Two murdered on DU, BL College campuses

A youngman was gunned down on the Dhaka University campus while a leader of the Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) was assassinated by a rival student group at the BL College in Khulna vesterday.

Our DU Correspondent reports, Shabbir Dewan, 27, was felled by a bullet in the chest near the 'Dhaka University Snacks(DUS) in front of the TSC in the evening. He was shifted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where the doctors declared him

Witnesses said a group of three youths fired three shots, one of which hit Shabbir on the left side of the chest near the heart. The cause of the shooting could not be known immediately.

Shabbir, son of Abul Kasem Dewan of Ramna, hailed from Vikrampur.

Witnesses added that Shabbir had just got down from a car and gone to the snack bar for a glass of water.

His assailants fled the scene

promptly after shooting which created panic among the students and pedestrians. Students and DUS employ-

Instances of apparently welleducated, well-bred boys from the upper stratum of society dabbling in this dubious trade are also there.
