

Unforgivable error

NORTH VANCOUVER, Briish Columbia, June 6: A cricket player who took off his helmet because of the heat died when hit in the head by pitch, reports AP

Greg Hobson, 21, of North Vancouver is the first person to be killed during a cricket match in Canada, said Ben Seebaran, president of the British Columbia Cricket As sociation.

Hobson was struck with ball delivered by a member of the Vancouver Meralomas in first-division match Saturday.

His twin brother Wayne also a member of the North Shore team, joined players from both teams who tried to revive Hobson before an ambu lance arrived. He was pro nounced dead at hospital.

"The ball bounced up towards his face and he instinc tively turned his head to the side and was hit in the base of the skull just behind his ear." said Greg Hobson's father

Batsmen rarely wear helmets in Vancouver cricket games, though it is more common in the higher divisions where bowlers are especially fast. The cricket ball, made of leather, is considered the hardest ball in any sport.

Seebaran, who did not see the accident, said Hobson usually wore a helmet.
