## Opposition MPs urge unity on common issue

The major opposition parties in Parliament yesterday asked each other to concentrate on a single demand — holding of general elections under a caretaker government — and not to go on with their individual party programmes.

About 100 MPs belonging to the Awami League (AL), Jatiya Party (JP), Jamaat-i-Islami and Ganatantri Party (GP), at a three-hour meeting last night discussed the latest political situation and possible strategies to fight a 'successful battle for a caretaker government'. Deputy leader of the Opposition in Parliament Abud Samad Azad was in the chair.

MPs of all the parties concerned said their respective organisations were on the right track as regards the

caretaker government issue, but some of them felt the struggle for a common demand would suffer if the pursuit of opposition parties went ahead in their petty party interests 'right at this moment,' meeting sources said.

Suranjit Sengupta of the Ganatantri Party told the meeting that his party and the AL believed, contrary to the Jamaat's views, in a secular state and civil society.

'It would affect the united struggle for a constitutional provision for a caretaker government if the Jamaat now concentrated more on issues like blasphemy laws or agitations against so-called atheists, one MP attending the meeting said.

AKM Jahangir of the AL, echoing Sengupta's views, told

the meeting that holding of general elections under a caretaker administration was the major demand of the opposition parties.

'No component of the united Opposition should, therefore, weaken the present struggle by addressing controversial issues right at this moment,' he said.

Sheikh Anser Ali of the Jamaat said the government would definitely try to divide the Opposition by appeasing the Jamaat regarding its demand for anti-blasphemy laws on the one hand and the AL's demand for implementation of the four-point agreement which included trial of Golam Azam as a 'war criminal' on the other.

The Jamaat leader urged

## AL launches agitation programme today

The mainstream Opposition Awami League (AL) launches a mass-movement to realise the demand for holding elections under a caretaker government through a rally and procession today in the city.

The rally, to be held at 3 pm at Bangabandhu Avenue, will be addressed by AL chief and Leader of the Opposition in Parliament Sheikh Hasina.

Similar programmes of agitation will be organised again at the district and thana headquarters of July 10 when the AL is expected to announce its future course of action.

Talking to this correspondent yesterday, some of the AL central leaders categorically

said that their party would continue agitations on the basis of its 'own programme' from the party's 'own platform'.

'The AL would go it alone,' said the leaders, discarding possibility of any united or simultaneous programmes with parties like the Jamaat or Jatiya Party.

Zillur Rahman, the General Secretary of AL said, 'As a part of normal parliamentary practice, we had to take a common stand in the Jatiya Sangsad with other opposition parties on the caretaker government issue. But we are firm on our stance and policy on the question.'

## Opposition may review interim govt outline

The opposition parties are likely to review certain provisions of their proposed outline for a caretaker administration for holding general elections.

The question of reviewing the issue came up yesterday following Ganatantri Party (GP) leader Suranjit Sengupta's objection to the provision that the President would appoint a prime minister to form an interim cabinet 'on the advice of the parties, having representation in Parliament, struggling for a caretaker administration.'

Sengupta, who failed to notice the provision before the announcement of the framework, now feels that 'it should accommodate all the parties in

## Germans first into quarter-finals

CHICAGO, Illinois, July 2: Germany qualified for the World Cup quarter-finals by beating Belgium 3-2 in a thrilling match here Saturday, reports AFP.

They now play Mexico or Bulgaria in New York for a place in the semifinals.

Rudi Voeller, who had played the last 29 minutes of the 1-1 draw with Spain, scored twice and set up Jurgen Klinsmann's fifth goal of the tournament.

The 34-year-old Voeller was also responsible for Belgium temporarily getting back on level terms when Belgium captain Georges Grun rammed in his attempted headed clearance.

Philippe Albert added a second for Belgium in injury time but a late onslaught failed

to save them. Belgium could have got back into contention midway through the second half but Swiss referee Kurt Rothlisberger ignored claims for a penalty when Josip Weber went sprawling under a challenge from Thomas Helmer.

Only Klinsmann and Brazil's Romario have scored in every game so far in this tournament.

Brazil's Jairzinho is the only player to score in every game of a World Cup, including the final, in 1970.

Germany, who have played in five of the last seven finals, have now gone 11 matches without defeat in the World Cup since losing the 1986 final to Argentina.

Brazil went a record 13

## Land for approach road of JMB handed over

As per programme of implementation of the Jamuna Multipurpose Bridge Project, possession of land under Jhakri and Baniagati moujas of Sirajganj district was handed over to Samwhan Corporation yesterday, reports UNB.

The land, handed over to Chow Sang Howan, Planning Manager of Samwhan Corporation, will be used by them as site for construction of the approach road.

The total land area required for implementation of the project (Contract 2, 3, 4) has been handed over to the contractor at first stage. This is for the first time that land at the western bank of the bridge on Sirajganj side has been handed over to the contractor firm.

Earlier, an agreement has been signed on May 14 with South Korean contractors 'Samwhan Corporation' to construct approach road (Contract-4) of sub-project as part of the implementation of Jamuna Multipurpose Bridge.

## EC contemplating registration of voters

The Election Commission (EC) is contemplating registration of the voters in a bid to prepare a 'perfect voters' list,' a pre-requisite for fair elections, official sources said.

The move is to supplement the EC's plans to issue identity card to each voter for checking false voting.

Under the new measure, every voter would be registered and for this a prescribed form is to be filled by a voter. The prescribed form would contain a registration number, a photograph and all necessary information about a particular voter. A new voters' list would then be prepared.

EC officials admit that the present voters' list is a faulty one since the method of its preparation could not check possible inclusion of fake voters. Under the present system, the voters' list is made

by using one form for a family. This facilitates inclusion of fake voters or entering the name of a single voter more than once, because he or she may reside at different places at different times.

But the new system would help check such practices because a voter would not be able to get himself or herself registered more than once and from one particular area only, officials hope.

The present system is often inaccurate because it also allows a voter to be listed even in his or her absence, they point out.

The identity cards for voters would also be issued on the basis of registration number.

EC officials told The Daily Star that the registration of voters would require enact-

## Modern fish preservation project starts functioning

CHITTAGONG, July 2: Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia today inaugurated a modern complex for landing, preservation and marketing of fish and shrimp caught in the Bay of Bengal, reports UNB.

The Tk 52.66 crore Project for Fish Landing, Preservation and Distribution Facilities at Monoharkhali in the port city aims at improving quality of the country's marine fish and boosting export of sea foods.

Japanese International Cooperation Agency (JICA) has provided financial and technical assistance for building the complex, first of its kind in the country, set up on the bank of Karnaphuli river.

More than 70 fishing trawlers and 3,000 engine-boats engaged in marine fishing will be able to use the facility of the complex having three landing pontoons, 96-ton capacity ice storage, 1530 square-metre auction hall and a truck parking space.

The Project of Bangladesh Fisheries Development Corporation (BFDC) has an annual handling capacity of 60,000 tons.

Addressing the inaugural function in the Auction Hall of the project, the Prime Minister said the quality of fish need to be improved for increasing its export.

She mentioned various steps of her government such as boat licensing system, checking illegal fishing in Bangladesh waters and enhancing security for local fishing trawlers and boats for quality

and quantitative development, control and preservation of sea catches.

Begum Zia expressed her hope that combined steps of the government and fish traders would boost export of sea foods manifold.

At present, the contribution of fish resource to total domestic production is 3.3 per cent and 7 per cent to the country's total exports.

'But in proportion to the actual potentials of the fish sector, this output is not enough. Therefore, we have identified pisciculture as one of the most vitalising sector of national economy,' the Prime Minister said.

Pointing at the increase of frozen shrimp export from Tk 3 crore in 1972-73 to Tk 523 crore in 1991, Begum Zia hoped that it would exceed Tk 1,000 crore this year.

The Prime Minister recalled that Shaheed President Ziaur Rahman in 1981 had instructed construction of a modern fish landing centre, but the project, a longstanding demand of the fishermen and fish traders, was put off by the autocratic regime.

She said the new project would also have significant contribution in benefiting fish

## FAO local staff level charges

The Aggrieved Staff Association of FAO in Bangladesh has alleged that the number of FAO projects in Bangladesh had reduced sharply due to 'inefficiency of the Resident Representative of the organisation.'

Leaders of the association at a press conference in the city yesterday said that the activities and behaviour of the FAO Resident Mission staff had created dissatisfaction among most of the local staff of FAO who were appointed on contract. Contracts of some 35 employees had not been extended in the last four years due to hostile relationship between them and the Resident Representative, they said.

Association leader KN Haq read out a statement which said while the FAO spent some Tk 245.62 crore on 62 projects during the period 1983-90, only five projects involving a total expenditure of Tk 9.5 crore had been implemented since then.

The press conference was also addressed by convenor of the association Salahuddin and its members, Dr Rafiqul Islam, and CA Haq.

They alleged that four FAO projects had turned 'sick' due to 'inefficiency, undesirable interference and misuse of po-
