

away SAN DIEGO, California, Mar 19: Swimming pioneer Flo-

rence Chadwick, who broke the record for swimming the English Channel in 1950, and later became the only woman ever to swim the waterway in both directions, has died at the age of 76, a friend said on Saturday, reports Reuter. Bob Breitbard, founder of

the San Diego Hall of Champions, said Chadwick had been suffering from leukemia for more than a year. She died at her San Diego home on Wednesday. On August 8, 1950, Chad-

wick set a new time of 13 hours and 31 minutes, breaking the previous record held by Gertrude Ederle by more than one hour, when she swam from Cap Gris-Nez on the French coast to Dover, England. She returned five years

later to do it again, this time by swimming from England to France, against the tide and current, in 13 hours and 55 minutes — 11 minutes faster than the previous record set by Bill Pickering of England.

She made the swim in dense fog, icy waters and with scores of jellyfish and became the only woman to have swum the English Channel in both directions.

Chadwick returned to repeat the feat twice more and went on to earn 17 world records for long-distance swimming before she announced her retirement in 1960.

In addition to her English Channel feats, Chadwick swam the strait of Gibraltar, the Dardenelles off Turkey and the Bristol Channel between Wales and England, in which she set another world record of 6 hours, 7 minutes. The previous record had stood for 24 years.

"Florence will be remembered as one of the all-time greats in women's swimming throughout the world." Breitbard said.
