Bebeto's wish

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 20: Brazilian striker Bebeto said he wants to dedicate the World Cup to his 150 million countrymen who confront poverty and suffering, the *Jornal do Brasil* reported Sunday, reports AP.

"My wife has already alerted me to not come home without bringing the world championship trophy with me," Bebeto was quoted as saying.

Bebeto was relieved that his wife, Denise, was unharmed when her car was stolen earlier this week in Rio. Denise is eight months pregnant with the couple's third child.

Bebeto, who alongside Romario forms Brazil's scoring line, was a world champion in the junior division in 1983.

"Romario and I both like to score goals and working together should increase our normal output," Bebeto said.

MACAO, June 20: A coffee shop owner died of a heart attack apparently caused by fatigue after he stayed up for two straight nights to watch live World Cup soccer matches on television, press reports said Monday, reports AP.

The reports quoted the wife of 37-year-old Lo Chon-yin as saying her husband collapsed Sunday while serving customers in his shop.

She said that besides staying up for two nights to watch World Cup matches, he also had worked all day.

Because of the time difference between the United States and Macao, World Cup matches are televised live between 11:30 pm (1530 GMT) and 7:30 am (2330 GMT) in this Portuguese colony at the tip of south China.

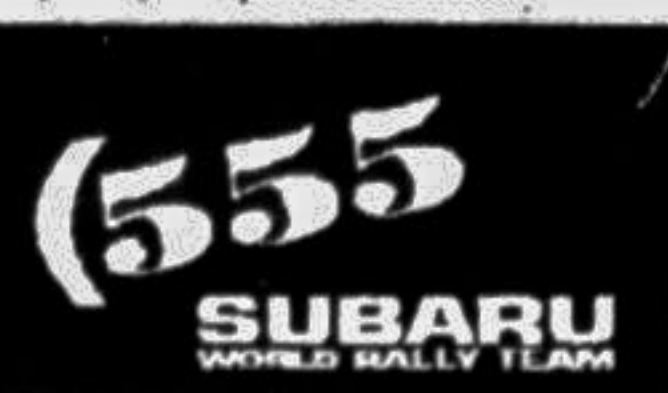
In the first match of the day, Faridpur blanked Rajshahi Education Board 2-0 in an one-sided affair.

Sacchi's back against wall



MARTINSVILLE, New Jersey, June 20: Italian coach Arrigo Sacchi on Sunday was puzzled how to rescue

the triple champions following their disastrous World Cup debut, reports Reuters.

Baggio, who was ineffective in Saturday's shock 1-0 defeat against Ireland, is struggling with an injury to his right Achilles tendon.

Team doctor Andrea Ferretti said the inflammation had been made worse by the hard pitch at the Giants Stadium, adding that Baggio was expected to play against Norway on Thursday even though he would not be 100 per cent.

That game with Norway becomes vital following the defeat by Ireland in a group which also includes Mexico.

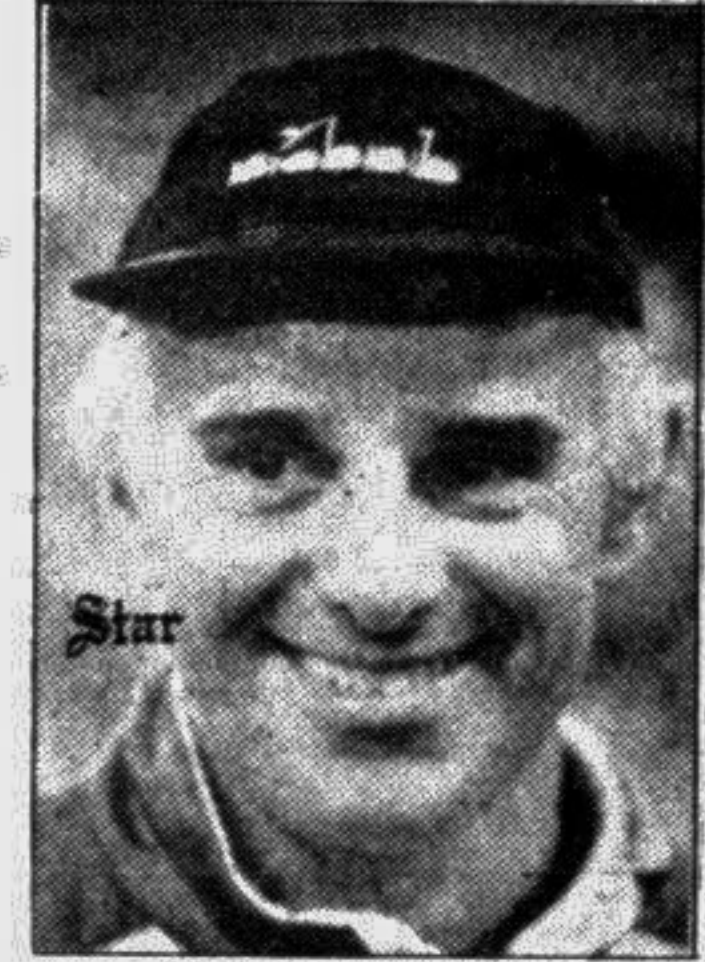
"I'm not here to talk about individuals, my task is to save the national team," said Sacchi, dubbed "Arrigo the impossible" by an exasperated Italian press.

"I have to raise the morale... we don't want excuses, we have to make sure we don't go out of the World Cup," he added.

The Italian media have placed the blame for the defeat squarely at Sacchi's door blasting him for his frequent

changes of team and tactics. "Sacchi, what a disaster," ran the headline in the *Gazzetta Sportiva* newspaper on Sunday.

The Italians can boast some of the most gifted individual players in the world but appear caught in a tactical more of the

coach's own creation.

Sacchi experimented with a 4-3-3 line-up for the month before the tournament then reverted to his trusted 4-4-2 for the Ireland game.

The plan left Roberto Baggio and fellow lightweight Giuseppe Signori to battle to out alone up front against the

tough Irish defence.

The coach pulled Signori back into midfield for the second half with substitute Daniele Massaro partnering Baggio but Italy could not recover from Ray Houghton's early strike.

"It was a mediocre game. They took the only chance and had clearer ideas and were more incisive," Sacchi said.

Was soccer really as complicated as Sacchi made out ventured one Italian reporter.

"For me it is a very complicated game. Some days it is easier than others but yesterday in was very tough," replied Sacchi, a former travelling show salesman who failed to make the grade as a player but turned AC Milan into the finest and most attractive team in Europe in the late 1980s.

Perhaps he had instilled fear into his team by praising the Irish so much, asked another reporter.

Sacchi did not think this was the case and proved it by going on to say he thought Norway were better than Ireland.

"They are even more aggressive, they are even quicker," said the coach of a team which eliminated former champions England to make the final for the first time since 1938.

Hodgson not at loggerheads with Knup

DETROIT, June 20: Swiss World Cup manager Roy Hodgson denied on Sunday he was having problems with top striker Adrian Knup, who was left out of the team's 1-1 draw with the United States on Saturday, reports Reuters.

But Swiss journalists said Knup was very upset he had been omitted from the starting line-up in favour of attacking midfielder Thomas Bickel.

"Knup was dropped because I didn't think he wanted to play sufficiently," Hodgson told reporters. "In the last three weeks he has not done enough training because of his injury."

Hodgson said his decision did not mean he was angry with the player, who had been suffering from a nagging ankle injury suffered three weeks ago.

A grim-faced Knup, who declared himself fit before Saturday's game, appeared briefly later on and said he expected to play on Wednesday against Romania.

But Hodgson said he would make no changes in the line-up against the Romanians.

Knup responded to questions about his exclusion by saying curtly: "You have to ask the trainer."

Chromatic clairvoyance



DALLAS, June 20: A team wearing red or orange will win the World Cup final by beating opponents

linked to a man in long robes and a funny hat, reports Reuters.

So says Fran Baskerville — professional ghost-buster, missing person tracker, clairvoyant, levitation expert and "Singing Psychic."

The month-long competition, with the July 17 final played in Los Angeles, will also be earthquake-free.

"I can see the World Cup won by a country with orange-red on their suits, oh yeah," she trilled, microphone in hand, during an interview in the back room of her Dallas home. "I can see a lot of folks real happy."

The prediction by woman, whose business card declares her to be winner of the "World's Greatest Psychic Award" in 1991, should please the Dutch, Belgium's "Red Devils" and Spanish, Norwegian, Moroccan and Russian supporters.

Italy, Brazil and Germany may be dismayed.

White, the colour of champions Germany, and the yellow worn by Brazil seem to be a definite no-no but light blue or turquoise was likely to be a contender.

Baskerville, who claims to be descended from the Baskervilles of Withington Cas-

tle in England whose name found lasting fame through Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's "Hound of the Baskervilles," admitted soccer was alien to her.

Author of "Do you Have a Ghost in Your Home?" her records, stacked on a shelf in the room, contain numbers with titles such as "Spaceships Have Landed."

A brief biography refers to her ability to "levitate objects spontaneously across hundreds of metres." Baskerville said she became psychic after an 18-wheel timber truck backed into her car outside a beauty parlour.

Lumber crashed through the roof and Baskerville said she had an out-of-body experience before coming round. In subsequent weeks she found she had new powers.

Her past successes, according to a resume, include predicting the outcome of Super Bowl finals, the Chernobyl nuclear disaster and locating 2,000 missing people.

Informed that governments could topple over the result of a World Cup match, her eyes widened in amazement.

"Why, that's hysterical," she said.

But, guided by colour and a few helpful hints about the contenders involved, she delved into her mind.

"Orange or red, I think that's the team that walks away with it," said the cowboy-booted psychic, rubbing her eyes in concentration under a

cascade of blonde hair.

"Something dramatic happens... one is a real good team that is supposed to be there but the other one is not supposed to be there," added Baskerville.

"It feels like the orange or red colour wins. I think it will be very close."

"I see somebody in long robes, I don't know who that could be. Long robes and a funny hat on his head... he seems to be fairly happy but there's mixed feeling around him," Baskerville said, suggesting a Nigerian angle.

Nigeria's "Super Eagles," the African champions and taking part in their first World Cup, play in green.

Asked about individuals — whose names meant nothing to her — Baskerville felt Dutchman Dennis Bergkamp would play well. "He has some little play that used to work but hasn't lately, I would say he will be 80 per cent successful."

At the mention of Diego Maradona, she sensed "a lot of anger and frustration."

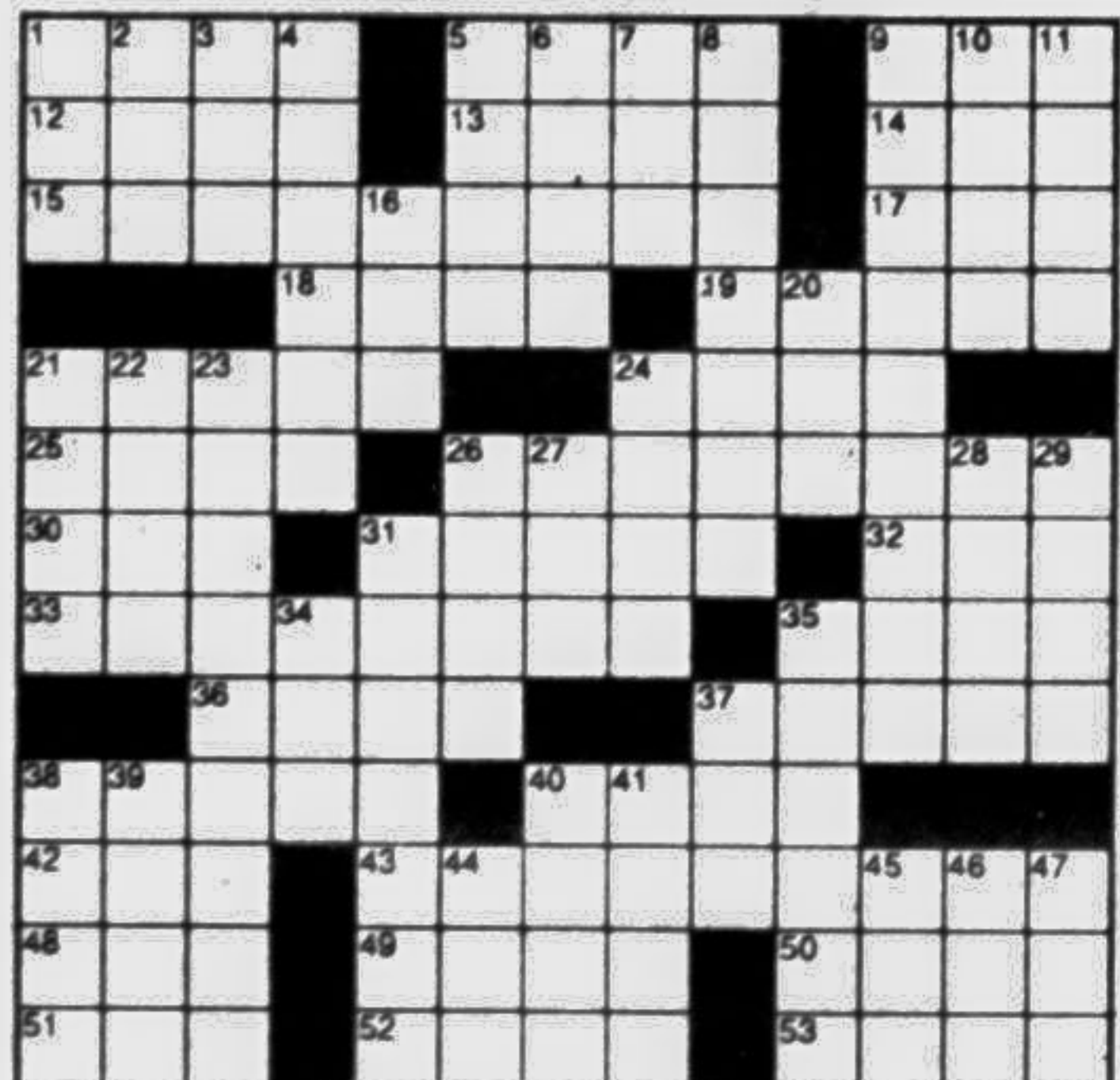
But violence would not mar the tournament, although Baskerville said some people occasionally took her predictions and investigative work badly.
