Bihac situation grave

SARAJEVO, Nov 26: Infantry and artillery battles raged Saturday near a key town in northwest Bosniá as a UN spokesman acknowledged peacekeepers had failed in their mission to protect the region's civilians, reports AP.

Serbs pressed on with their offensive on Bihac from the east and west, capturing the nearby village of Vedro Polje after fierce fighting. Gunbattles

SARAJEVO, Nov 26: Bosnian Serb General Manojlo Milovanovic today issued Bosnian Muslim troops defending Bihac with an 8:00 pm (1900 gmt) deadline to surrender, said rebel Serb radio monitored here. 'If you do not listen to me I cannot guarantee your lives, all the more so as many of you have committed atrocities against the Serb people," he said in a broadcast by Pale radio. But the Muslim-dominated Bosnian government has rejected the Serb ultimatum. AFP

A small contingent of Bangladeshi peacekeepers were sent to the hospital Saturday morning, but a few hours later, gunbattles erupted nearby. The hospital is just 500 metres southwest of the town of Bihac.

As one of six UN safe havens. Bihac and the surrounding area are entitled to protection by the United Nations. But a .UN spokesman acknowledged Saturday it had failed to provide safety.
