the students, teachers, and officers affected about one hundred academic days during the last three years - official sources said. The agitation of the students for rescheduling examinations is another cause of session jam - sources added. Preferring anonymity, a teacher told this correspondent that reluctance of some teachers in taking their classes is another cause of session jam. The examination system often leads to delays in taking examinations and publication of results which in turn affects the classes another teacher said. According to university regulations, examinations of all departments are held centrally under the control of examination department. If the classes of a department do not end, the other departments have to wait - he added. He also suggested that the departments should have the authority to conduct their examinations. Sources also told this correspondent that complicated admission procedure is the another cause of the session jam. "First year students have to lose more that one year to be admitted to the university"

- they added. "Formulation of an academic calendar can help remove the session jam of this residential university" - many teachers and students said pointing to the success attained by the Dhakâ University in taming its session jam.
