The inter-district bus terminals and the city service bus depots in the capital have virtrally turned into havens for criminals, toll extortionists and smugglers for long, it is al-

Passengers are held hostages by a section of transport owners and workers who has literally established a state of anarchy at these bus stations with the help of professional hoodlums. Underhand dealings with law enforcing personnel are also widely alleged, sources in the bus stations pointed out.

If the alleged unholy alliance among the owners. workers, hooligans and a section of law enforcers is 'affected', it results in unrest in the transport sector causing sufferings to the passengers. insiders say. Besides, they add, disputes over the shares of huge amounts of tolls, collected illegally on various grounds, frequently lead to armed clashes and consequent stoppage of transport movement in different routes. Furthermore, insiders reveal organised gangs of transport operators sometimes opt for work stoppage whenever the passengers protest against

their misconduct Innocent passengers, especially those new in the city, are usually harassed by a section of transport workers. A stranger in the city's bus stations, especially the inter district ones. often face harassment from the transport workers, who even go to the extent of assaulting

them and often cheat them. It's not a rare scene at the bus terminals that several bus employees start pulling an innocent passenger from sides in their bid to carry him to their respective vehicles. And in their habitual reaction, the workers abuse the passenger


they have lost control over. Such practices increase manifold during the Eid periods when the bus stations

draw eight to ten times the usual number of passengers. The authorities seldom take steps to check such sorts of harassments to the passengers. The routine job of the authorities hardly benefit the victims since those deployed in aid of the passengers reportedly side with the transport workers in
