

## Work of Barapukuria Coal Mine begins Monday

The work of the Tk 887.36 crore Barapukuria Coal Mine begins on June 27, reports BSS.

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia will formally inaugurate the work.

Energy and Mineral Resources Minister Dr Khandakar Mosharrif Hossain said this while visiting the coal mine site Thursday. Khurshid Jahan Haque, MP, who is also the president of Dinajpur district BNP, M. Faizur Razzak, Secretary, Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources and Mosharrif Hossain, acting chairman of the Petro Bangla and concerned officials were present during the visit.

Barapukuria Coal Mine, the first coal mine in the country, with an estimated reserve of 303 million tons will be financed by China National Machinery Import and Export Corporation (CMC).

Under the suppliers credit agreement, the CMC will provide US dollar 12 crore 48 lakh worth Taka 775 crore and the rest Taka 112 crore 36 lakh will be financed by the Bangladesh government.

The Geological Survey of Bangladesh (GSB) discovered existence of high quality bituminous coal in the area of 5.25 square kilometre in 1985. Later on, Messrs Wardell Armstrong, an international consulting firm of the United Kingdom, confirmed the coal deposit.

The minister said the Barapukuria Coal Mine would be a milestone in the field of economic development of the country. He expressed the hope that the energy crisis in the northern region would be solved to a large extent. He said the use of coal would also contribute to the protection of environment.






