# ON ADMINISTRATION

#### Palliatives won't Do

The Prochrichi-BCS (admn) conflict. deepseated as it is, cannot be addressed tactically, it has to be sorted out professionally. The facts have to be faced. Prochrichi's principal demand related to rationalising the working equations between the specialists and the generalists. The BCS (admn) cadre officials, trained in magistracy and revenue matters, wield authority over the members of specialised cadres. The DCs and SDOs have worked as chiefs among equals at the local levels and, in the national secretariat, barring a few specialists who became secretaries, the officials of BCS (admn) cadre including the erswhile CSP officials enjoyed primacy at the various coordination meetings. Their 'supremacy' can be put out of the way if we succeed in associating elected public representatives directly with administration.

#### A Case for Local Govt

Since the commission had a majority representation from the government side, the authority in fact is contradicting its own principle stand. The sidetracking of the two most important recommendation has been done perhaps to serve some narrow ends. But any radical change demands a bold vision and rising above any parochial considerations. Creation of almost independent, selfsupporting local governments could take the country several steps ahead. Today the wind of self-governance is sweeping most part of the globe. In the United States the Republican Party made their electoral gains on this issue. We have dabbled at it but failed to take advantage of the situation. But there is no doubt we shall have to go for such an effective bottom upwards administrative system.

#### ON JUDICIARY

#### **Supreme Court Impasse**

We commend the SC Bar Association for taking the action that they did. They upheld the position of the courts and enhanced the prestige of the Chief Justice. The government also deserves credit by not taking the issue as a challenge against itself, but as a mistake that needed to be corrected. It was this maturity of action that led the government to be flexible, and take accommodative steps, that it is reportedly taking.

The main issue, however, remains to be that of independence of the judiciary. The current administration's control over the judges leads to the type of situations that we just faced. Why should a popular government be afraid of setting up a truly independent judiciary? In fact, such a judiciary. protected from the machinations of the power of the day, can become the best guarantor for the protection of our Constitution and the guardian of all civil liberties, democratic norms and individual human rights.

# ON ECONOMY

#### Stability at the Cost of Growth 15-1-94

The situation almost seems beyond redemption. As usual, investments under the Annual Development Programme (ADP) last year, failed to meet the benchmark. The marginal improvement in the level of investment last year actually came through the contribution of the private sector. It appears that we are on the way to see a repeat performance this year too. The utilization of the current ADP in the first five months up to November was only sixteen per cent of the total allocation — actually two per cent lower than the corresponding period last year.

This is also the time for the DSE to manage its own affairs in a way that would strengthen investor confidence in its dealings. The DSE should streamline its procedures, update its listing and trading rules - make its operations fully transparent. Apropos the Security and Exchange Commission, the DEC chairman is reported to have remarked that the SEC should better concentrate its role on promotional activities.

# Shift in ADB's Lending Policy

It is presumed that the new lending policy will not apply specifically to its window for soft loans as well, namely, the Asian Development Fund (ADF) which benefits the poorer countries like Bangladesh most. However, replenishment of the ADF would come up in about a couple of years time. Poorer nations should brace themselves from now for facing stricter conditionalities in their future borrowings from the ADF.
