Swedes fault Russian tactics



PONTIAC. June 23: Sweden face Russia on Friday hoping their World Cup opponents

remain stunned by their com prehensive 2-0 defeat to

Brazil, reports Reuter. Swedish coach Tommy Svensson said the Russians mistakenly opted for man-toman marking against the South Americans - tactics that could only help his team.

Sweden drew 2-2 with Cameroon in their first Group B game and need to beat Russia because they meet Brazil last.

Svensson's players are unused to the hot and humid conditions inside the unventilated Pontiac Silverdome and are likely to spend some of the first half acclimatising.

"Our priority is to defend the goal in the first half and go more onto the offensive in the second," said midfielder Anders Limpar.

"The Russians have a good defence but they leave too many openings at the back. They play man-to-man too much," said striker Martin Dahlin, scorer against Cameroon.





Berthold has a reputation for being outspoken and his career has often been surrounded by controver-7.

Once called "a clown" by former coach Franz Beckenbauer, the 29-year-old VFB Stuttgart player has been in and out of favour in the national team but always seems to hit his form at the right

After being in the 1990 World Cup-winning side, he lost his place after being sent off in a pean championship qualifier against Wales in Cardiff in June 1991. But he won it back with good club form this season and was one of Germany's better players against Spain.

While other players were being diplomatic with the press on Wednesday. Berthold let fire.

"Every player has their job to do. Not everyone is doing it," he said. "We haven't played so many (Aimless) high long balls forward for a long time."



"Our order for penalties is Maradona first, Batistuta second. Batistuta said. "But Diego told me later he would have let me anyway to get the hattrick."

Batistuta's hat-trick on his World Cup debut took his Argentina goals tally to 23 in 33 internationals since his debut in the 1991 Copa America when he was top scorer with

His 16 goals in Italy's Serie B last season helped Fiorentina bounce straight back into the top flight after their relegation from Serie A, where he also hit 16 in the 1992-93 season.

Batistuta, spotted by Newell's Old Boys of Rosario in street kickabouts as a youngster, says he owes his success mainly to coach Marcelo Bielsa at his first club.

After an unhappy spell at River Plate, his career took off at their arch rivals Boca Juniors early in 1991 where he developed a brilliant understanding with midfielder Diego

Ironically, the place Latorre was meant to fill at Fiorentina after the Copa America that year in Chile was taken by Batistuta, with the Italian club soon releasing the midfielder to Tenerife of Spain.

NEW YORK, June 23: Nearly eight out of ten Americans are aware the World Cup is going on in their country and nearly one in two plan to watch a game on television, according to a telephone poll carried out this week, reports AFP.

The poll, based on a random sample of 1,034 people. found 90 per cent were aware of the World Cup. Ninety per cent of people familiar with the tournament knew it was a soccer event and 84 per cent knew it was in the United States.

"We are ecstatic," USA 94 chairman Alan Rothenberg said. "These figures confirm the United States is ready for world class soccer."

The poll, which has a three percent margin for error. comes after the release of better-than-expected television audiences and confounds the pessimism created by pretournament polls.

Last November, at the time of the World Cup draw, only 13 per cent of Americans had any idea of what the World Cup was and even fewer knew it was going to take place in their country.

By last month awareness and barely struggled above 30 per cent but the surprising high media profile of the tournament has obviously had a significant impact.

Coach Alfio Basile and his players said the work they had put in since arriving in the United States two weeks before their first finals match had changed the mood of the squad, who were being heavily criticised back home.

"If you are caned everyday it affects you," Basile said. The Argentines face

Nigeria, 3-0 winners over Bulgaria in Tuesday's other Group D match, on Saturday.

"The Nigerians are very fast," Maradona warned. "But Bulgaria should have settled the match in the opening 15 "If those chances had fallen


