

The highest rainfall recorded by the Met Office till 6 pm yesterday was 64mm in Teknaf followed by 56mm in Bhola, 31 mm in Patuakhali, 30mm each in Dhaka and Kutubdia, 26mm each in Sylhet and in Chittagong, 20mm in Satkhira, 17mm in Feni, 16mm in Barisal, 14mm in Chuadanga, 13mm in Comilla, and 36mm in Cox's

In Dhaka, the rainfall gladdened the city dwellers who welcomed the showers after a prolonged dry spell. It drizzled incessantly from the afternoon until the time of filing this report last night.


