# India refuses to modify its defence pact with Nepal

NEW DELIII. Apr 11: India has refused to modify a treaty that forces Nepal to win New Delhi's approval of its defence policy and arms deals, Nepal's prime minister indicated to-

day, reports AP. But Prime Minister Man Mohan Adhikari said negotiations on changing a 1950 treaty that governs relations between the two countries would continue.

"India's response has been positive and may be we will reach some decisions," Adhikari told reporters after talks with Prime Minister PV

Narasimha Rao. "In international dealings, we shouldn't expect that hundred per cent will be achieved in one go." Adhikari, Nepal's Marxist leader, who won power last year, said.

# Manzur murder: Hearing of case begins Apr 17

CHITTAGONG, April 11: The Chief Metropolitan Magistrate (CMM) here today set April 17 for hearing the case of Maj Gen Abul Manzur's alleged murder in 1981.

CMM Matiur Rahman announced the fresh date in the absence of the three retired army officers arrested in connection with the case, who were scheduled to be produced before the court today.

Maj Gen Abdul Latif, Lt Col Shamsur Rahman and Maj Kazi Emdadul Haq, detained in three separate jails, could not be produced before the court because of the countrywide strike enforced by the Sramik

Karmachhari Oikkiya Parisad (SKOP) and the Left Democratic Front (LDF).

Gen Latif is now being detained in the Dhaka jail, Col Rahman in Tangail jail and Maj Emdad in Comilla jail. The lawyers for Gen Latif

and Col Rahman today submit ted two separate petitions each for bail and retracting of the statements their clients made before a magistrate in Dhaka under Section 164 of the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC). The petitions are likely to be considered by the court in the presence of the detained soldiers on April 17. See Page 12 Col 6

# Gas fire kills housewife injures 14 in city

A housewife was killed and 14 others including three children were injured in an explosion that originated from a gas stove at a house in Rampura in the city yesterday.

Afia Khatoon, 45, died of serious burns soon after being admitted to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital. All the injured were hospitalised, two of them with first degree

According to sources, the explosion occurred early in the morning, at around five am at the ground floor of the twostoried building when Afia

Khatoon tried to light the stove with a matchstick Someone had left the stove knob open the night before and as soon as Afia struck the match the kitchen, filled with gas, just lit up like a bonfire

with a loud bang. Tongues of flames immediately spread, engulfing the entire ground-floor of 69 Ulan Road where three families resided

Among the injured the conditions of Kalpana. 22, and Altal, 25, were critical, medical sources said.

According to initial reports, Eskander Ali, 55, a jute mills workers, was killed when the tin roof of his house collapsed. Another 50 people were injured. Two hundred thatched houses were damaged and 63 electric poles uprooted.

### Shantibahini agrees to extend ceasefire

In its letter the Shantibahini demanded the release of 15 of their members who were arrested during the ceasefire by April 16.

# Age-old recruitment policy blamed for nurses' agitation

The grievances of the 18,000 diploma and student nurses across the country, who have just called off their indefinite strike, remain with their leaders unsure if their agitation would bear any fruit.

The nurses' leaders warned that they will go for a fresh action programme if the gov ernment fails to keep its commitments' which brought them back to work.

Leaders of the Bangladesh Diploma Nurses Association (BDNA) and the Bangladesh Diploma Student Nurses Union (BDSNU), talking to The Daily Star, said they are waiting for the government to fulfil the promises' made in the agreement singed on April 6 this month.

The nurses resumed work on April 7 after 20 days of nonstop strike following a written assurance from a top level government negotiating team comprising two ministers. According to sources con-

cerned, the root of the present problem dates back to the early forties. Faced with an acute shortage of literate female workers, the authorities had then recruited 'anyone' willing to work as a nurse. With a six-month training.
