



# Illingworth backs Atherton



ton's job as England captain is safe despite his side's dismal performances in losing the first two Ashes Tests against Australia. England chairman of selectors Ray Illingworth said

today, reports Reuter. As the tourists prepared for the crucial third Test beginning in Sydney on Sunday, Illingworth handed the besieged opener a timely vote of confidence.

"I've been happy with Mike's captaincy and his position is not under threat as far as I'm concerned," said Illingworth, who joined the tour party before Christmas to watch the second and third Tests.

"Atherton is not the outgoing type so it's hard for him to gee the players up," he said. "He believes they should be able to do their jobs properly. "But it doesn't always work

that way and sometimes you have to remind them." Illingworth said he was shocked by England's deterioration since their comprehensive defeat of South Africa at The Oval in August, and he appeared to attribute the decline

to the side's preparation. "It's amazing to me in two or three months how things" have drifted," Illingworth said.

England, who have won only one of the last 21 Ashes encounters, are two-nil down in the five-Test series following massive defeats in Brisbane and Melbourne, where they collapsed for 92 on Thursday to lose by 295 runs.



Guillermo Leon Botero Naranjo was walking with his mother through a park in the central neighbourhood of Boston when he was shot three times by two gunmen riding together on a motorcycle, po-

Leon Botero, 22, was dead upon arrival at nearby El Rosario Hospital.

The killing came on the eve of the first anniversary of the death of drug lord Pablo Escobar. Army and police, who killed Escobar in a rooftop gunfight in December 1993. had been patrolling Medellin's streets all day in anticipation of any violence that might break out.

into a taxi while trying to flee

Jackson, of Los Angeles. Calif, had driven Castro into the ropes and pounded the seemingly helpless and bloody Argentine. But Jackson's wild swings left him open and Castro lurched out with a left that sent his opponent to the

Jackson wobbled to his feet twice more but was unable to stay up, and the clock was stopped at 2:43 of the ninth Jackson was trying to re

gain the title stripped from him after he made an unauthorised fight. Saturday's bout was part of a court settlement brought by Jackson to regain the title he claimed had been unfairly taken. "Once I hit him, I knew it

would be over." said Castro 27. of Santa Cruz. Argentina never thought of quitting Added Castro: "I never thought I would lose the fight

I know that I hit very hard

The hand of God came in Then he fell. The fight boosted Castro's record to 96-4-2 with 67 knockouts. It was Jackson's first loss after 32 victories
