Cheap but Useful Furniture

A different type of furniture.

We are accustomed to the sidewalk merchants of the city from cigarette hawkers, *pan, bri* and flower vendors, to coconut sellers, but what about a thriving furniture business sprawled on the walkway?

Mohammed Delwar has certainly found a choice spot to display his wares. Tables, chairs, *alnas* and beds occupy much of the wide pavement in a busy market place near one of the posh residential areas.

He is not a newcomer though. "I've been here for a long time, about eight to nine years," says the taciturn salesman looking rather reluctant to elaborate. Nor is he the first one to bag this lucrative location, "there were others selling furniture here before me."

Above other things, Delwar values the proximity of the college to his business. "A lot of students come here," he informs. A glance at the goods on offer explains why. Delwar's furniture is of the rudimentary sort. No velvet cushions or soft leather backs, but just unpainted wood held together with a few well-placed nails. The chairs may not be fancy but they are healthy for your back.

"They are made of all kinds of wood," he informs, "mango, jackfruit, *jam*. They are made in nearby factories." The price range is between Tk 200-Tk 350 for the larger pieces and Tk 60-Tk 80 for the smaller ones. Sometimes, he sells two to three a day and sometimes none.

Anwara, a regular customer with a full set of golden teeth explains why she comes here. "The price is cheaper than in the market. I

have bought some things for my daughter's new nursing home — a table, two single settees for the visitors and some other tid-bits."

"It is not always possible to buy expensive things," Anwara comments. Indeed, Delwar admits that some cannot afford to. "Newlyweds come here," he says, "they buy the basic items to start a home."

But are his prices low because he does not have to rent out shop premises? "No, not at all," he answers narrowing his eyes a little. "I have to give rent to the police." The police? "They are to be satisfied," he explains, "I give some every week. It's been happening for years."

Delwar explains his "cosy" relationship with the law enforcing agents. "The police make sure I don't get bothered by the City Corporation, but instead they are the ones harassing me every week," he laments.

Delwar wants the names of the corrupt officers to be printed, but Anwara advises that it may not be wise. "If you reveal their names, you will definitely be kicked out of this place," she warns. "So what?" Delwar responds. "I was kicked out last year, but after a few payments, I got back again."

The furniture man is nonchalant. He believes that he has a right to carve out a niche on the public thoroughfare. After all, countless others do it around Dhaka, so why shouldn't he? Delwar asserts his position. "Why should they throw me out? I haven't committed an offence, have I?" No one had the heart to tell him otherwise.

Mustafiz presents credentials to DPRK's Vice President

The Bangladesh Ambassador to the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK), Mustafizur Rahman, presented his credentials to the Vice President, Pak Song Choi at Pyongyang on Friday, reports BSS.

Ambassador Rahman, also envoy to China, is based in Beijing and concurrently accredited to the DPRK.

According to a message received in Dhaka from Pyongyang yesterday the DPRK Chief of Protocol escorted the ambassador from the state guest house at Pyongyang to the meeting hall of the Supreme People's Assembly where the credential ceremony took place.

As DPRK is yet to name its President as an interim arrangement, the Vice President has the responsibility to accept credentials from ambassadors.

After presenting his credentials, Ambassador Rahman had had a thirty-minute talks with Vice President Choi.

Choi requested the Bangladesh ambassador to convey the invitation to the Bangladesh Prime Minister to visit their country.

In his comments Ambassador Rahman conveyed thanks for renewing the invitation to the Bangladesh PM and hoped that the bilateral relations would grow in strength particularly in the field of economic cooperation.

'Lawyers have important role in establishing rule of law'

Commerce Minister M Shamsul Islam yesterday said that the lawyers had an important role in establishing rule of law and giving democracy an institutional shape, reports BSS.

Shamsul Islam who is also holding the charge of the Ministry of Information was addressing a function while unveiling the foundation stone of the newly constructed Munshiganj District Bar Association building in Munshiganj.

Deputy Minister for LGRD and Cooperatives Abul Hye, district and sessions judge Munshi Mohammad Ali, president of the district bar association, Dr Mohammad, general secretary Kazi Nazrul Islam and former president of the bar association Kazi Afzal Hossain spoke on the occasion, among others.

The minister appreciated the role of lawyers in making the people aware of their legal rights. Despite differences of opinion we all are committed to establish the rule of law, he said.

Islam pointed out some of the government's initiatives to create more opportunities so that every citizen might get necessary legal assistance.

Abul Hye said that democracy and rule of law were supplementary to each other. He urged the lawyers to give the people legal assistance so that they might enjoy their civic rights.

Weather is likely to remain dry over the country with partly cloudy sky over Barisal and Chittagong divisions in the next 12 hours till 6 pm today, reports BSS.

One killed, two injured in road accident

One rickshaw-puller died on the spot and two of the passengers of the rickshaw were seriously injured when a truck hit the rickshaw on the Dhaka-Narayanganj road at around 6.30 pm yesterday.

Witnesses said, a Dhaka-bound truck made a head-on collision with the rickshaw coming towards Narayanganj town along with two passengers.

The skull of the unidentified 30-year-old rickshaw-puller was crushed killing him instantly.

The two seriously injured young unidentified passengers were taken to the Narayanganj General Hospital in unconscious state.

A case has been lodged with the Fatulla thana in this connection.
