

Guidelines for a Future Bangladesh: Past Two Decades and the Current Decade? is the kind of book which should be read and reread by all who are concerned with different aspects of nation-building in various capacities - from policy formulation to implementation .

If one were to put one's finger on the drift of the ideas that interpenetrate the articles in the book and the proceedings of the national seminar where these were presented. one can do no better than quote from the English sum-

"Empowerment of the people is the key to poverty alleviation, removal of inequalities, establishment of the rule of law and the evolution of a genuine democracy. Power will not only emanate from the people, they must also retain and apply power within a democratic framework. The essential prerequisites for creating such a dispensation are education, training and organization/work-based programmes of action. The country belongs to the people. and the people must be in a position to exercise their legitimate rights and have the capability to contribute to the task of nation building."

There may be a certain gravity of tone about the passage excerpted, and it is in the fitness of things that it should be so, but between the lines there is also the cadence of hope, or at least of all hope not being lost.

Cosmos and Life: Attempting a Deeper Insight

Sristi Dharar Sandhane (In Quest for the Trend in Creation)

by Mahmud Haider

OSMOLOGY, creation of life on earth and its gradual evolution which has been undergoing 'transitional process' since the very beginning, have all along stirred man's area of thought, continuously adding new dimensions to the study in the field. Recent startling discoveries in these areas have not only added greatly to human knowledge but also changed his overall outlook regarding the universe.

Out of curiosity to have a deeper insight of universal mystery, mingled with humanistic outlook and fascination to poetry, Mahmud Haider has presented us his "Sristi Dharar Sandhane". Besides discussing the problems concerning the cosmology, evolution and destiny of man and the universe, the writer has highlighted the great message of religion in epitome form and included Bangla renderings of four poems of Tennyson. At the end. the writer has annexed a science fiction written in English. The items have been discussed under the three parts of the book.

The first part entitled 'Bishwa Barta' (the message of the universe) deals with the ancient philosophy-oriented science versus the modern science based on experimental and observational proofs, the story of creation, a brief chronological depiction of origin and development of human civilisation and highlight on space-bubble. The short piece on space-bubble can be of special interest to enthusiastic

readers of cosmology. It is a brief but comprehensive discussion encompassing latest findings and speculations in cosmology. Here the writer has tried to represent complex theories like pulsating universe and infinity of dimensions in a lucid and readable language for common readers.

However, the details of his statements, as M Shamser Ali asserts in the preface of the book, are not in all cases fully consistent with the theories of cosmology and origin of life on earth. Inspite of this, the writer's query and attempt to find the answers deserve appreciation. The second part entitled

'Manabata' (humanity) includes

and psychological aspects. In 'humanity' and 'human rights', the writer has tried to convey the basic teachings of religion from humanistic viewpoint. While too much inclination to the outward difference in customs and fanaticism in the name of religion make man detached from the internal spirit of the message of scriptures, genuine faith in God is reflected not in rituals, but in the service of the creation, striving for acquiring knowledge and widening of outlook towards humanity and nature.

The third part of the book under discussion includes Bangla versions of four poems of great English mystic poet Tennyson, whose poetry tends to manifest divine ecstasy. All of the four translated poems. as the writer has observed, revolve on a central idea, that is, flow of river (here river symbolises life) and its merging with the vast ocean, intrinsically the ultimate goal of which is communion with God. At the end, the writer has

added a science fiction entitled "Beyond this World", written in English. It is an amusing story, which the writer says may draw the attention of common readers and make them get greater interest in the first part of the book.

The contents of the book. although apparently detached from one another they may seem to be, reveal to us the inquisitive as well as philanthropic mind of the writer.
