

Cerebral malaria claims 25 in Cox's Bazar

COX'S BAZAR, Oct 15: Twenty-five villagers have died from a sudden outbreak of cerebral malaria at Barachura near Cox's Bazar town over the past fortnight.

Over one hundred malarial patients had been brought from the village for treatment at different clinics and hospitals till this evening. Their conditions were stated to be critical.

Some 1500 people out of about 4000 living in Barachura under Jhilanga union were suffering from the disease, villagers told this correspondent today.

The disease started taking its toll in the village from the first week of August. The village, only six kilometres south of the Cox's Bazar town, has practically no communication with other parts of the region due to its remoteness and inaccessible terrain.

The Civil Surgeon of Cox's Bazar Dr Md Abdul Baki told this correspondent that cerebral malaria had spread alarmingly in this area and in the last four days blood test at his laboratory revealed 377 villagers out of 971 tested were carrying the malarial germs.

Cases of cerebral malaria, not uncommon in the remote Hill Tracts, are relatively unknown in this part. Unlike common malaria where patients suffer from high fever often for over a month, a person suffering from cerebral malaria can die within eight hours, the Civil Surgeon said.

According to him a five-member medical team has been working in Barachura for the past two weeks but they are yet to control the disease.

Meanwhile many villagers have fled their homes in panic while many others are to follow suit, villagers said.

The district health department has taken up an urgent scheme to spray Delta Methrin, a mosquito repellent, in the village.

The three-day programme, scheduled to begin tomorrow, would provide a safety shield for majority of the villagers. The health department also plans to distribute 200 mosquito nets.

The authorities have already handed out 6200 chloroquin and 300 primaquin tablets among the villagers.

The civil surgeon also told The Daily Star that there was sufficient stock of necessary

medicine at his disposal to fight the disease.

Surrounded by the Bay of Bengal in the west and hills in the east, this remote village had a population of less than 1500 only a year ago.

Some 11 months ago, the authorities rehabilitated some 700 floating families who were living in slums in various parts of Cox's Bazar along the beach. But since their rehabilitation, no initiatives had been taken to provide health care facilities, villagers alleged.

Chittagong division is a high risk area for malaria, according to the World Health Organisation.

Later, in the afternoon a memorial meeting was held at the TSC auditorium presided over by the acting Vice-Chancellor of the university pro-VC Prof Wakil Ahmed.

The meeting was also addressed by Prof Lalit Mohon Nath, Jagadish Chandra Shukla, Fakir Alamgir and Shubhash Singh.

Earlier, special prayers were held at the central mosque and hall mosques after Asr prayers. Besides, prayers were held by the members of Hindu, Buddhist and Christian communities at the Jagannath Hall in the morning.

Black flags were hoisted on the main buildings of the university and a blood donation programme was also arranged on the day.

India launches powerful space rocket

SRIHARIKOTA (India), Oct 15: India today successfully launched its most powerful space rocket to become the world's fifth nation with the capability of placing one-tonne satellites into orbit, scientists said, reports AFP.

Indian Prime Minister P V Narasimha Rao described the flawless flight of the 132-foot (44 metre) Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle (PSLV) as a matter of 'great pride and satisfaction for the entire nation.' The 283-tonnes PSLV blasted off at 10-38 am (0508 GMT) into a clear blue sky from this space centre situated on the coast of the Bay of Bengal in southern India, the scientists said.

Its heat-shield separated at an altitude of 117 kilometres (70.2 miles) as the rocket carrying a huge satellite entered its second stage after 2.56 minutes of flight, the scientists said.

Scientists cheered as the rocket, powered by six strap-on motors, placed the 870-kilogramme (1,944-pound) remote-sensing satellite into orbit 825 kilometres (495 miles) above the earth after a perfect 17 minute voyage.

Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) chief Krishnaswamy Kasturirangan wept in joy as scientists tracking the rocket on monitors said all its sub systems were in order.

Later today, they reported the PSLV's pre-determined splash-down in the Bay waters.

The satellite, carrying linear imaging scanners to provide images for agricultural disaster management, geological studies, forest mapping, and environmental planning purposes, will be activated on Sunday.

"With this launch, India has crossed yet another milestone in its journey to complete self-sufficiency and technological in the area of space applications," Rao said and congratulated the ISRO for the successful launch.

power generation and distribution — and in the rail transportation sector," McLaren added while noting that Canada has long-standing expertise in both the fields.

The recent reforms in the energy sector of Bangladesh allowing foreign investment is a good opportunity for Canadian companies, a number of whom have already proposed projects in the sector, he said. "In the long-term the Canadian telecommunication companies also can make significant contribution in developing the telecommunication facilities in Bangladesh."

Currently Canada is funding several projects worth some 75 million dollars in the rural electrification sector.

Three Canadian private sector investment proposals are being proposed at the moment: Manufacturing and marketing of modems by Evans Technologies of Ontario; setting up of a 225mw power generation plant by Geopetrol of Alberta; and a gas exploration proposal also by Geopetrol under a production sharing agreement.

Currently the main Canadian investment in Bangladesh

include Bata Shoe Company Ltd, Milners Pumps Limited making water pumps, Marks Corp Ltd is involved in steel casting industry and Dynamic Textile Ltd.

Canada and Bangladesh have signed an investment treaty for promotion and protection of investment in 1990 and a "convention for avoidance of double taxation and the prevention of fiscal evasion with respect to taxes on income" in 1982.

Nearly 80 per cent of Bangladesh's exports to Canada consists of ready-made garments while the rest is limited to jute goods and frozen foods. Imports from Canada consist of oilseeds, tobacco, steel sheets, railway and electrical spares and instruments and vaccines.

UNB adds: Bangladesh needs three billion US dollar in gas sector and 8.75 billion dollar for power sector by the year 2010 to cater its increasing demand of gas and electricity.

This was disclosed by Energy and Mineral Resources Minister Dr Khondaker Mosharraf Hossain at an official

meeting between Canada and Bangladesh held in the city yesterday.

The demand for gas will increase upto 2,600 million cubic feet per day against present demand of 610 million cubic feet while the demand for electricity will increase upto 8,900 megawatt from the present peak demand of 1800 MW.

The seven-member Canadian delegation was headed by Minister for International Trade Roy McLaren while the Bangladesh side was led by Energy and Mineral Resources Minister.

Begum Zia said Bangladesh has created a congenial investment environment for foreign private investors and said her country would welcome the Canadian investment in mining and power sector.

She also conveyed her greeting to Canadian Prime Minister.

Corruption case against ex-UNO of Zakiganj

SYLHET, Oct 15: The district Anti-Corruption Bureau has filed a case against former Upazila Nirbahi Officer of Zakiganj, Khorsheed Alam and one Haji Ilyas Ali of village Kholadaponia under Zakiganj thana, on charges of causing loss to the exchequer.

Khorsheed Alam is presently a Senior Assistant Secretary in the Ministry of Finance.

The case in brief is that in 1989 Alam, as chairman of the lease committee, had leased out Kaliganj Bazar to Haji Ilyas Ali for an amount of Tk 9 lakh 51 thousand only in violation of the rules. Alam and Haji Ilyas, in collusion, caused the government a loss of Tk one lakh and 75 thousand.

Housewife killed

Another report says, a young housewife was beaten to death, allegedly by her husband, at village Talmurnagar under Islampur union of Companyganj thana today.

Ali Hossain reportedly beat up his wife, Asia Begum yesterday for having refused to bring money from her father's house. Asia later died.

Asia, who was seven months pregnant, left behind one son and a daughter.

Ali Hossain was caught by the villagers today and handed over to police.

construction of new roads in the area instead of the housing project. As a result, the Rajuk had postponed the work on the project but later resumed work.

A Project Concept Paper had recently been forwarded to the ministry concerned, a Rajuk official said. Initiated in 1992, this project might make progress provided the PCP is approved and no further obstacles are made by the affected people, the official added.

A total of 5200 plots — both residential and commercial — would be developed under the project for the middle class people. Highrise buildings will be built under the project. It will also provide for educational, healthcare and recreational facilities.

The Rajuk had abandoned the Satellite Town Project at Panchabati last year as local people strongly resisted acquisition of their lands. Rajuk had taken up the project in 1991 covering an area of 405 acres to develop 2855 plots.

Rajuk said the lands that could be acquired were too inadequate for it, officials explained.

US pushes for swift vote at UN

UNITED NATIONS, Oct 15: The United States pushed for a swift vote today on a Security Council resolution barring further Iraqi military threats to Kuwait, disregarding Russia's requests for a one-day delay. "We made a lot of progress and I have every reason to believe we will have a resolution by the end of the day," US Ambassador Madeleine Albright said after council consultations. But it was not clear when a vote would occur as Russia, France and numerous other council members have submitted amendments to the US draft, co-sponsored by Britain, reports Reuters.

Chechen rebels storm Grozny

GROZNY, Russia, Oct 15: Rebel troops intent on overthrowing the leader of a separatist region in southern Russia seized part of the capital Saturday as gunfire resounded throughout the city. Russian news agencies reported. The vice president of Chechnya's regional government appealed on television for residents to take up arms as opposition forces stormed Grozny and took over the southeastern district, reports AP.

Iraq pulling back troops : Perry

US now optimistic of peaceful outcome

KUWAIT CITY, Oct 15: US Secretary of Defence William Perry confirmed today that Iraq was pulling back its Republican Guard forces and said he was now optimistic of a peaceful outcome to the Gulf standoff, reports AFP.

The latest intelligence that we have is that the Iraqi Republican Guard forces have partially withdrawn," Perry said at a desert camp north of here for US troops deployed to defend Kuwait.

Reuters adds: Iraq hurled insults at US President Bill Clinton over his policies and personal life today but appeared to bow to Washington's demands for a further withdrawal of the forces.

Although Iraq has withdrawn forces under US threat, Iraqi media portrayed events so far in the confrontation as a defeat for Clinton.

"What happened has completely cornered Clinton," the government newspaper Al-Jumhuriya said. "He is like the veteran criminal George Bush (US president during the 1991 Gulf War).

Iraq, which personalised the 1991 war with relentless attacks on Bush, adopted the same style for the first time against Clinton.

In a reference to the criticism and scandals that have dogged Clinton, Al-Jumhuriya said, "His weakness, indecisiveness, infidelity and crooked financial practices have been exposed."
