* COX'S BAZAR, Oct 18: The bodies of 12 more persons were recovered from the Kutubdia channel today where a mechanised boat carrying 170 passengers capsized two days ago. The total number of recovered corpses now stands

Local people say, some 25 passengers were still missing. Angry people, meanwhile, ransacked the Thana Nirbahi Officer's (TNO) office in Kutubdia demanding arrest of the owner of the sunken boat. The police later arrested the owner. Shakerullah, who is also the UP Chairman of Kutipati, as well as his elder

Wheat for FFW. **Test Relief** reduced

The allocation of wheat for the government's food-forwork (FFW) and test relief (TR) programmes during the current fiscal 1994-95 has been sharply reduced.

This year's allocation for the FFW has been slashed by nearly 40 per cent compared with that of last year, resulting in down-sizing of the overall programme.

A total of 1,19,650 tonnes of wheat have been sanctioned for this year's FFW schemes to be implemented under the Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief while the allocation was 1,97,600 tonnes last year.

The sanction for the TR programmes has also been reduced and fixed at 54,189 tonnes for the current fiscal About 61.286 tonnes were Sec Page 12 Col 2



US, DPRK draft new accord

GENEVA. Oct 18: The United States and North Korea reached a new accord to ease months of tension over the North's nuclear programme the chief US negotiator said late Monday, reports AP. Robert L Gallucci said the

draft would be sent to Washington and to Pyongyang for approval and that negotiators hoped to sign the document in Geneva on Friday.

He declined to give details of the accord, but said it was "broadly acceptable and positive" for the United States and North Korea's neighbours, including South Korea and Japan. He said it addressed concerns about North Korea's nuclear programme past and present, as well as "facilities 'under construction."

PARIS, Oct 18: British Royal heir Prince Charles and his estranged wife Diana have agreed a 127 million francs (24.5 million dollars) divorce settlement for next year, a French magazine said today, reports Reuter.

In the latest report on Britain's crisis-hit monarchy, the brash weekly Voici quoted writer Andrew Morton's book "Diana: Her New Life," to be published next month, as say ing this is the sum she would receive as a settlement.

The couple, who were married in 1981 but bitterly separated 11 years and two sons later, are expected to put an amicable end to their mar-

riage in March, according to the magazine.


