Samaranch may survive



BUDAPEST, June 18: The International Olympic Committee performed a gold medal back flip

on Sunday and voted to hand IOC president Juan Antonio Samaranch the chance of a fourth term in office, reports Reuter.

Only three days after Samaranch suffered a stinging defeat over plans to scrap an age limit of 75, the Spaniard's closest IOC allies whipped up support for an age limit of 80 that could keep him in power until 2001. Under the old rules, the 74-year-old would have had to retire in 1997 at the end of his current term.

But Samaranch said he would make no decision on whether to run again until after next year's Atlanta Olympics and promised any rivals seven or eight months to campaign against him. "Now I have the possibil-

ity to run again in 1997, but I know my age and I'll make the final decision at the end of next year," Samaranch told a news conference at the end of a week of IOC meetings in Budapest.

"I have to be very frank with you, but I enjoy very much what I am doing," he




