Time for voter registration extended

The Election Commission (EC) has extended the time limit for voter registration by three more days till Saturday to complete the enrollment of voters across the country, reports UNB.

Earlier, the commission had extended the time limit by one week which expires today. Voters' registration started on May 25 and was scheduled to be completed by May 31.

An EC source said about 90 per cent of an estimated 5.70 crore adults based on the last population census had so far been registered by some 3.20 lakh enumerators across the country.

50 feared drowned in Hooghly river

NEW DELHI. June 6: More than 50 passengers were leared drowned in the Hooghly river in India's West Benga state today after their overloaded boat capsized, the United News of India (UNI) said, reports Reuter.

The agency quoted official sources as saying the boat was carrying more than 100 people illegally across the river after the local ferry service was suspended last week due to the collapse of the jetty near the town of Haldia.

Garments: Talks on revised MOU today

A scheduled meeting to discuss the formulation of a revised memorandum of understanding (MOU) to eliminate child labour from the country's garment sector, was deferred yesterday.

The meeting has been rescheduled for today and sources said that further discussions on the outstanding issues would be held an a revised MOU would take a little more time to be finalised.

The meeting among all the negotiating parties, including the US embassy, the Unicef. ILO and the Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Ex porters' Association (BGMEA), is likely to start at 4 pm today.

A well-placed source, when asked if there was a possibility of a revised MOU being finalised at today's meeting. said: "Drafting a revised MOU will take a little more time and once a draft is prepared the government will be informed, because the government will also be a part of it this time around."

The move to negotiate a revised MOU was initiated after the BGMEA, in an extraordinary general meeting on May 17, rejected the draft understanding reached earlier. The BGMEA. instead, unilaterally announced its plans to total by eliminate child labour from the garment sector by October 31, 1995.

A BGMEA source hinted that the Association's negotiat-

ing team, led by its President Redwan Ahmed, MP, would be able to sign the revised MOU if it is formulated within the ambit of the resolution passed at its EGM.

Mining rules being simplified

to attract investment

The country's mining rules committee included representatives from the ministries of energy and mineral resources. finance, law and environment and forests, the Geological Survey of Bangladesh and

Petrobangla A source in the Energy Ministry said that the amendments to the mining rules formulated 27 years ago had become imperative to make them consistent with the government's economic policy as well as to promote investments.

"We feel the necessity of updated rules to meet the present-days need since large scale mining activities firms are keen to invest," said an official of the Energy Ministry.

Under the proposed amendments, some rigid provisions, such as incorporation of foreign firms as companies in Bangladesh for exploration of minerals will be waived. The foreign companies will be allowed to explore minerals opening a branch office in the country. However, they will have to set up a company here for extraction and marketing

of the minerals discovered. Presently, the government allows a firm to explore minerals in a single plot having a maximum area of 800 hectares. The Energy Ministry has proposed to increase the area to 4000 hectares to facili tate more exploration activi-
