The sixth World Cup will be played from February 14 to March 17 next year in India, Pakistan and Sri Lanka. It will have the biggest field ever with 12 nations participating.

The competing nations have been divided into two pools and the top four in each will qualify for the quarter-finals.

In Pool A are: India. Australia, Sri Lanka, the West Indies, Zimbabwe and Kenya. Pool B comprises England. South Africa, New Zealand. Pakistan, the Netherlands and the United Arab Emirates.

India will host 17 matches. including two quarter-finals and both semifinals. Sixteen matches, including two quarter-finals and the final, will be played in Pakistan. The third host nation. Sri Lanka, will be the venue for four preliminary

matches. In the past cricket matches on the subcontinent have often been disrupted by spectators invading the field and pelting

"Most venues on the subcontinent already have fencing around the playing arena to separate the players from the spectators," he said.






