Accord on ceasefire in Chechnya

MOSCOW, Jan 17: Russian Prime Minister Victor Cherno myrdin and two cabinet mi nisters from the breakaway Russian republic of Chechnya today reached an agreement in principle on a ceasefire in the Chechnya conflict, a Chechen spokesman said, reports AFP

Chechen Justice Minister Usman lmayev said at a press conference: 'We have reached an agreement on a ceasefire and a halt in military action."

He said the ceasefire could start as early as Wednesday night.

A government spokesman confirmed the accord, which came during an hour-long meeting between Chernomyr din and vice premier Sergei Shakhrai on one hand and Imayev and Chechen Economics Minister Teimuraz Abud bakarov on the other

Imayev, a close aide of Chechen President Dzhokhar Dudayev, said the issue of prisoner exchanges would be dis-

cussed later. He added that Ingush President Ruslan Aushev had acted as go-between in brokering the ceaselire accord.

Heavy fighting in Bihac defying ceasefire

SARAJEVO, Jan 17: Heavy infantry fighting erupted between government forces and Bosnian Serbs, in defiance of the latest nationwide ceasefire. a UN spokesman said today. reports Reuter.

The clashes came near the UN "safe area" of Bihac town in the northwest.

They contravened a ceasefire agreed by Bosnia's main warring parties over the new year and prompted the United Nations to press both sides to speed up implementation of the truce.

Most of Bosnia has been quiet, but Bihac has been the scene of repeated outbreaks of fighting.

The latest clashes were fuelled by Serb attempts to recapture the village of Klokot and its water reservoir; which supplies Bihac town, from government 5th corps troops who seized it in a surprise attack

There was ground fighting on the west side of the safe area between the BSA (Bosnian Serb Army) and the 5th crops." said UN spokesman Paul Risley, describing the battle over the previous 24 hours.

We think the 5th corps is holding to positions they took around and near the Klokot reservoir against BSA efforts to take the area back. They haven't done it so far."

UN observers recorded about 100 artillery explosions and scores of small-arms rounds, together with heavy machinegun fire on the Klokot front. Fighting tailed off after



Hili mishap: People remember a big bang

By Naimul Haq, back from Hili (Dinajpur)

Jan 17: The scene at the Hili Raifway Station Friday night was very pathetic. There were pools of blood all over. People were crying for help all around. Many of the injured were writhing in pain.

This was described by one of the passengers. Abdul Malek, 27, who had boarded the local train at the Hili station only 20 minutes before the accident occurred. Malek was scheduled to go to Birampur. He was one of the few lucky passengers who suffered little injuries.

"I was sitting next to a man who generously let me sit next to him. Seconds later, he was gone. I noticed his legs and part of his body in between the door and the goods left next to the door I saw blood oozing out from his stomach." Malek said. 'The compartment we were sitting in, the first of the three compartments attached to the local train, was totally damaged. There were about 60 people most of whom had boarded the train from Bangla Hili, as it is locally known. The other two compartments were equally packed with passengers. This normally happens on Fridays, weekly hat day at Panchbibi," he added. . . .

There was a big bang, said most of the local people who took part in the rescue work. "I ran towards the station building minutes after the collision,' said Abul Hassan, a senior teacher at the Bangla Hili Madrasha, opposite the station. "It was horrible. I witnessed severed hands and legs strewn on the ground. The situation

BDR men from nearby camps turned up. Most of the seriously injured were unconscious. But those who managed to help themselves ran away from the site apprehending an explosion," he said I saw the Shimanta

Express hitting the local train. There was a huge spark of fire followed by a bang, said Rana Islam, who was sitting in his uncle's paan shop just opposite the station about 300 yards away The compartments of the local train were thrown apart I couldn't believe my

Jahanara, a neighbour of Islam, ran to join the rescue work but it was too much for her 'I couldn't bear the pains any more, so I came back. Jahanani said

The condition of the station is even worse. The walls may collapse any day There is only one totlet for both men and women. One can't get a glass of water at the station and has to walk all the way to the Customs building for it. The age old system of station management is still followed.

"How can one expect good services if you don't have proper facilities?" asked the newly deputed Assistant Station Master. "I was told to come and work here at the Hili station. But look at the of fice room. All we have is two sets of telephones which constantly keep buzzing. Its a risky job. Sometimes we run out of torch batteries. We then have to depend on candle lights, this is not unusual", he added.

Tk 15.75 crore was to be allocated for disbursement among the small entrepreneurs and a Tk 9.25 crore Technical Assistance Project (TAP) was also undertaken to help the operation of the SEDP, a sources concerned pointed out.

The SEDP started its operation with two separate programmes - district development credit line (DDCL) for distributing loans at district level and innovative industries credit line (IICL) for providing loan to set up industries of innovative nature.

According to the evaluation report, the NORAD provided Tk 10.84 crore through the Uttara Bank for disbursement of credit under the two programmes. Of the amount, Tk 6 87 crore was fixed for DDCL and Tk 3.96 crore for HCL.

The DDCL operated in Faridpur. Madaripur and Mymensingh districts while the IICL disbursed loans for 17 industries in Dhaka and Chittagong Though the project was scheduled to be completed by

September, 1993, the Planning Commission extended its duration to July, 1994 and later the evaluation committee, expressing dissatisfaction over the slow disbursement of loans (56 per cent), recommended that the loan disbursement programme might be extended till December 31

The evaluation committee. however, was critical of the performance of the TAP since it found unnecessary use of fund appointing excess staff, both local and foreign and building luxurious offices in project areas.

The committees' reports says 117 persons were appointed for the project as against the sanction of 50 local officers and employees, foreign consultants were appointed for 37-man-months as against 36man-months, 50 motorcycles were purchased as against 27 11 computers as against 5, nine printers as against 5. eight aircooler as against 3 and six photocopiers as against 4.

Six jeeps and two cars were also bought whereas only three jeeps were sufficient for conducting the project activities. the report says.

A meeting was held recently at the Economic Relations Division (ERD) this regard. The meeting reportedly decided to request the donor agency by February 20 to provide further fund to for the main phase of the project.

Police said at least two motorists died and 20 were injured as their cars were flung from the expressway or drove into chasms in the highway. Ten trains were derailed by

There were no immediate reports of casualties among the thousands of Americans, Britons and other foreigners who live in Kobe, one of Japan's most picturesque cities, famed for its pearls and Kobe beef.

The Japan meteorological agency said the earthquake rumbled across the centre of Honshu Island from the Japan Sea to the Pacific Ocean at 2046 GMT Monday its epicentre was located about 20 km beneath the island of Awajishima which is about 30 km off the coast of Kobe.

It was the biggest quake in the Kansai area of central Japan since a 1946 tremer measuring 8.0 on the Richter scale killed nearly 1,500 peo-

It was also the biggest quake ever recorded in Kobe since statistics were first compiled in 1926. In the hours after the first
