
# Bagan batter Brothers

Kalabagan set -a record of sorts in domestic cricket when their four top order batsmen scored half-

centuries to guide the star studded outfit to a facile 44run win over Brothers Union in the solitary Navana Premier Division cricket super league match at the Dhaka Stadium vesterday.

On a placid wicket, openers Athar Ali Khan and Masum put on a century partnership for the first wicket followed by another undefeated 134-run stand between skipper Farugue Ahmed and Pakistani allrounder Zahid Ahmed for the third wicket as Kalabagan, sent in to bat, compiled a mammoth total of 298 for two in the allotted 45 overs, so far the highest score in an innings in this year's Navana Premier cricket league.

In reply, Brothers Union, who are sorely missing the services of Aamir Hanif, could muster 254 for six before they exhausted their share of 45

Aamir Hanif, the elder of the Hanif brothers, earlier left for Pakistan where he is expecting a call to the Pakistan national squad.

However, the outcome of vesterday's match brought double delight for Kalabagan who not only took a sweet revenge against their first phase conquerors but also regained the top slot, along with defending joint-holders Abahani Krira Chakra, both collecting 22 points with Abahani playing one match less.

It was Brothers' second successive defeat in the sixteam super league though they beat Kalabagan by two wickets in the first phase.

Athar Ali Khan and Zahid Razzak Masum made the most of an easy wicket once Brothers skipper Al Shahrfar Rokon invited Kalabagan to bat first.

The two openers laid the foundation of a huge score, sharing 131 runs in 26.3 overs before the former national

player Masum departed for a 74-ball 61 embellished with six firmly hits to the fence.

The tall national opener, so far the highest individual scorer in the league with more than 500 runs, hit five fours in his enterprising innings.

Zahid Ahmed took charge once Athar left, plundering 134 runs in the last 72 balls along with skipper Faruque Ahmed, who played a good innings after a long time.

They set the field afire with the aggressive Zahid scoring a hurricane unbeaten 75 off only 39 balls.

The Pakistani all-rounder needed only 29 balls to reach his 50 and fittingly finished the Kalabagan innings with a massive sixer off seamer Khairuzzaman Babu over midwicket.

Zahid, who also shone with the leather, claiming three Brothers wickets, clubbed nine fours in his blazing knock.

Skipper Faruque, who started rather cautiously, also played an equally aggressive 55-ball 72 which featured four hits to the rope and a towering six off spinner Shoaib in the penultimate over. Faruque also scored 18 runs off paceman Sajal Chawdhury, who was the most expensive among the Brothers bowlers, conceding 57 runs in his six overs.

The Brothers innings was built around a defiant century partnership between Sajal and Shoaib, who put on 104 runs for the fifth wicket after the Gopibagh outfit lost their first four wickets for 127 in 27.2

Openers Sajid Hassan and Abid Hanif, the younger brother of Aamir Hanif, with 38 and 23 respectively, were the other notable run-getters for

Sajal's obdurate unbeaten 60-ball 58, though too little too late, included three hits to the fence while Shoaib's quickfire 43-ball 59 featured six fours and two sixes.

But Asanka Gurusinha steeled the innings with a slow and patient hand to guide his side out of the woods and towards a position of some secu-

Gurusinha batted for a minute over six hours to be 92 not out at stumps but he was fortunate to still be at the crease at stumps when former wicketkeeper Bryan Young dropped the easiest of offerings at slip when he was on 73. New Zealand claimed only

one wicket in the second session, that of Aravinda de Silva. who made 13 and left with the score at 81. But with measured and con-





#### Cape Town's rescue summit for 2004 Games CAPE TOWN, Mar 21: Cape

Town will host a summit of business, sports and political leaders in the first week of April to rescue the city's falter? ing bid to host the Olympic Games in 2004, Sports Minister Steve Tshwete said on Monday, reports Reuter. Tshwete told a news con-

ference the one-day summit would consider a business plan for the management of the city's bid and select a chief executive officer with international respect and proven business experience to manage

He said public wrangling over control of the bid process had dented confidence in South Africa's ability to stage the Games, adding:

"The bid must be put back on track. Things cannot get worse... but you get to a point where you sober up, where you realise that more is at stake than you yourself or your own particular interest."

Tshwete said supermarket magnate Raymond Ackerman. who headed Cape Town's campaign against Johannesburg and Durban to bid for the Games, had agreed to "take a back seat. Last week, Ackerman, who
