## Dhaka Day by Day

## From a time of Sacrifice and Valour

For someone with a title like Bhasha Shainik. Gaziul Hug needs no introduction. Being one of the prime actors of the Language Movement, his memories of that time, 43 years ago, are as fresh as if it had happened only the other day.

He begins with February 20th when a rumour was circulated that some student leaders and workers would be arrested. At one o'clock in the morning on February 21st eleven Dhaka University students, Huq included, decided that they would defy the famous Section 144

code. The students were to start 'Satyagraha' that is to meet in groups of

"Abdul Momen. one of the student leaders accompanied me and we scaled the walls of the DU campus to reach the building (now Dhaka Medical College) and I spent the night on the staircase, says Huq.

"On February 21st." Hug continues," after lathi charging and teargassing the campus. the police fired on the students, after which the situation was extremely tense. That night I stayed at the Medical College Barrack Hostel. From the morning onwards that day. there were processions after processions of people from

all walks of life, pro-testing the firing." With the military ransacking the halls on February 25th, looking for student leaders and then trampling the Shaheed Minar. Hug had no other option but to stay in hiding taking shelter at various houses and then later fleeing to Sherpur, "The faces of my dead friends and the image of the Shaheed Minar being trampled on, were so fresh in my mind that I couldn't think of any thing else not even my own safety" It was while hiding in a house in Hatkhola that he composed a song "Bhulbo na Ekushe February.

So what happened to all that idealism, the spirt of sacrifice that made young people risk their lives for a common cause? Comparing the mental make up of youth of today with those of '52. Hug points out the answer to the question: financial dependence. In other words, nowadays students are financially backed by political parties and so are manipulated into doing things that would normally contradict their principles.

"During the '52 movement and the movements '69 and '71 the students were imbibed

with political idealism and the ruling party, or any other party completely failed to bribe the students or the masses." But the situation says Hug was different during various periods such as after '58 onwards when autocratic governments attempted to ban politics which, according to him, is the main instrument through which a society can become democratic. This period of autocracy mirrored again in the eighties, says Huq, induced many students to support undemocratic forces and so become corrupt

> "In the 50s and 60s and beginning of the 70's the goal was to achieve something. namely freedom and this spirit to fight for a noble cause formed a strong bond of unity among people. including students. Later. Huq. explains, students fell victim to the politics of power, money and self interest, a trend that has survived till today. Political parties have named student organisations working for them and students being financially dependent on political parties, have discended their values. "Once they have tasted the benefits of corruption it is very difficult for them to change their faces. When you take financial

help from someone you must support your financier even if it means sacrificing your ideals. That's what's happening now".

This absence of idealism and true spirit of patriotism is apparent even in the way Ekushey February is observed. Political bigwigs and other people physically tackle each other at the Sheehid Minar to be the first one to place the biggest wreath on the Minar, making sure the T.V cameras are on them while hoodlums use this day as an opportunity to hijack people of their belongings and molest young women. Is this what we have learnt from the movement as sacred as the Language Movement? Huq prescribes a different way of observing the day. "We should observe it with maximum restraint, maybe even in a joyous mood for the victory it We must always try to learn that we live not only for ourselves but for others too."
