## A Recycling Edge We Enjoy

Recycling, though a recent craze in the West, is really nothing new here. Perhaps this is the only trend in which we took the lead.

Whether this was done unknowingly or out of dire straits is not known but the people, to improve their living conditions, started this recycle business, which ultimately became an environment-friendly affair too.

Maybe, many of us are not actually aware of the process, but *tokais* and their parents play a major role in this recycling of our 'throw-away' products. Tyres, glass, clothes, garments, tin, iron, polythene, there is no end to this list.

Akkhaya sandals (indestructible slippers) might sound silly but these sandals are made from tyres. 'The making of akkhaya sandals started as early in the British era by some cobblers who used car tyres as their only working medium,' reports a cobbler who hails from Tangail and is also making such sandals in Mohakhali now.

Tyres are bought from Dholai Khal area in Old Dhaka in bulk. Their price ranges from Tk. 25 to Tk. 50, depending on their conditions. 'One cob-



bler can make 20 sandal frames from a single tyre. The tubes which are used to make the sandal strips, are sold for Tk. 15 to Tk. 20,' says the cobbler.

These sandals are found in Dhaka mainly in Gulistan, Mohakhali or Old Dhaka areas. A pair of such sandals costs about Tk. 25 or even less if you can bargain enough.

Only one of your throw-away tyres bring work, food and happiness to so many of them. Now with garments industries operating in full swing, the throw-away small pieces of clothes are a plenty. These are supplied to Urdu Road and are used as lining, pillow cover, children clothes. Even those colourful patch-work items like bed cover, cotis (sleeveless jackets) are made from these clothes. These pieces of clothes are sold for Tk. 10 to Tk. 15 per maund.

But among all these recycled products, paper is an age-old item. Making pulp again from paper for cartboards is nothing new. The famous 'thosh' (packet) from throw-away paper,

are regularly used in the bazaar shops. In fact the man, who buys your stack of paper every month, cleans your entire basement or your store room. Starting from oil cans, coke cans, rusted iron or stainless steel taps, to garments, to bottles, even your shampoo or perfume bottles he takes everything out. The last two items are his favourite.

These are then recycled into amazing products like akkhaya sandals. Glass bottles are a favourite item too. Those whiskey, wine bottles even juice bottles, or plastic bottles are resold

and at quite a dear price. These bottles are found in the foot paths of New Market too. At times drinking glasses are also made from these bottles too.

Metal junks, unlike these are again melted to make something else or are repaired and sold at lower prices. Polythene which is somewhat like akkhaya sandals, i.e. not destroyed under any circumstances, is used again for other reasons.

These poor people, who actually help this process by collecting such items from the city garbages, use polythene for many reasons. Like birds roaming

around looking for the right twig or straw to build their nest, these poor people who cannot afford roof gather polythene to make shelter. Their children make balloons, even kites with it. A torn and tattered tyre is these kids' favourite toy. With a stick, they spin the tyre and run after it.

Besides all these work — promoting and job-oriented recycling plus points, there is also a minute disadvantage — one that can however be solved. Those shampoo, perfume, body spray bottles are also reused. They are re-filled with locally made cosmetic products and sold again. So the next time you make a small leak somewhere before selling it.

Recycling is now followed in the West as well and recycled goods are sought-after products there. In Bangladesh, where this started quite early, the recycled items should be more popularised. Their crude look should be improved and made attractive to expand their market.

## 13.5m affected by Iodine Deficiency Disorders

Some 18.5 million people of Bangladesh's 119.3 million population are affected by Iodine Deficiency Disorders (IDD) which causes goitre, reports UNB.

Only 20 per cent of households in the country use iodised salt, a safeguard against goitre — the swelling of the thyroid gland, says a UNICEF report released here yesterday.

Some 600 million people across the world have been affected by goitre. Of them, 60 per cent affected are living only in 12 countries. Over one billion people are at risk.

The report says that the effect of IDD on children is particularly severe — causing physical and developmental problems and reducing IQs by as much as 10-15 points.

Because of its impact on human development, iodine deficiency also has implications for social and economic progress, says the second issue of the report titled "The Progress on Nations."

The problem can be prevented relatively easily and cheaply by the iodisation of all salt supplies.

In last five years, over half a billion people in 12 of the most seriously affected countries have begun using iodised salt.

Bangladesh has made major efforts to fortify salt with iodine and fixed a target to iodise most of food-grade salt by the next year.
