In a devastating fire at the Pearabagh slum at Maghbazar in 1993 alone, six children were killed and 200 shacks gutted.

As if birds with nests ray aged, the squatter-dwellers with all their scanty belongings set out on the streets of Dhaka to find a new home - and set up a new slum elsewhere.

Going back to their villages - a place they had left due to poverty, natural disasters or man-made causes - is an extended illusion that continue to delude the slum people.

'An estimated 20 lakh resi dents of some 1400 slums in the capital have virtually become citizens without rights. with their needs for better living ignored, according to sources in different government agencies and NGOs.
