ILO urges India to free

International Labour Organisation (ILO) committee urged India on Thursday to free bonded labourers, especially children, reports Reuter.

India was the only country singled out by the ILO's "standards committee" of delegates. It, however, stopped short of condemning New Delhi or recommending sanctions.

The 227-member body composed of representatives of governments, employers and workers groups - said it expected the United Nations agency to adopt its full report and "special paragraph" on India at the end of its annual meeting on Friday.

Jean-Jacques Elmiger, a Swiss labour official who chaired the body, expressed con-

forcing the ILO convention against forced labour. New Delhi. which ratified the text in 1954, officially abolished bonded labour in 1976.

"We urge the government to take all necessary and urgent steps to eliminate effectively bonded labour and specifically children at work in this situation," he told a news briefing.

"Our strong conclusion is not a condemnation. It is more of an invitation to the government to make some corrections in the field on implementing the concerned persons, with children a priority."

Elmiger called the committee's statement, the text of which was not available on Thursday, more of a "political injunction".

Labour rights and standards have been a major issue at the intérnational labour conference, as the 171-member state ILO celebrates its 75th anniversary as a champion of social justice.

A draft report issued this week by the standards committee, obtained by Reuters, included the following on India's compliance with the 1930 convention on forced labour.

"Notwithstanding the efforts made, much remained to be done to overcome the problems ... concerning notably the identification, liberation and rehabilitation of persons in bonded labour, including children, as well as, in particular, the introduction of an efficient enforcement system."

China plans to open ports to foreigners

BEIJING, June 24: China plans to open its ports to foreign cargo handlers and let foreign-Chinese shipping ventures ply inland and coastal waterways, a Chinese minister was quoted Friday as saying. reports AP.

Communications Minister Huang Zhendong said the plan was part of China's bid to join the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, the world trade body that China hopes to reenter before the year's end. the official China Daily said.

Huang said foreign shippers would be allowed to handle cargo and operate routes from Chinese ports that are open to foreign vessels, the newspaper

years into President Fidel Ramos 'rule' the Philippine economy is finally showing signs of catching up with the Asian boom, but even the most optimistic forecasters still see a few clouds on the horizon. reports AFP.

Manila has reason to celebrate after posting a 4.8 per cent growth in Gross National Product (GNP) in the first quarter, way ahead of the 3.5 per cent forecast by the government's usually optimistic economic planners.

The country's main business association, the Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry (PCCI), claims that GNP growth could be as high as 7.5 per cent this year, as opposed to last year's 2.3 per

But some say that is not enough, Raul Fabella, a prominent economics professor at the state University of the Philippines argued that the country was merely going through another boom-andbust cycle and that an economic downturn would occur

MANILA, June 24: Two if the perennial fiscal and trade deficits are not ad-

To his credit, Ramos appears to have solved the crippling power crisis of 1992 and 1993. He deregulated the telecommunications industry, pushed through legislation letting in more foreign banks and foreign infrastructure builders and expanded the value-added tax system.

As a result, exports and investments are growing, and the country's international image of political instability and a hostile business environment has improved.

Manila is virtually assured of obtaining a new 650 million dollars credit programme with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) this week, opening the doors for fresh loans and debt rescheduling with its other foreign debtors.

Fabella credited Ramos. who took power in June 1992. with having "a fairly decent government." The former gen eral has received much of the praise for instituting reforms that spurred both growth and

But Ramos himself, the country's chief drum beater. can turn pessimistic. He warned in a June 12 independence day speech that the Philippines could remain the sick man of Asia because of its complacency, lack of confidence, disunity and sense of entitlement from government.

A World Bank report earlier this month warned that while Manila was no longer hit by lengthy daily outages, "lack of power is till the most constraining factor in the country's economic development." due to the forecasted doubling of demand by 2000.

Officials insist that steps to ensure improvements are being taken.

Energy secretary Delfin Lazaro also said the country has enough power plans scheduled for construction to meet expected demand until 1999, while trade secretary Riazlino Navrro said the tax reforms and export promotion drive will lessen the trade and budget deficits.

The Ministry's Chief Food Scientist, Howard Denner, told the meeting the survey had indicated as significant problem of authenticity of certain instant coffees.

ROK economy booming SEOUL. June 24: South be seriously affected, forcing

Korea's economy is booming. with this years growth forecast at 7.8 per cent, the best performance in three years. central bank officials said Thursday, reports AFP.

"This year's business upswing has been spurred by a rapid surge in exports and brisk investment for facility expansion," said Cho Han-Sang, an analyst with the Central Bank of Korea.

But Cho voiced concern that the nuclear standoff might hurt the economy, which began picking up this year from a two year slowdown South Korea's GNP grew 9.1 per cent in 1991, five per cent in 1992 and 5.6 per cent last year

The bank predicted the economy would grow 7.5 per cent in the second half of this year, lower than the 8.3 per cent growth registered in the first half, but higher than an earlier government projection of less than 6.5 per cent

WASHINGTON: June 24: Russia signed a 10 billion dollar agreement with the USowned Marathon Oil and Mcdermott International to explore for gas and petroleum along the Sakhaline Island, official said Thursday, reports

Vice President Al Gore and Russian Prime Minister Viktor Chernomyrdin jointly announced the deal, which was signed Wednesday. The joint venture will tap vast deposits of natural gas and oil in far eastern Russia.

"It will be the biggest single US investment in Russia and a very positive signal to American investors that they can successfully do business in Russia," Gore said.

The Russian-American pact, which is part of the Sakhalin 2 Project provides for the transport of crude oil and natural gas from deposits in Piltun-Astokhskoye and Lunskoye near the Sakhalin Islands.

The venture joins Russian companies with the Sakhalin energy investment company. recently created by Marathonoil and Mcdermott International, with Mitsul. Mitsubishi and Shell

Japan remains world's largest aid donor

TQKYO, June 24: Japan retained its status as the world's largest aid donor for the third consecutive year in 1993, the Ministry of Finance said on Thursday, reports Reuter.

Japan raised its Official Development Assistance (ODA) disbursements, excluding aid to Eastern Europe, by 1.0 per cent to 11.26 billion dollars in calendar 1993 from a year ear-

The United States stayed in second place, paying out 9.01 billion dollars in foreign aid in 1993, excluding military debt payments, down 16.7 per cent from a year earlier, the ministry said.

Japan's ODA represented 0 26 per cent of Gross National Product (GNP) in

Like many of its economic allies. Japan is far from achieving a UN-set target of spending 0.7 per cent of GNP in foreign aid.

Japan has pledged to extend 120 billion dollars in public financial aid in the five years starting with calendar 1993, nearly double the 65 billion dollar it provided in the preceding five years. The aid programme com-
