

Jan 24: Pete Sampras, crying openly on court one of the

Sampras began sobbing into his towel during changeover after winning the first game of the final set Throwing ice water on to his face in an effort to hide the tears, he was able to compose himself before returning to the

There were television re ports that a spectator in the crowd, at the beginning of the fifth set, yelled: "Do it for your coach." in reference to the illness suffered by Tim Gullikson. Gullikson, who has had two strokes in the past three months, left for the United States on Tuesday after again becoming ill during the tournament and having to be hospitalized.

Sampras appeared to be composed after the changeover, but moments later, he again began crying and during one service game. blasted two aces past Courier in between wiping the tears away.

Sampras, who won 6-7, (4-.7). 6-7 (3-7), 6-3, 6-4, 6-3, had beaten Courier in 10 of 13 previous meetings, including last year's Australian Open semifinal. He now plays Michael Chang in the semifinals on Thursday. In the fourth set, Sampras

broke Courier's serve in the game when Courier slammed an easy overhead rsmash well outside the court.

The pair stayed on serve through the first 12 games of the opening set, forcing a tiebreaker, where they scored points on their serve to 3-3.

Sampras double-faulted to allow Courier to take a 4-3 lead, then Courier held on his next serve to go up 5-3. The next point had to be replayed when a linesman ruled that a Courier shot was wide and the chair umpire over-ruled. Courier won the set when a Sampras backhand went into the net.

The two also held service in the second set, forcing another tiebreaker that Courier won after going up 3-0 and watching a Sampras backhand go into the net on set point.

Sampras came fighting back in the third set, breaking Courier in the third and ninth


Earlier, Chang admitted that players often exploit injuries to their opponents. But he was reluctant to talk too much about one he may have sustained himself.

Chang said following Medvedev's injury, he checked out his opponent's ability to play a variety of shots.

"I was testing him. I was seeing if any particular shots hurt him," he said. "I was looking to see if he had any trouble hitting forehands, any trouble hitting backhands, anything else. He didn't so I figured it must not be too se-

Chang's reasons for the injury test are not all predatory.

"I think the danger is that if you see that your opponent is injured, you can tend to just hit the ball back. You figure that he's hurt, he's not going to be able to hit as well and he's going to lose the match. I've learned in the past that that's just not the case.

Conchita Martinez, playing with the same determination that brought her last year's

Wimbledon singles title. moved a step closer to another Grand Slam champi

Martinez, the second seed beat American Lindsay Davenport 6-3. 4-6. 6-3 to advance to the semifinals against Mary Pierce. Davenport double-faulted on match point and made 50 unforced errors.

"Every time I've played her it's been a problem," said Davenport. "It's tough because I have to be the one to go for it I know I can't stay out there and rally with them."

Fourth seed Pierce advanced with a 6-1, 6-4 win over Natasha Zvereva. Pierce. based in Florida and coached by Nick Bollettieri, needed only 62 minutes to beat the eighth seed. Pierce and Martinez have never played each other.

OJ Simpson gets first break

LOS ANGELES, Jan 24: A judge handed OJ Simpson's defence team a major victory on Monday, allowing it to introduce allegations of racism against a key police witness. reports Reuter.

Judge Lance Ito, who reset opening presentations for today in the sensational doublemurder trial, ruled that attor neys for the American football legend could question a white police detective about racist remarks he is alleged to have made about blacks.

The defence team has sug gested that detective Mark Puhrman may have planted the most damning piece of evi dence - a bloody glove - at Simpson's estate because of his disdain for the black football legend's marriage to a beauti ful white woman.

Yokohama win Asian Cup Winners' Cup

SHARAJAH, Jan 24: Defender Ippie Watanabe scored both goals - including the game winner in extra time - as Japan's Yokohama Flugels beat the Emirates' Al-Shaab 2-1 to take the fifth Asian Cup Winners Cup Sunday reports

The match was played at a furtous pace before Watanabe knocked a header off a corner kick past the outstretched arms of Al-Shaab goalkeeper Ahmed Htlal's in the 37th minute.

It was Japan's third victory in five editions of the Asian Cup Winners' Cup following the double success of Nissan FC now known as the Yokohamma Marinos - in 1991 and 1992.

Gullikson flies home

MELBOURNE, Jan 24: Tim Gulificson, who suffered a dizzy speil during the Australian Open last week, flew home to the United States on Tuesday after his release from the hospital, reports AP.

"We just want to say a big thank you to all players and tennis friends for their encouragement and support. said his twin brother Tom, the US Davis Cup coach, who returned home with him.

Tim Gullikson, who suffered two strokes in the past three months, was feeling much better Tuesday, ATP Tour spokesman Greg Sharko said.

Gullikson had to be helped from the National Tennis Centre on Friday by his brother and a racket stringer when he became dizzy in the locker room following a warmup with

Gullikson spent three days in the hospital, but Sharko had no information on the results of heart and brain exams that Gullikson underwent during his hospital stay.

Last October, Gullikson col lapsed in a Stockholm. Sweden, hotel room, and again fell ill at the Grand Slam Cup at Munich, Germany, in December. Brain scans showed that he had a blocked artery from a congenital heart condition and has suffered two minor strokes.

He is on a blood-thinning medication, which can have a side effect of causing dizziness.

Indomitable Lions left in the cold

HARARE, Jan 24: Cameroon's national soccer team are stranded without food and accommodation in Zimbabwe after their African Nations' Cup qualifier on Sunday, the Zimbabwe Soccer Federation (ZIFA) said today, reports Reuter.

ZIFA secretary-general Phil Hwata said Cameroon, who were beaten 4-1 on Sunday, were not due to leave for home until Friday but had no money for their stay over the next three days.

They have no money ... and we also have no money to pay for the extra days," Hwata said

ZIFA has been hosting the Indomitable Lions' for the past five days, the maximum period they are obliged to pay bills for visiting African Nations' Cup qualifying contestants.

"We have advised CAF (Confederation of African Football) of the plight of the Cameroonians but the continental body has not been helpful." Hwata added.

"We have been advised that the visitors should fend for themselves for the extra days they are staying in Zimbabwe and we do not know what to do with them." Cameroon offi-

BONN, Jan 24: Italian club Florentina are determined to retain unsettled German mid fielder Stefan Effenberg, cur rently playing on loan in Germany , Florentina's presi dent said in an interview published on Sunday, reports Reuter

There is no way I am let ting Effenberg go. He's indispensable to our team I'm counting on him for next season," Cecchi Gori told the weekly newspaper Bild Am Sonntag

"We are going to pursue the subject. I'm going to stay cool and calm and we will continue to fight for Effenberg '

Effenberg, expelled from the German squad at last year's World Cup finals after making an obscene gesture to fans, was deemed surplus to Florentina's requirements this season as the squad's fourth foreigner

He has flourished since going on loan to Bundesliga club Borussia Moenchengladbach but his Fiorentina contract runs until 1997.

MARSEILLE, Jan 24: Bayern Munich striker Jean-Pierre Papin returned on Monday to Marseille, the city where he enjoyed his greatest soccer successes, for a new operation to cure a troublesome knee injury, reports Reuter.

The 31-year-old former European-player of-the-year whose career has been almost totally disrupted by injury. since joining Bayern from AC Milan last summer, is due to have minor surgery on Wednesday.

Papin, who had an operation on the same knee earlier in the season, said he had continued to suffer pain and wanted to finish with the problem once and for all.

The Frenchman said he hoped he would recover in time for the resumption of the German league session, after the mid-winter break. in mid-February.

TAIPEI, Jan 24: Taiwan's controversial bid to host the 2002 Asian Games gathered steam Tuesday as a Taiwanese delegation embarked on a 4nation tour of Southeast Asia to

garner support, reports AP. Taiwan's bid for the Games, which are held every four years, is opposed by China,

which views Taiwan as a rene-

gade province. Taiwan formally announced Friday that Kaohsiung, a southern port city, would bid.

A six-member delegation led by deputy secretary general of the Kaohsiung City Government, Ho Tung-po, left Tuesday to visit sports officials in Vietnam, Singapore, Malaysia and Indonesia, city officials

A 13-member delegation led by Kaohsiung Mayor WuDen-yih will leave for Thatland on Feb. 5 for a 12-day tour which will include visits to sports officials in Kuwait, Bahrain, Saudi Arabia and Amman, the city government

Taiwan's Olympic Committee has said China's support will be vital to Kaohsiung's bid. But Mayor Wu has not said if he plans to visit China to seek Beijing's sup-

Chinese Olympic Committee president Wu Shaozu has said Taiwan is not an appropriate host for the Asian Games and that China will support a bid from South

China threatened to boycott the 1994 Asian Games in Hiroshima, Japan, after the Olympic Council of Asia invited Taiwan President Lee Tenghui to attend.

Yeboah at Elland Road

LONDON, Jan 24: Ghanaian international striker Anthony Yeboah finally joined Leeds United for a club record fee of 3.4 million pounds (5.39 million dollars) on Monday ending weeks of delays that held up his signing, reports Reuter.

agreed a move to Elland Road almost three weeks ago but before he officially joined from German club Eintracht Frankfurt, Yeboah had to wait for a work permit.
