Two UN planes shot: Airlift suspended

SARAJEVO, Aug 11: At least two UN planes came under small-arms fire today in Sarajevo, forcing officials to suspend a vital humanitarian airlift they had resumed two days ago, reports AP.

A UN spokesman, Maj Dacic Holloway, said bullet holes were discovered in at least two planes after they had returned safely to bases in Ancona, Italy, and the Croatian port of Split.

Peter Kessler of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees agency, said the planes were hit while they were on the ground at the Sarajevo airport. There was no word on who was suspected of firing the shots.

The airlift, a lifeline for

Sarajevo during most of the 28-month-old Bosnian war, was suspended more than three weeks ago after planes were hit by shots believed fired from Serb positions. The airlift restarted Tuesday.

The situation in Sarajevo is extremely grave," Kessler said. We have almost no food stocks in the city."

The shooting was another sign of tension mounting recently as Serbs have tried to tighten their siege of the city and Muslim-led government forces have gone on the offensive just to the north.

As many as 3,000 Bosnian government troops have moved into a combat zone just north of Sarajevo in the past two days, raising fears of

fiercer fighting UN peacekeepers said.

A peacekeeper spokesman, Maj Rob Annink, said Bosnian Serb forces also were being strengthened in the volatile area, but he had no estimates of the number of their reinforcements.

"It is worrying," Annink said. "Any increase in numbers can tip the balance."

He said UN monitors had seen government troops moving in buses and trucks through the town of Kiseljak, 25 kilometers northwest of Sarajevo, toward nearby front lines around the towns of Visoko and Breza.

The United Nations says some recent artillery duels in

US-DPRK N-talks resume

GENEVA, Aug 11: Nuclear experts from the United States and North Korea met Thursday to discuss how to slow the corrosion of 8,000 spent fuel rods kept in a cooling pond near Pyongyang, reports AP.

Unless the corrosion can be slowed, North Korea says it must reprocess the rods into plutonium — a key ingredient in nuclear weapons — to stop them from giving off harmful radiation.

The five-hour meeting Thursday was part of overall negotiations on how to open North Korea's nuclear programme to international inspection. There was no immediate word on progress.

The overall political talks ended abruptly on Wednesday, leading to speculation of a hitch in the talks, but sources said the main reason for the adjournment was to let experts settle some of the technical details.

US negotiators suggested there was little chance of persuading North Korea at the current session to open its nuclear facilities to full inspections and ease suspicions it may be developing nuclear weapons.

Pyongyang says it needs to begin reprocessing the rods by the end of the month, before they start to give off radiation.

Rao to welcome Opposition MPs' resignation

NEW DELHI, Aug 11: Indian Prime Minister P V Narasimha Rao has ruled out early elections over a dispute with the Opposition that has disrupted Parliament for nearly three weeks, a ruling Congress party spokesman said today.

Chandulal Chandrakar also quoted Rao as telling Congress deputies on Wednesday he would greet Opposition threats to quit Parliament over his handling of a probe into a 1.28 billion dollars financial scandal by holding by-elections to fill the vacancies.

"We have decided to go tough on this one," Chandrakar said. "There is no indication of any anxiety from anyone in this building," one diplomat

said Rao was considering snap

polls in response to the Opposition's continued boycott of Parliament.

"There is no question of elections before March 1996," Chandrakar said.

Delhi's Economic Times newspaper said today the threat of snap poll was concerning foreign governments.

Apparently, the queries are from those countries whose companies or financial institutions have made, or are planning to make, large investments in India," it said.

Western diplomats said they saw no prospect for early polls.

"There is no indication of any anxiety from anyone in this building," one diplomat

told Reuters.

The leader of the main Opposition Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) Atal Behari Vajpayee said some hardline deputies of his party had proposed mass resignations from Parliament as the next step in their standoff with Rao.

The Opposition accuses Rao of shielding senior ministers criticised by a joint parliamentary committee (JPC) which investigated the 1992 scandal.

Brokers and bankers were accused of diverting funds illegally from government securities to invest in the booming Bombay Stock Exchange.

Rao's government re-

than 30 nurses in one shift in all the departments including the emergency wing and the CCU. This number is not adequate.

"Doctors are far less in number. I can hardly deploy seven doctors in a shift to take care of 175 beds," he said.

Although the number of beds is 175, there are always 50 to 60 extra patients, sources concerned said.

The shortage of essential items might be overcome in a month or so because tenders will be floated soon for procurement of those. But the number of doctors is unlikely to increase in the near future, the sources pointed out.

"We will soon procure some ambulances," said Prof Akhtaruzzaman. "Orders for these have already been placed. These vehicles are essential to remove patients to and from the CCU to the main wards."

"Look at the situation as regards doctors and nurses," Prof Akhtaruzzaman, who took over as Director last month, said. "We cannot engage more

The distance between the CCU and the general wards is about a quarter of a kilometre and patients are currently carried on stretchers along the bumpy road.

About the emergency unit, Prof Akhtaruzzaman said. "The unit will be provided with equipment to cope with heart failures. Monitors will be set up, defibrillator and resuscitation machine will be set up to tackle the emergency patients. Life saving drugs will also be made available at the emergency."

He, however, could not say when these are going to be done.

The Director also said about his plans to have new machinery for diagnosis and operations at the NICVD.

"Two new angiogram machines will be added to the existing one very soon," he

Programme at Tungipara begins

TUNGIPARA, Aug 11: Thousands of mourners started to pour into this remote village to pay their homage to the country's founding leader Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman on his 19th anniversary of death, reports UNB.

They came in buses and trucks — many on foot — from far-flung areas and converged on the shrine of the leader since early today.

The mourners placed wreaths and offered *fatiha* praying for peace for the soul of the late leader who was killed in a bloody military coup on August 15, 1975.

They attended Quran khawan and milad mahfil at the mazar premises on the first day of a week-long programme to mourn his death.

Awami League leader Sheikh Hasina, the eldest daughter of the assassinated leader, also placed a wreath and offered *fatiha* at the mazar.

Pretoria exploring trade openings in Bangladesh

Pretoria hopes to establish extensive trading and economic links with Dhaka that would benefit both countries.

This was stated by Johan H Zaayman, First Secretary in the South African High Commission in New Delhi. Who is on a three-day visit to Dhaka.

Zaayman, a career diplomat spoke to The Daily Star yesterday about the business potential between the two countries and also about the political situation in his country following the formation of the National Unity Government headed by Nelson Mandela.

The South African diplomat who left yesterday evening after an official visit, met high officials of the Foreign Ministry and leading members of the business and trade circles. He described his visit as a familiarisation trip, particularly to

views with the government officials and economists of his country. Sobhan would be visiting Pretoria at the end of September.

Zaayman hoped that Bangladesh would shortly set up a resident mission in Pretoria. A proposal has already been received by his government, he said.

Speaking about the current situation in South Africa after the installation of Nelson Mandela as President, Zaayman said, "We have made considerable strides towards national reconciliation and in integrating the majority blacks and minority whites in the mainstream of national development."

He stated that apartheid has been completely dismantled. "All the remnants of apartheid

Talks on Rohingya repatriation begin today

COXS BAZAR, Aug 11: A two-day high-level official talks between Myanmar and Bangladesh begin at the circuit house here tomorrow.

Official sources told BSS today that an eight-member Myanmar government delegation will be headed by Director General of Manpower and Immigration Department General U Mung Aung while Commissioner of Chittagong Division Saifullah Islam will lead the Bangladesh side in this 17th round of talks.

Divisional Commissioner Saifullah Islam and Commissioner of Refugees, Relief and Rehabilitation Khandaker Fazlur Rahman along with other officials received the Myanmar delegation when it arrived at Teknaf border point this morning for the talks, the sources said.

The talks, which is scheduled to begin at 8:30 am tomorrow, will cover various bilateral issues especially the expediting of the Rohingya repatriation, the sources said.

The NGOs working there, however, claim that the birth rate is over 30 babies a day!

At this rate, in the last 30 months, as many as 17,015 babies were born in the camps, official sources said. Unofficially, the figure is put at over 20,000.

This number is almost one third the total number of Rohingyas repatriated so far — some 60,815 people.

During these 30 months, 6,048 babies died at the camps and yet another 3,000 women are reportedly expecting.

NGO sources said the widespread practice of polygamy and an apathy towards contraceptives among the generally conservative Rohingyas are the main reasons behind the baby boom.

Some 2.5 lakh Rohingyas, an ethnic Muslim minority, fled to Bangladesh, mostly in 1991, to avoid persecution by the Myanmar authorities.

The leaders of the two major feuding bodies — the BNP-backed Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) and the Awami League-backed Chhatra League (M) — along with some leaders of the Ganatantrik Chhatra Oikya (GCO), are also likely to meet

RAJSHAHI, Aug 11: The Vice Chancellor panel election of the Rajshahi University will be held tomorrow (Friday) at the 15th senate session of the university. Three panels backed by three political parties are contesting the election.

Some 94 out of 103 senators are expected to cast their votes in the election.

Privatisation of sugar mills

Efforts continue despite serious obstacles

Undaunted by the poor response from private entrepreneurs to the government's plans to disinvest the public sector sugar mills, the Privatisation Board is determined to proceed with its programme according to sources.

According to sources close to the Shyampur Sugar Mills, the mills and its adjacent areas have virtually been turned into a fortress of resistance with all the houses packed with sticks and other weapons.

The residents of those houses have reportedly been instructed by the leaders of the workers to turn up with their weapons when the factory siren is sounded
