Rehabilitate child labourers, demands BGSF

President of Bangladesh Garments Sramik Federation (BGSF) and Joint Secretary of Bangladesh Human Rights Coordination Council Mohannuad Khurshid Alam has deplored the garments factory owners' decision to terminate the services of all child labourers from the export-oriented industry by October 31.

In a statement yesterday, he resented that no programme regarding rehabilitation and education of the child labourers was undertaken.

"We came to know with deep concern and surprise that the owners of the garments industry in Bangladesh will totally eliminate child labour unilaterally by October 31 this year. No programme for the education and rehabilitation of these children was announced. This is heartbreaking and inhuman," the See Page 12 Col 5

Cabinet approves draft agreement with ROK

The Cabinet yesterday approved the proposal for signing agreement between Bangladesh and the Republic of Korea ROK in the field of science and technology, reports UNB.

An official announcement said the approval was given in a regular weekly meeting of the Cabinet, held at Bangabhaban with Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia in the chair.

The agreement is expected to be initialled during the Prime Minister's visit to South Korea, beginning Thursday. The Cabinet also endorsed

the draft bill titled Safety Aviation Against Air Crimes 1995. It aims at implementing in Bangladesh some international conventions prescribed for ensuring more safety for air-

Another proposal for time extension to supply Gewa wood to the Khulna Newspaper Mills and top-dying Sunday wood to Khulna Hardboard Mills upto June 1996 was okayed in the meeting.

The Cabinet approved yet another proposal for amending Section 13 (1) and 8 (6) of 1978 of the Ordinance of International Centre for Diarrheal Disease Research, Bangladesh (ICDDR.B).

Hanif for phased elimination of illegal rickshaws

The Mayor of the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) yesterday called for ridding the city streets of all unauthorised rickshaws whose numbers are swelling by leaps and bounds.

"They are clogging the streets and causing traffic chaos all over the city," Mohammad Hanif told UNB when his attention was drawn to an ongoing campaign against unlicenced rickshaws.

He said the City Corporation was even ready to issue more rickshaw licences, "but we must get rid of the unauthorised ones first." Hanif said apart from creat-

ing chaos on the streets, the problem of unauthorised rickshaws was that their number kept swelling beyond the man-

Awami League president Sheikh Hasma yesterday accused the BNP government of spending public money for its party activities, reports UNB.

"People's tax money is being spent for organisational activities of the BNP..." Hasina alleged while addressing a meeting at the Awami League central office in the afternoon.

The Awami League chief also accused the ruling party of profiting from the recent fertiliser crisis.

Hasina also blamed the government of killing 18 farmers. 17 workers and 55 businessmen and said that people's lives and property are not sale under the BNP government.

Referring to the prevailing political crisis, the opposition leader said this government is not at all sincereto resolve the crisis. It talks about a dialogue only to confuse the people, she
