Aussie Open begins today



Jan 15: Pete Sampras will be aiusing for his sixth Grand Slam title Monday when he

opens the defence of his Australian Open men's singles title against Italian baseliner Gianluca Pozzi, reports AP.

The American has won two Grand Slam tournaments in each of the past two years. firmly establishing himself as the world's top-ranked player ahead of Andre Agassi and Boris Becker.

Sampras' 10 titles last year included victories in the Australian Open and Wimbledon. While there are nine former

Grand Slam champions in a powerful men's draw, there is certain to be a new women's singles champion.

In the absence of Steffi Graf, who has won four times Down Under, and of threetime champion Monica Seles. there are no former title holders in the women's draw.

Sampras has experimented with a cap in a bid to reduce the impact of the notorious Melbourne sun and is happy with his form.

'My game is getting better and better. I'm ready to go," he

Fitness is a crucial factor at the National Tennis Centre. where the rubberised Rebound Ace courts are reputed to be the hottest in the world and the time permitted between points has been reduced from 25 to 20 seconds at Grand Slam tournaments in line with International Tennis Federation policy.

The men who have won Grand Slams include Sampras, US Open champion Agassi. Becker, two-time Australian Open winner Jim Courier. Michael Chang, Pat Cash, Stefan Edberg, Michael Stich and Mats Wilander

Agassi, who has never previously played in the Australian Open, faces South African qualifier Grant Stafford in his first match of the 128-draw men's event on Tuesday.

Agassi has adapted to the Rebound Ace surface by playing in an exhibition in Adelaide. He say he's not thinking about challenging Sampras for the No. 1 ranking — or about winning the event.

"Pete's not my concern," he said. "My first-round match is my concern. I know it's a cliche, but I just want to take it one match at a time. You cannot afford to take anything for granted."

Becker faces the toughest first-round assignment of the big names - a meeting with American Patrick McEnroe. who on Saturday won the new South Wales Open in Sydney.

Courier is seeded ninth after a 16-month title drought but won the Australian hardcourt title in Adelaide two weeks ago and brings a more . relaxed personality to Melbourne. He opens against David Rikl of the Czech Republic.

Other potentially dangerous players include two-time Wimbledon finalist Goran Ivanisevic of Croatia, tall Dutchman Richard Krajicek, 1994 runner up Todd Martin of the United States, Australian Pat Rafter and Grand Slam Cup winner Magnus Larsson of Sweden. .

Chang has displayed the best form in the past week. beating Cash, Becker and then Sampras in the Colonial Classic exhibition, which is played on the same surface as the Open.

"I wouldn't be here if I didn't give myself a chance of wining," said Chang, who only has played the Australian twice before and faces Australian

wild card Paul Kilderry on Monday morning. "That's my

aim. I'm here to try and win." Becker withdrew from his last match at the Colonial Classic with a slight knee strain, but practiced enthusiastically Sunday without any ap-

parent discomfort. Arantxa-Sanchez Vicario can take over as the world's top-ranked woman if she wins in Melbourne. In the absence of Graf, a revitalised Gabriela Sabatini, France's Mary Pierce and Wimbledon champion Conchita Martinez loom as her main rivals.

Sabatini, who has promised so much but delivered little over the past few seasons, wor the season-ending Virginia Slims Championship in New York and then defeated topseeded American Lindsay Davenport to win the New South Wales Open final on Sunday.

"This is the most confident I've felt before a Grand Slam in a while," said Sabatini, "I feel more comfortable hitting the

Sanchez Vicario, winner of the US and French Opens last year, says she is not feeling pressured by the prospect of

taking over from Graf as No. 1 "If I make it, that's great. If not, I'll keep on working," said the phlegmatic Spaniard.

Sanchez Vicario opens against Fang Li of China on Tuesday, while No. 2 seed Martinez faces German Barbara Rittner in her first-round match.

No.3 seed Jana Novotna of the Czech Republic plays Canadian Patricia Hy-Boulais and Pierce will play Tina Krizan of Slovenia.

The tournament, sponsored by Ford, offers prize money of US dirs 6.2 million and continues through Jan. 29.

Agassi aims a repeat act



lan 15: Tennis master illusionist Andre Agassi is hreatening to perform the same trick he perfected at Wimble-

don in 1992 when he makes his Australian Open debut this week, reports Reuter. Then, as now, the world

Since winning the Brazilian Championship in 1992. Flamengo have sold many of their best players and, until now, failed to replace them.

Crowds as low as 3,000 often jeered the players and management during an unsuccessful 1994 season.

However, the election in December of businessmen Kleiber Leite as club president could mark a turnaround in the club's fortunes. He was kissed and hugged by fans almost as many times as Romario himself during the presentation of the player. Leite persuaded several big

Brazilian firms, including a leading bank, a beer company and owners of a huge shopping centre, to jointly buy Romario with Flamengo and help pay the 3 million dollar he has been guaranteed over the next two years.

In return, the companies will use Romario's image for advertising.

Flamengo are also inter ested in signing two other members of Brazil's 1994 World Cup winning side skipper Dunga and Branco.

Vinny Pazienza punishes Duran

ATLANTIC CITY. New Jersey, Jan 15: Vinny Pazienza pounded former four-time world champion Roberto Duran throughout their 12round super middleweight fight to earn a unanimous decision on Saturday, reports

Pazienza, 32, was simply too young and too fast for the 43year-old Panamanian, who was only a ghost of the fighter he was when he was the best lightweight in the world. probably ever.

The three judges scored the fight for the dubious International Boxing Council title 116-112, 117-111 and 118-110 for Pazienza.

Pazienza consistently landed combinations to the body and powerful left and right hooks to Duran's head.

Duran landed technically perfect counter punches several times, but it was clear to everyone, even those way up in the cheap seats at the Atlantic City Convention Centre that

they contained little power. There were no knockdowns in the fight and neither fighter appeared to be hurt.

Duran, who has been fighting professionally since 1967 said. "I'm not going to retire. I'm going to stick around and fight some more.

"I couldn't move as quick as wanted to." Duran said. "I think I was a little slow tonight. I'd like to fight Pazienza again."


