Ma mystery sure to live on



HIROSHIMA. Oct 4: Ma Junren arrived in Hiroshima on Tuesday to claim some assured Asian Games gold medals but he

warned that his "army" of runners will really peak at the 1996 Atlanta Olympics. reports AFP. The now-legendary athlet-

ics coach was first off the plane that brought the latest Chinese contingent to Hiroshima. He was mobbed in the airport as he waited for his track stars to join him.

Ma said he had brought two men who have been added to his battalion of seven women runners, including world champions Wang Junxia and Qu Yunxia, for Hiroshima. "I am looking for five gold

medals for my team," he told reporters. But in a warning of what to

expect, he added: "They will reach their peak for the 1996 Olympics. They have not been at their top form this year and they may not be next year ei-

After their success at the World Championships last year. Wang and Qu were kept away from the international Grand Prix circuit this year. Ma himself has also been struck down by a mystery ill-

ness which his entourage described as " a stomach ail-

3.000m world record holder and now one of the world's premier athletes, gave a relatively modest assessment of her chances in Hiroshima. "I don't think I can break a world record here. I came to win a gold and I think I can do that," she said.

Ma has arrived with the mystery surrounding his training methods still intact. No-one outside China knows the key to the success of the former soldier and self-taught track expert, which is sure to continue here.

His "army" made its first major impact at the World Championships in Stuttgart, where Wang, Qu and Liu Dong all won middle-distance titles before stunning the world by shredding the record books in Beijing last September.

Their rivals immediately blamed drugs but the tide of opinion has now turned. Several top western coaches share the opinion of former British supremo Frank Dick that: "They are working harder than us and may have discovered better ways of recovering from training -- we should try and learn from them."

Zhu Zanling, deputy secre-

Olympic Committee, argued: "It seems only the United Wang, the 10,000m and States and Europe are allowed to become a powerful force in athletics. When China becomes a force it is not accepted and

there is all this talk about drugs. Why?" Liaoning-based Ma. however, has shrewdly cashed in on the mystery. Altitude train-

ing and discipline were the key, he revealed - as well as turtle blood and an elixir he was quick to market and sell to the highest bidder. He is also the supreme

tary general of the Chinese

politician, winning a power game with China's athletics bosses by reportedly threatening to resign at the start of the year over interference in his training methods and lack of financial support.

The shroud of mystery continued when Wang and Co. who are reported to run huge distances everyday, were pulled out of the London Marathon at the last minute and have barely

been seen since outside China. China's national athletics coach Han Funlin said there would be no world records here, because Ma's runners had been plagued by injuries recently.

But one thing is sure - the Ma Mystery, as well as his success, looks sure to continue.

Japan's party without Date

the Asian Games while in the men's competition Malaysia upset favourites South Korea today, reports Reuter.

Playing without star player Kimiko Date, Japan beat Taiwan today to advance to Thursday's final against Indonesia. Date is the top-ranked women's player in Asia and 10th in the world but she decided to miss the team and doubles events and just play singles, a choice criticised by Japan's media.

But Japan's second and third best players. Naoko Sawamatsu and Mana Endo both won singles games to put Japan in the final.

In men's team quarter-finals, the Malaysians upset number one seed South Korea 2-1 with a 6-4, 5-7, 7-7 win in the doubles match.

Three of the four matches went to the doubles with host Japan, Indonesia and Malaysia winning. India was the other team to advance.

In the women's competition Endo easily handled Weng Tzu-Ting 6-1, 6-1 in the opening match while Sawamatsu beat Taiwan's top player Wang Shi-Ting in a slugfest on Centre Court at the Games

Sawamatsu won 6-2, 7-6 but the play was a lot closer than the score indicated. Sawamatsu is ranked 25th in the world and Wang is 36th.

They constantly hit baseline shots for two hours, punctuated only by a Wang drop shot and Sawamatsu angled winner.

Wang's serve let her down in the first set as she had trouble getting her first serve in and Sawamatsu broke her

once in the second set on the way to a tiebreak where Wang's nerve slipped.

She led 2-1 and then hit five straight shots either wide or into the net before Sawamatsu hit a final backhand winner for the match. "I couldn't get my first

serve in," Wang said. "I played very well and hit a lot of winners with my forehand but had problems with my serve." Sawamatsu beat Wang in

three sets two weeks ago and said the Wang strong forehand then made her change tactics for the match.

"I planned to hit to her backhand," she said. "Even when she started anticipating it. I still concentrated on it."

Japan also won the doubles match, but by that time it did not matter.

Indonesia reached the final when Romana Tedjakusuma and Nani Rahayu Budi Busuki beat Chen Li and Li Fang 6-3, 2-6, 6-3.

In singles, Busuki, ranked 30th, beat China's best player Li 6 4, 6-2 and Chen beat Tedjakusuma 6-4, 6-0.

In the men's quarter-finals, Japan beat China 2-1 after winning a tense doubles match 6-3, 7-5 to move into the semifinals against Indonesia. who downed Uzbekistan 3-0. India beat Taiwan 2-1 by

winning the doubles 7-6, 7-6 to face Malaysia in the other semifinal on Wednesday.

Deep drug secrets

HIROSHIMA, Oct 4: The mystery of a surprise drug test here on almost the entire squad of China's world beating women swimmers deepened on Tuesday with even Asian Games organisers unaware of the results, reports Reuter. Results of the first part of

the tests, carried out four days ago, theoretically can be known the following day.

But miffed organisers of the Asian Games said they were completely in the dark about the results, even though some swimmers, including the Chinese, have already competed and won medals in the Games.

"We have not been told because the tests were administered by FINA (International Amateur Swimming Federation)," said Koji Oda, a spokesman for the organising committee's medical and health division.

"It leaves a cloud over everyone." one Games official

Of the 16 Chinese swimmers tested by FIFA last Friday, two days before the opening of the Asian Games, 12 were women from a squad that dominated August's World Championships in Rome. Japanese swimmers were among others FINA had tested

The Chinese women won 12 of the 16 gold medals that were at stake in Rome and set five world records, sparking some western charges that their performances were improved by drugs.

All the Chinese women swimmers who were tested at Rome were cleared, and Chinese officials say racism is behind the charges.

Japanese sports officials were unable to say why FINA flew in its own testers in a cloak-and-dagger operation just three days before the Hiroshima testers began their

"It is not clear why they did this. Our testing facilities are the best in the world," said one Games official.

Oda said his own division had tested its first batch of athletes who had taken part in

events on Monday, the first day of swimming competition. The "A" samples of the tests are flown to an International Olympic Committee-accred ited laboratory in Tokyo where they tested for banned

performance enhancing .substances. The results are flown back within 24 hours to Hi roshima for further action on anyone who tests positive.

'No sports independence for HK'

HIROSHIMA, Oct 4: China's Sports Minister Wu Shaozu on Tuesday said his country may not let Hong Kong have sports independence after 1997, re-

ports AFP.

In an interview with the Yomiuri newspaper. Wu said China had yet to agree that Hong Kong could compete independently at future Olympic Games and other world events after Britain hands over the colony.

Wu also said Taiwan's campaign to stage the 2002 Asian Games was part of a "two Chinas" plot.

The ministers comments will be an embarrassment for International Olympic Committee chairman Juan Antonio Samaranch. The IOC leader promised on arriving at the Hiroshima Asian Games that Hong Kong would be allowed to go to the Sydney 2000 Olympics under its own name.

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Samaranch said: "There's a 30 "- Mutual special agreement that Hong Kong, under China's flag, shall we say can still take part in the Olympic Games.'

But the Chinese Sports Minister replied, "That was in keeping with Hong Kong's hopes. But China for its part has not yet agreed to it.

"We will make a decision through future consultations. he told Yomiuri.

China sets another world mark in lifting

Xiong's terrific treble

HIROSHIMA, Oct 4: Swimmer Xiong Guoming became a triple gold medalist Tuesday as China swept all of Tuesday's swimming, diving and weightlifting battles, sending its gold medal lead soaring in the Asian Games, reports AP.

Chinese broke world records in two more divisions of women's weightlifting, bringing their total to five in six With victories in women's

team gymnastics and individual foil fencing too, the Chinese seized 12 of the 16 golds decided on the second full day of competition - missing only those in karate, a Japanese fighting sport in which it has no entries. That gave them a total of

20, with Japan far back in second place at eight. Iran and Syria wrecked Japan's chances of a sweep in karate by winning two of the day's four events.

Japan also had hoped to win at least one of the day's swimming golds after its biglead in morning qualifying for the men's 800-metre freestyle

But China won that too, beating the Japanese by nearly a second in an Asian record time of 7 minutes, 26.28 seconds. Japan finished in 7:27.18 and South Korea took the bronze in 7:33.61.

The day's two women's races were Chinese 1-2 sweeps, both with Games records: Yuan Yuan and Daihong finished in 2:28.34 and 2:29.72 in the 200-metre breaststroke, and Lu Bin and Le Ying went 1:57.37 and 1:59.77 in the 200 freestyle. The day's two diving events

both were tight all-Chinese battles for gold and silver

On the men's 3-metre springboard, Wang Tianliang edged teammate Yu Zhuocheng, the world champion, for the gold medal thanks to a high-scoring final dive. Wang finished with 709.41 points. Yu had 698.76 and Japan's Chimaki Yasuda was third with

649.53. Chi Bin, silver medalist in the World Championships last month, had a narrower victory over 13-year-old teammate Wang Rui: 496.14 to 494.58 in the women's platform diving. Natalia Chikina won Kazakhstan's first Asian Games medal, a bronze, with 433.80.

China's world record-breakers in weightlifting Tuesday were Chen Xiaomin at 59 kilograms and Tang Weifang at 70 kilograms.

Chen, last year's world champion at 54 kilograms, lifted a total of 220 kilograms (484 pounds), beating the record of 217.5 (478.5 pounds) set at the championships by teammate Sun Caiyan. Her total also was well above the world record of 200 (440 pounds) Chen had set in winning the 54-kilogram class last year. Her 54-kilogram division record, however, had fallen on Monday when teammate Zhang Juhua lifted 202.5

(445.5 pounds). Tang's total of 230 (506 pounds) broke the world mark of 220 (484 pounds) set at the Championships last year by Bulgaria's Milena Trendafilova.

Thais came second to both record-breakers Tuesday. Khassaraporn Suta won the silver at 59 kilograms with a total of 207.5 (456.5 pounds). Wasana Putcharkarn was second at 70 kilograms with 220 (484 pounds). Lei Li was China's other

weightlifting gold medalist, winning in the 64-kilogram class with a total of 225 (495 pounds). Taiwan's Kuo Shu-fen was second with 210 (462 pounds). Mo Huilan, dubbed "Mighty

Miouse" by her teammates, led China to the women's team gymnastics gold, scoring a pair of 9.95's on the uneven bars and in her floor routine.

Palestine, had to be completely rebuilt," he said. Hiroshima, was raced to the ground by an atomic bomb in World War II in 1945, while Palestine has just been

Bangkok to back out if OCA does not

HIROSHIMA, Oct 4: Thai land may cancel the next Asian Games in Bangkok because of a row with the Olympic Council of Asia (OCA) over revenue. authoritative sources said here on Tuesday, reports Reuter. South Korea's Yonhap news agency also quoted a Seoul

Olympic official as saying Bangkok might give up the 1998 event if it did not get its way on a revenue split. The sources said the OCA wants to double its share of the revenue from advertising to 10

per cent and allot a further 20 per cent to national Olympic committees of the other Asian countries. The organising committee currently gets 95 per cent of

cent for the OCA. The sources said there was also a dispute between the OCA and Bangkok over bringing in an international firm to market

There was no immediate indication if another country would step forward at this late date to stage the Games if Thailand withdrew

the Games.

Pusan gets '97 EA Games

HIROSHIMA, Oct 4: The South Korean city of Pusan was awarded the 1997 East Asian Games here on Monday and it immediately invited the coun try's arch foe, North Korea, reports Reuter.

The venue for the second

version of the Games was decided at a meeting of the ex ecutive board of the East Asian Games Association, whose members include the region's sports powerhouses China, Japan and South Korea

The Games are scheduled for between late April and May "Naturally, we will invite

North Korea to the Games and try to do our best to realise the participation of the North," an official of South Korea's Olympic Committee said
