# Hartals end: 25 injured

From Page 1 Col 4 for elections under a neutral. caretaker administration.

Clashes between police and pickets took place in Mirpur. Farmgate and Nawabpur areas while bombs were exploded in many areas including Mohammadpur, Mirpur, Azimpur, Gulistan, Motijheel, Jatrabari and Teigaon.

In Mirpur, clashes started when pickets attacked a BRTC bus plying under police guard at about 10 am. The pickets pelted stones at the bus and police lobbed several tear gas shells to disperse them.

In Farmgate area, a police van was attacked by pickets when police picked up two persons at about 10.30 am. Police deployed in nearby areas rushed to the spot and dispersed the attackers.

A police van came under bomb attack by pickets in Nawabpur area. Police chased them away and picked up four people.

Police arrested one person from Topkhana Road at about 11.15 am after he was injured in a bomb blast following a rally

organised by the Chhatra League, student front of the Awami League. Police alleged that the youngman - Mizanur Rahman - was injured when the bomb he was carrying with him, exploded.

All modes of vehicles stayed off the streets, except a small number of rickshaws. Some BRTC double-deckers were. however, found plying under police escort.

During the hartal hours a mortorbike was set afire by pickets in Moghbazar area. Some rickshaws were also damaged in some of the areas.

Private offices, educational institutions, business houses and markets remained closed during the hartal period Government offices and banks. however, remained open.

Life returned normalcy almost one and a half hour before the scheduled end of the hartal at 2 pm.

Processions were brought out at various places in the city in support of the hartal. The processionists also held brief rallies demanding resignation of the present government.

Affairs of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland Douglas Hurd, MP, to mark the latter's current visit to Bangladesh

The joint statement said that a number of regional, humanitarian and human rights issues, including repatriation of the Myanmar refugees from Bangladesh, the water sharing problems with India, the repatriation process of the Bangladesh tribal refugees from India to three hill districts of Bangladesh and repatriation of the stranded Pakistanis from Bangladesh to Pakistan came up for discus-

It added that the British Foreign Secretary said that solutions to these issues, recognising the legitimate interests of each party, would accelerate the process of regional cooperation and development.

The two sides, the joint statement said, reviewed the situation in Bosnia-Herzegovina and emphasised the need for a peaceful negotiated settlement of the dispute.

They underlined the valuable work being done by UNPROFOR, to which both countries provide sizeable contingents whose safety is naturally of great concern.

The joint statement said the British Foreign Secretary paid a courtesy call on the

Prime Minister. The statement said that the British Foreign Secretary had a meeting with the Finance Minister during which they discussed matters concerning

British economic cooperation with Bangladesh and also signed two agreements relat ing to British aid to the energy and communication sectors of Bangladesh.

The joint statement said that the British Foreign Secretary called on the Bangladesh Foreign Minister and they held discussions on matters of mutual interest.

At the official talks bilateral. regional and international issues of mutual concern were discussed.

The Foreign Minister expressed Bangladesh government's appreciation for the cooperation and assistance extended by Britain towards the development efforts of Bangladesh.

The Bangladesh side explained the developments in the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) aimed at promoting understanding and cooperation among the member countries. The British side expressed sat-

isfaction with the progress achieved so far by the SAARC and wished the organisation all success in its future activities.

The two sides, the joints statement added, expressed the view that contact and exchange of visits between the officials and leaders of the SAARC and the European Union should continue for development of mutually beneficial cooperation between the two organisations.

The Bangladesh side welcomed the positive developments in Northern Ireland towards achieving a permanent solution to the existing problem, acceptable to all parties concerned.

The British Foreign Secretary, who was accompanied by his wife Mrs Judy Hurd, J Vereker, the Permanent Secretary of the British Overseas Development Administration (ODA) and senior officials of the foreign and Commonwealth office, laid a wreath at the Jatiya Smriti Shoudha at Savar, commemorating the martyrs of the

Liberation War. Hurd also visited some British-aided projects at Parbatipur.

The British Foreign Secretary extended an invitation to the Bangladesh Foreign Minister to visit Britain at a mutually convenient date which the latter accepted, the joint statement said.

The British Foreign Secretary leaves Dhaka for Calcutta this morning ending his threeday visit to Bangladesh.

# BHRC report 43 died in jails, police custody last year

The Bangladesh Human Rights Commission (BHRC) vesterday claimed, on the basis of news reports and its own investigation that 43 persons died in police custody and different jails in the country from January I to December 31

According to the BHRC report, released to the press yesterday. 12 died in police custody and 31 at different jails. Some 20 persons died and 67 were injured in firing by

police and the BDR Over 2500 people were injured due to police lathicharge during rallies, processions and

demonstrations last year The BHRC said death in police custody is a severe breach of human rights

Although there is a demo cratically elected government the number of deaths due to police repression increased in 1994 as against in the previous years," the report alleged.

Chairman of the BHRC Justice KM Sobhan and secretary general Akram Hossain Chowdhury expressed their deep concern over increasing deaths in police custody and demanded that the names of the police personnel responsible for the deaths be published and they be punished.

The report gives the thana wise breakup of deaths in police custody as: Magura-1 Paikgacha-1, Goainghat-1, Sandwip-1. Bagharpara-1. Mirpur 1, and 3 persons under Khilkhet thana of Dhaka and Babupur of Bogra

Another 31 persons died in jails in the following places Dhaka Central Jail-5, Sylhet-1 Madaripur-1. Chittagong-1, Je ssore-1. Jhalakathi 2. Barisal Habiganj, Rangpur, Magura. Patuakhali. Dinajpur and Narshingdi-1 person each, and Rajshahi and Bandarban jails -2 persons each.

# ECNEC okays Tk 1381cr family planning project

The Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (ECNEC) yesterday approved a family planning welfare project at a cost of Tk 1381 crore, reports UNB.

The approval came at a meeting with Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman in the chair at the Secretariat cabinet

The project scheduled to be completed by 1997-98 melude a foreign exchange component of Tk 442 crore

Of the total, Tk 211 crore with foreign exchange component of Tk 85 crore would be spent for the project in the current fiscal year (1994-95).

The project aimed at improvement of family planning service, maternal and child health care by strengthening the family planning institutions at the field level. Reducing mortality rate of mothers from 5.6 to 4.5 per cent and infants from the existing 110 to 80 per 1000 is also under the project agenda.

for the nation as all hopes were aborted due to the raising of certain points of disagreement which could have been resolved with a little perseverance and goodwill." the party said.

In the appeal, the Gano Forum also said once the resignations of the members of Parliament become effective. there would be the need to hold elections. New issues and sources of discord would arise as some would press for byelections and others for a general election, it pointed out.

"We would, in that situation, urge a general election under an acceptable framework... but without agreement on an acceptable framework, the nation would once more be faced with deadlock and crisis," the party said.
