Total credit to government by the banking system stood at Tk 43,108 million at the end of June 1994 compared with Tk 18,203 million at the end of March 1994, showing an increase of 136.82 per cent over the quarter under review. Bulk of the increase in credit to the government went to the BSRS and to the jute and telecommunications sectors.

Fifteen year treasury bonds worth Tk 19.622 billion were issued in favour of the jute sector in 1993-94 to write-off their overdue working capital loans and also to replenish their capital. The T&T Board received Tk 2.750 billion through three-year treasury bonds for setting up digital telephone lines. Similarly, the BSRS was provided with Tk. 1.750 billion for its reorgani-

sation and improvement in operational efficiency. A total of Tk 30.121 billion was disbursed in the form of treasury bonds during the fiscal 1993-94 as against Tk 25.070 billion in the previous year.

The foreign exchange reserve stood at 2.77 billion dollars at the end of June 1994 compared with 2.76 billion dollar at the end of March 1994 and 2.12 billion dollar a

Imports during April-June 1994 came down to 945 million US dollar from 951 million dollars in the preceding quarter, the MCCI pointed out. This was calculated on the basis of the past import trend. Total import bill for 1993-94, as estimated above, stood at 3850 million compared with 3986 million in the previous year, showing a decline of 3.4

In the past, differences over dates had led to repeated changes of summit schedules. Only seven summits have been held in the nine years since the founding of the organisation, although the SAARC charter proposes a summit every year. The seventh summit was held in Dhaka in April last

The two-day ministerial meet will be preceded by a four-day meeting of senior officials beginning July 26. These meetings include those of the Programming Committee and the Standing Committee.

The Standing Committee, comprising the foreign secretaries, will be sitting from July 28 and will hold both formal and informal consultations to prepare the official agenda for the ministerial meet.

The foreign ministers are scheduled to arrive in Dhaka on July 29, a day ahead of their meeting, so as to have time for informal consultations and for

finalisation of the report of the Standing Committee.

Sources indicated that most of the SAARC foreign ministers have already indicated their availability for the meeting. However, there was no confirmation until yesterday from the Indian External Affairs

Minister Dinesh Singh. The foreign ministers' meeting will, among other things, review the progress of the decisions and action programmes adopted at the last summit in Dhaka. The meeting will also endorse the resolutions and programmes adopted at the recent SAARC finance and planning ministers' meet-

ing also held in Dhaka. A review of the progress made in poverty alleviation. development of women and children's programmes and some concrete measures for more people to people contact will be made at the forthcoming meeting.



Competent sources said details of the visit are being worked out in response to an indication conveyed to Dhaka recently.

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia, during her visit to China in 1992, had extended an invitation to her Chinese counterpart to visit Bangladesh at a mutually convenient date.

Chinese Vice Premier and Foreign Minister Qian Qichen paid a four-day official visit to Dhaka from February 24 last. Sources indicated that a
