## UN team finds nothing |. suspicious in Iraq

MANAMA, Bahrain, Aug 24. A UN team says it found nothing suspicious after investigating Iraq's oil and petrochemical industry to make sure that Saddam Hussein would not be able to secretly start producing chemical weapons again, reports AP

"We didn't find any evidence of chemical weapons activities in their refinery-related activities, and whatever we asked, they provided," Cees Wolterbeek. Dutch leader of the 12-man team, said Wednesday.

The team returned to Bahrain on Tuesday after a two-week mission in Iraq.

Wolterbeek said Iraqis were saying Take what you want, look everywhere if it's going to help remove the embargo. imposed by the UN Security Council after Saddam invaded Kuwait in August 1990.

"This inspection was to establish a baseline for longterm monitoring of all important chemical sites," he said. "We concentrated on the oil industry, including refineries and petrochemical plants."

He noted that Iraq, despite the damage caused during the 1991 Gulf War, still has one of the world's largest petroleum processing industries.

Dissanayake, 52, left the UNP in 1991 after leading an abortive attempt to impeach President Ranasinghe Premadasa, who was later assassinated. Dissanayake returned to the party early this

"Dissanayake's first task will be to consolidate the UNP rank-and-file, which appears deeply divided following its defeat in the election."

The UN team scanned about 20 sites, mainly around the Kirkuk oil region in northern Iraq and Basra in the south. These were damaged by allied warplanes and missiles during the war, but have largely been

Iraq's oil industry was producing about three million barrels of oil a day before the crippling sanctions were imposed. Now it produces around 700,000 barrels a day, primarily for domestic consumption. but is operating at less than 40 per cent of capacity because of a chronic shortage of spare

"The Iraqis did a very good job at restoring the plants, but they're missing lots of spare parts and chemicals, Wolterbeek said.

I confirm that Pakistan possesses an atom bomb.

Benazir Bhutto and other Pakistani political and military leaders have said repeatedly that Pakistan has the ability to make nuclear weapons, but has chosen not to build them. Sharif himself followed this

line when he was prime minister from 1990-93. In his speech Tuesday, he gave no indication of when Pakistan assembled a nuclear bomb.

Sharif's remarks were part of his ongoing attempt to embarrass Ms Bhutto's government. He lost a close election to Ms Bhutto last year and says he wants to bring down her government before it serves a full five-year term.

According to US officials and others with a knowledge of Pakistan's programme, the country has all the necessary components for a bomb and could assemble one in a matter of days, or even hours.

Defence Minister Aftab Shaban Mirani told The Frontier Post that Sharif's claim was "a childish act" by an irresponsible person making false statements about

Pakistan's nuclear policy. The Pakistani Foreign Minister said Sharif's remarks would damage his country's interests and would be exploited by India.

"They will use this to implicate Pakistan in the recent plutonium scandal," he was quoted as saying, referring to suspicions voiced by German authorities that Pakistan was involved in an alleged plot to smuggle plutonium from

Germany. Sharif also said that during his rule, Pakistan gave large sums of money to a religious political party to aid the "Jihad (Holy War)" in Indian-con-

trolled Kashmir. Sharif, criticising Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto's government for what he called an ineffective policy on Kashmir, said Pakistan should extend "all-out" support to the

Kashmiri "freedom struggle". Meanwhile, India today expressed concern over Sharif's claim that his country already has a nuclear bomb.

Sharif's comment has con-

siderably strengthened India's case to declare Pakistan a terrorist state because of its support to separatists in Kashmir, said junior Foreign Minister Salman Khursheed in a television interview in Delhi.

Khursheed described as 'absolutely false' Sharif's claim that India too has the bomb. "India has simply said that we keep our options open in terms of security and that is the reason we do not sign the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. But we've never claimed we have the bomb.

Khursheed said. India hopes the international community will compel Pakistan to abandon 'this dangerous course' which would endanger peace and stability in South Asia, foreign office spokesman Arif Khan said in a

Although the Pakistan government has denied Sharif's claim, the issue irked lawmakers in India's Parliament today.
