total of 136 industrial units in various sub-sectors of the textile industries were registered during the last five months of the current year with an investment of Tk 109.22 crore, reports UNB.

Some 23,491 people have also got employment opportunities following the new registration.

This was informed at the 32nd parliamentary standing committee meeting of the Ministry of Textiles at Jatiya Sangsad yesterday. State Minister for Textiles Abdul Manan presided.

The meeting reviewed various development activities of BTMC and the Department of Textiles, including import of cotton from abroad, official sources said.

It also underlined the need for import of quality cotton to feed the BTMC mills. The State Minister directed the authorities concerned to take steps to reduce loss of the mills.

### Missing JU student found dead, buried

The body of the missing student of the Jahangirnagar University which was recovered from Amtali Char of Sonatali thana under Bogra district Monday was buried in Savar yesterday.

The body was brought to the campus from the Fulchhari thana under Bogra district at about 1:00 am Tuesday.

Later on, the body was taken to the Savar Radio Colony residence of the deceased where he was buried at about 7 am yesterday.

Golam Mohammad Sarwar, a student of the Geography Department had been missing from June 7 following a clash between some JU students and the transport workers at Fulchhari ferry ghat.

Sarwar was returning from Dinajpur along with his classmates and three teachers after a study tour. At least 18 students were injured in the incident.

The fellow students upon their return to the campus alleged that Sarwar was abducted and killed by the transport workers.

According to police source, Sarwar's body was found near Amtali Char June 10.

### BCSIR advisory council meet held

A meeting of the advisory council of Bangladesh Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (BCSIR) held at BCSIR conference room in the city yesterday suggested considering research projects in the light of open market economy, reports BSS.

Presiding over the meeting, State Minister for Science and Technology Prof M A Mannan said it is the time to think anew for rebuilding the research programmes of BCSIR in the light of open market economy and create a congenial atmosphere where the young scientists can plan their future carrier.

The meeting was informed that due to stoppage of higher studies programme (PhD) of BCSIR scientists after independence, a vacuum had already been created in competent manpower for planning and guiding research activities.

The meeting felt the need for creating a special fund for higher studies abroad of the BCSIR scientists.

The meeting reviewed the past activities of BCSIR and made some recommendations for further improvement in future.

The meeting was attended by the president of the Federation of Bangladesh Chamber of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI) Mahbubur Rahman, Prof Iqbal Mahmud of Engineering University, Prof S N Nabi of Dhaka University, Secretary of the Science Ministry Anwarul Islam, Chairman of BCSIR Dr M Waliuzzaman and Chairman of Bangladesh Atomic Energy Commission (BAEC) M A Quyum.

This was the second meeting of the advisory council formed in 1978. The first meeting was held in 1987, but no document or proceedings of the meeting was available with the authority. The advisory council is supposed to meet at least once in a year.

Dr Waliuzzaman informed the meeting that so far 31 projects based on their research outcome, including the project for production of paper pulp from jute had been leased out to the entrepreneurs and most of them went into industrial production. He said another 24 projects were ready for leasing.


