But historically it is not a new game. It is said to have roots in the past. Even in ancient Greece, the game was report edly in vogue. It was then called disc, made with burnt moulds of earth. It is also said that this game was played among English royal families about two hundred years ago. The game after wards become popular in France Later in the United States, a company dealing in soft drinks used this game as a sales promotion gimmik k

In this part of the world, the game first made its appearance, as some old timers say, in the fifties of this century. Such old timers still entertain fond memories of the game which carried the same name before. In those days, it was locally made of wood with multi coloured designs.

After the fifties, the game gradually declined. Among the factors considered responsible for the decline are the introduction of more attractive and competitive sports and lately introduction of video games and VCR. The game was mainly popular among children of middle class families. It met the same fate as tops and marbles which were once played by children of various strata of society with zest and innocent

Not that these games have totally lost their existence. They gradually receded from urban areas and still maintain their existence less conspicuously in the villages and mofassil areas.

Now after a gap of two or three decades, the game of Yo-Yo has staged a dramatic comeback The charm of the game seems to have affect- mainly for commercial reasons. The merits of the game, as touted, are that it does not need

Admittedly, the advantages of the game are manifold. It is neither an outdoor nor an indoor game. It can be played in a group or alone. It can secure freedom from boredom. While doing various activities. such as having a solitary walk, gossiping with friends or singing a tune it can be helpful in raising your spir-

The soft drink companies which first introduced this craze with their sales promotion gimmick are no longer effective with their offers. but the craze continues to pick up. In almost all neighbourhood

shops, this handy implement is stored in plenty. Some of its brands are pretty expensive ranging from Tk 40 to Tk 50 per piece. Some cheaper models are also available. But they are brittle and do not possess the appropriate weight.

In many neibourhoods, arrangements are made for holding competitions. Even expert instructors are assigned the job to teach the tricks of the game to enthusiastic players. Since this game is played in 80 other countries, there is even talk of organising a competition on international level. Experts claim that there are eight playing techniques; so a broad-based competition on those lines can prove to be very interesting.

Through the wonders of publicity by electronic media, a lost popular game has achieved a revival, thus linking the new generation with an aspect of lost sports culture.


