New curriculum for SSC, HSC from next year By Morshed Ali Khan

A total of nearly 24 lakh students and more than 40,000 teachers will be directly involved in adopting the forthcoming changes.

A massive teachers' training programme will begin soon, according to the

Writing of text books as per the new curriculum will begin after selection of authors. One hundred twenty authors have been selected, the sources said. "The selection of authors has been done through marking system", according to Tawfique Khan Mailis, assistant programme director of the Higher Sec ondary Education Project (HSEP) "Qualifications, research work, and expansion have been taken into ac-

count' Meanwhile teachers, educationists and experts from across the country recently completed a three-week discussion on the draft curriculum at the Bangladesh Academy of Rural Development (BARD) at Kotbari, Comilla

The discussants alleged that the contents of the new syllabus were at least four times bigger than the existing one and it would pose a serious problem to the students as well as teachers.

S M Noor Mohammad, a lecturer of political science of the Tolaram College, Narayangani said, "The paper was prepared by people who were not aware of the existing problems of our students" "The level has been upgraded too much and in my paper there are 26 chapters. It won't be possible to follow the syllabus in details."
