Everton sign Amokachi

LONDON, Aug 28: Everton completed the signing of 21-year-old Nigerian World Cup striker Daniel Amokachi from Belgian club Bruges on Saturday, reports AFP.

Amokachi looks to have his work cut out at Goodison Park — his transfer was confirmed after their 4-0 English Premiership defeat by Manchester City.

The Merseysiders, who haven't had a black player on their books for 19 years, will pay around three million pounds for Amokachi, who was top scorer for Bruges last season and played in all four of Nigeria's World Cup games in the United States.

Everton manager Mike Walker was scathing of his players after the Saturday's Maine Road thrashing, describing the performance as "not acceptable for this club".

He said: "Once we went 2-0 down, we were a shambles. If the players cannot cope then we'll have to do something about it."

Barcelona beat Real Zaragoza

ZARAGOZA, Spain, Aug 28: League champions Barcelona failed to shine but found the target to beat Real Zaragoza 2-0 away in the first leg of the Spanish Super Cup on Saturday, reports Reuters.

Real Zaragoza looked sharper in the first half, driving dangerously into Barcelona's area but failing to find the net.

A foul on Bulgarian striker Hristo Stoichkov seconds before the interval led to the champions' first goal.

New signing World Cup star Gheorghe Hagi of Romania drove the free kick towards goal where it was blocked by keeper Andoni Cedrun only for Stoichkov to score from the rebound.

Zaragoza continued to fight valiantly in the second half, but despite a strong performance from forward Miguel Pardeza, they were unable to match a revitalised Barcelona.

In the 64th minute, midfielder Guillermo Amor took a clever cross to score the Catalans' second goal.

The two teams will meet again in the second leg in Barcelona's Nou Camp Stadium on Tuesday, five days before the start of the First Division championship.

Deportivo Coruna let Bebeto go to Brazil

LA CORUNA, Spain, Aug 28: Brazilian international Bebeto has won his release from Spanish club Deportivo Coruna with an initial agreement allowing him to return to Brazil, reports Reuters.

His exit leaves last season's First Division runners-up lacking two of their start players. Mauro Silva, another member of Brazil's victorious World Cup side, will be sidelined for up to four months because of a knee injury.

"We have reached an agreement in principle to allow Bebeto to return to Brazilian football," club chairman Augusto Cesar Lendoiro told journalists late on Friday after three hours of talks with the player's representative Ricardo Fuica.

"It was what he wanted and we all had to make an effort to reach an agreement," Lendoiro said.

He did not reveal how much Bebeto had to pay but the player was known to have offered five million dollars for his release from the two years left on his contract.

Under the terms of the deal, Bebeto will not be allowed to play anywhere except in Brazil. If he signs for another European club, he will have to pay the remainder of the 15 million dollars stipulated in the release clause on his contract.

Lendoiro said he was awaiting financial guarantees from the player before finalising the deal.

Deportivo coach Arsenio Iglesias said the loss of the two Brazilians had been a sudden and heavy blow but tried to remain upbeat.

One of the two traditional claimants besides holders Mohammedans, Abahani, who are engaged in a wider and tougher race for the title this year than ever before, got the match-winner from their Iraqi forward Jessim Mehdi in the 64th minute of an unexpectedly dull contest.

Abahani, who had earlier this season won the DMFA Cup beating Brothers Union one-nil, yesterday notched their eighteenth victory in 31 matches against the Gopibagh team in the Senior Division. Ten matches have ended in draws while the rather ineffectual third force of local football has so far garnered only three wins since their memorable emergency in the senior grade with a shock one-nil victory over the same rivals way back in 1975.

Nineteen years later, on a waning August evening under

the league so far.

The impressive turnout was not there for nothing. Abahani were to introduce their third foreigner of the season, Russian forward Nikolai Krioutchikov after the two Iraqis — Nazir Ali and Jessim Mehdi.

The match, devoid of attacking ideas and even a decent share of positive approach, was relieved of its sterility in the 64th minute. Wing back Partha floated a cross from the left and Mintu nodded the ball for a lurking Mehdi who slammed home with a beefy drive (1-0).

Unbeaten so far along with Mohammedans, Abahani became the table leaders as the upshot of yesterday match with eleven points from seven matches while Brothers remain stuck to eight from seven matches and their chances of winning the title seem to have taken a familiar nosedive.

England upstage Pakistan

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia, Aug 28: England overcame a late goal by Kamran Ashraf off a penalty corner to outlast and upset Pakistan 5-3 on penalty strokes Sunday, giving them the fifth Sultan Azlan Shah Cup hockey, reports AP.

Ashraf scored with 10 minutes remaining to tie the match 2-2, sending the championship game of the five-nation field hockey tournament — played in Penang, 300 kilometres (180 miles) northwest of Kuala Lumpur — to penalties.

Nick Thompson, Russel Garcia, Simon Nicklin, Phil McGuire and Bobby Crutchley all converted their attempts while Muhammad Usman, Malik Shafiq and Muhammad Shahbaz all scored for Pakistan before Irfan Mehmood hit the post, the national news agency Bernama reported.

England, which beat Pakistan 5-3 in their final preliminary round match, took the lead in the fourth minute when Bobby Crutchley scored off a penalty corner.

Ashraf scored the first of his two to tie it in the 20th minute, scoring off a rebound from a free shot by Muhammad Shahbaz from the top of the penalty circle.

Nick Thompson restored England's lead off another penalty corner in the 32nd minute, which held until Ashraf's game-tying score in the 60th minute.

English goalkeeper Simon Mason was named man-of-the-match while Malaysian captain Nor Saiful Zaini won the tournament's most outstanding player award, finishing as the leading scorer with six goals.

Earlier Sunday, Olympic silver medalist Australia avenged a preliminary-round defeat with a 4-0 victory over Malaysia to finish third in the tournament. Malaysia beat Australia 3-1 on Tuesday.

Japan down US spikers

TOKYO, Aug 28: Japan edged past Barcelona Olympic bronze medalist the United States in a five-set battle here Sunday, in the 1.5 million dollar women's volleyball World Grand Prix, reports AFP.

The Japanese spikers, who finished in fifth place in last year's tournament, rallied back from one set down to score a 15-11, 6-15, 12-15, 15-5, 15-8 victory over the Americans in a tough 122 minutes.

Both teams have now notched up five wins against one defeat after the second week of the 12-team preliminary rounds.

"I felt the American team has become stronger than when we played them before. They are improving, especially in receiving. I'm glad because I saw a mental toughness to my players," said Japan's coach Todayoshi Yokota.

Meanwhile, American coach Taras Liskevich warned: "Our team will be good in 1995 and 1996. Right now, it's very difficult, because we haven't played a lot together. Trust me, in 1995 and 1996, watch it in Atlanta, you'll see the US finishes."

In the other match, the Netherlands outplayed winless Germany 3-1 (12-15, 15-7, 17-15, 15-12) for their second win against four losses.

Japan will play Barcelona Olympic silver medalists Russia, fourth placed Brazil and Italy in the last preliminary round in Fukuoka, West-tern Japan, from September 2.

Waqar works 3-day wonder



KANDY, Sri Lanka, Aug 28: Pacerman Waqar Younis recorded his fourth haul of 10 or more wickets in a Test as Pakistan overwhelmed Sri Lanka inside three days in the third and final Test on Sunday, reports Reuters.

A spirited seventh-wicket stand of 131 between Hashan Tillekeratne and Ruwan Kalgape failed to save the Sri Lankans from defeat by an innings and 52 runs.

Waqar finished with five for 85 for a match haul of 11 for 119.

Sri Lanka, beginning the day on 17 for three, looked set for an even bigger thrashing when they slumped to 78 for six during the morning session. Skipper Arjuna Ranatunga's dismissal for 34 gave Waqar his fifth wicket of the innings.

But Tillekeratne and Kalgape counter-attacked bravely for more than 100 minutes and their century seventh-wicket stand was a record for Sri Lanka in Tests against Pakistan, beating the 66 between Aravinda de Silva and Ravi Ratnayake.

Kalgape took 19 runs from Waqar's first over after lunch and captain Salim Malik was eventually forced to resort to the leg-spin of Mushtaq Ahmed to finish off the innings.

Sri Lanka, dismissed for a paltry 71 in their first innings, were all out for 234.

It was Test debutant Kabir Khan who broke the enterprising stand between Tillekeratne and Kalgape when Kalgape gave substitute fielder Rameez Raja a running catch behind the bowler.

Kalgape, dropped on 26 by Mushtaq at deep square led off

Waqar, hit two sixes and nine fours in his 74-ball innings of 62.

After his departure Mushtaq captured the last three wickets for five runs off 15 balls.

Tillekeratne was left unbeaten on 83. He faced 125 deliveries and hit 14 fours.

fifth successive loss inside four days, the run beginning against India in Lucknow in January.

Pakistan manager Irtikhab Alam said fast bowlers Wasim Akram and Waqar Younis had been the key men of the series which his team won 2-0.

Over the years wherever

they have played they have done wonders," he said.

Sri Lanka captain Ranatunga agreed, saying: "Even when the conditions improved for batting Waqar and Wasim moved the ball. Their presence made the difference between the two sides."

One-day series England's



MANCHESTER, England, Aug 28: Middle order batsman Graham Thorpe and wicketkeeper Steve Rhodes hit their first one-day international half-centuries as England completed a 2-0 success against South Africa on Sunday, reports Reuters.

Thorpe (55) and Rhodes (56) spurred England to a four-wicket win in the second and final limited overs game at Old Trafford following their six-wicket victory in Thursday's first match at Edgbaston.

England, facing a meagre South African score of 181 for nine in their 55 overs, eased home at 182 for six in 48.2 overs after rain prevented a finish on Saturday.

Thorpe and Rhodes, who joined forces yesterday with England struggling on 60 for four, shared a fifth-wicket stand of 70 that effectively ended South Africa's victory hopes.

The touring team needed an early breakthrough when England resumed the day at 80 for four but were denied as Thorpe and Rhodes put on a further 50.

Thorpe eventually fell when he clipped left-arm spinner Tim Shaw to mid-wicket, making England 130 for five, and Rhodes took his side to the brink of victory before being run out at 171 for six.

Chris Lewis and Phillip DeFreitas completed the task with 6.4 overs to spare.

On Saturday, South Africa, shackled by Phillip DeFreitas and undermined by fellow paceman Dominic Cork could manage a modest 181 for nine in their allotted 55 overs.

Cork had a good day in the field taking three for 49 and running out Hansie Cronje to capitalise on a superb spell of new ball bowling by DeFreitas.

DeFreitas set the pattern from the outset, conceding just 12 runs from his first nine overs during which he removed captain Kepler Wessels lbw for 21 — his 100th one-day international wicket.

DeFreitas later completed his 11-over allocation with two maidens to end with one of the most economical spells in limited overs internationals — 11-4-12-1.

Cork began a mid-innings slump by running out Cronje for naught off his own bowling. Next ball, he trapped Jonty Rhodes lbw to leave South Africa on 47 for three.

Cork struck again by having Gary Kirsten (30) acrobatically caught at backward point by Chris Lewis.

Off-spinner Shaun Udall tightened England's grip when Brian McMillan was smartly stumped down the legside by Rhodes, even though umpire Mervyn Kitchen called the deliver wide.

Darryll Cullinan (54) and Craig Matthews (26) produced a late flourish by adding 42 for the eighth wicket.

Cullinan, who made 94 during the final Test at the Oval and 45 in the first one-day match at Edgbaston on Thursday, completed his half century off 84 balls.

But with Darren Gough picking up two wickets and Cork uprooting Matthews' leg stump, England appeared to be on course for victory.

The capacity crowd was stunned, however when the England batsmen failed to capitalise on the situation.

South African fast bowler Allan Donald removed Alec Stewart and Graeme Hick in the space of three balls. Mike Atherton steered a slip catch on 19 and Neil Fairbrother was run out by the panther-like Rhodes as he answered an ill-judged call for a single from Thorpe.

England win series 2-0

Warwickshire crush Sussex

LONDON, Aug 28: Warwickshire trounced Sussex by 10 wickets at Hove on Saturday to close in on their fourth English county championship title and their first for 22 years, reports Reuters.

Set a target of only 76 Warwickshire raced to their 10th victory of the season with more than four sessions to spare to end Sussex's outside chance of winning a first championship.

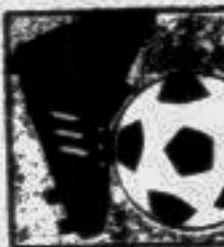
Openers Andy Moles (44 not out) and Roger Twose (34 not out) sealed victory 30 minutes after lunch.

Sussex started the third day in a near hopeless position on 107 for eight, 55 runs ahead, and resisted for 45 minutes before being dismissed for 127.

Warwickshire skipper Tim Munton took the last two wickets with his medium pacers to finish with four for 52 and end up with match figures of eight for 74.

The championship leaders finish their season with matches against Hampshire and Gloucestershire while Sussex, who face Essex and Yorkshire, must now set their sights on the runners-up spot.

Schmeichel stops Spurs



LONDON, Aug 28: Danish international goalkeeper Peter Schmeichel rewrote the script to upstage German World Cup marksman Juergen Klinsmann with a scene-stealing performance on Saturday.

Schmeichel was acclaimed by both camps after playing an influential role as Premier league champions Manchester United beat Klinsmann's Tottenham 1-0 to check their flying start to the English season.

United skipper and defender Steve Bruce, who headed the champions' 49-minute winner, hailed Schmeichel as the best goalkeeper in Europe.

The eagerly-awaited clash in front of a sell-out crowd at the London club's White Hart Lane ground offered Klinsmann the perfect stage for another display of the compelling skills that fired Tottenham to victory in their

opening two games.

Klinsmann, a charismatic figure with a ready smile, quickly won the hearts of Tottenham fans when he hit three goals in the league wins over Sheffield United and Everton.

The German, spearheading Tottenham's five-man attack looked to have found his target after 43 minutes against United, only for his celebrations to be cut short as the linesman ruled the effort was offside.

Yet in a feast of attacking football from both sides, it was ultimately Schmeichel who stole the spotlight, capping a superb display with a penalty save from Teddy Sheringham, the striker's second spot-kick miss in four days.

Bruce, who fouled Romanian forward Ilie Dumitrescu to concede the penalty, said in light-hearted mood: "Peter owes me that one — usually he dives over them. I've made him the hero today and he is

quite happy."

On a more serious note, Bruce added: "He is a fantastic goalkeeper. He has been doing that for the last couple of years and he's proved he is top man in Europe."

Tottenham's Argentine manager Osie Ardiles added his own praise for Schmeichel.

"We threw everything at them but it was one of those days. There is no doubt that the best Manchester United player was their goalkeeper — and that proves the point."

Ardiles refused to castigate either Sheringham or goalkeeper Ian Walker, who slipped during a corner by Ryan Giggs, allowing Bruce his winning header.

"We will have a talk with Teddy in the week about whether he continues as our penalty taker," said Ardiles.

United manager Alex Ferguson said: "Schmeichel made three marvellous one-on-one saves as well as the penalty."
