# Aid Club meet begins in Paris today

The slowdown in the ongoing reform process is likely to come up for critical review at the 3-day Bangladesh Aid Consortium meeting which begins in the French capital today.

At the annual Paris Aid Club meet, the donor community is also expected to strongly advocate accelerating the pace of reforms to nudge the Bangladesh economy from macro stability towards a high growth path, while emphasising the need for maintaining political stability.

The Bangladesh delegation, on the other hand, is likely to highlight the achievements already made, particularly under an emerging 'democratic polity', while seeking continued support from the donor community for pushing ahead the remaining reform agenda.

Despite differences over the exact pace of the ongoing reforms, both the World Bank and the government earlier came up with similar estimates about the level of external assistance that would be required by Bangladesh in 1995-96 and placed the figure at over 1.8 billion US dollars. The Aid Club commitment last year stood at 2.1 billion dollars.





## Caution Notice

It is hereby notified for information of all concerned that some unscrupulous businessmen are illegally manufacturing so-called boilers secretly with low grade iron sheets and selling the same to various mill owners in different parts of the country including Greater Dhaka, Chittagong, Mymensingh, Dinajpur, Bogra & Rajshahi districts. Producing steams in such boilers is highly risky and hazardous. Any time it may burst leading to loss of life and property. Already bursting of such illegal boilers at quite a few industrial establishments has killed a number of people and caused huge loss to property. The news of these mishaps had been published in different newspapers. Under the circumstance, those who are engaged in manufacturing such illegal boiler and in producing steam in it, are cautioned to refrain from such illegal practice. Otherwise strict punitive action will be taken in accordance with the existing law of the

It is further notified for general information that if anyone kindly takes the initiative of informing the names & addresses of those engaged in such illegal boiler manufacture & use, the address of that kind person will be kept secret.

It is also further notified for general information that operation of uncertified unapproved boiler is a punishable offence in the eyes of law. Necessary steps have already been taken so that no gas connection is provided to uncertified & unapproved boiler. Titas Gas Co. & Bakhrabad Gas Co. have already started not to provide gas connection to or disconnect it from uncertified & unapproved boilers.

As per Boiler Operator Rules 1953, operation of boiler by anyone other than a person possessing certificate from "Boiler Operator Test Council," is a punishable offence. Hence it is cautioned not to operate boiler by anyone except a person possessing certificate from the said council. Those among the persons concerned with boiler operation have not yet appeared before the "Boiler Operator Test Council" are instructed to immediately appear before the said council.

Under the circumstance, in the national interest and in the interest of security of life & property concerned with boiler, the general public are cautioned to refrain from unapproved & illegal manufacture of boiler and its operation. Otherwise punitive action will be taken against the establishment & person concerned for the offence of violating the law.
