Gooch one short of Bradman

LONDON, June 24: Former England all-rounder David Capel smashed a career-best 175 as leaders Northamptonshire stayed on course to claim their sixth successive county championship victory against Leices tershire on Friday, reports

Capel hit two sixes and 27 fours to guide his side to 564 - their third highest total ever in first-class cricket before Leicester slipped to 48 for three.

But skipper Nigel Briers rescued his side with a 137 run stand with Ben Smith to lift them to 185 for four at the close, still a daunting 379 adrift.

Graham Gooch moved to within one century of Sir Donald Bradman's career record of 117 as Essex struggled in their match with Lancashire.

in The former England captain hit 12 fours and two sixes to finish unbeaten on 145 — the 116th first-class hundred of his career - as Essex reached 190 for four.

They still need another 157 to avoid the follow-on after Lancashire piled up a commanding 496, with skipper Mike Watkinson hitting a career-best 161

Nadeem Shahid, who left Essex in the winter to join Surrey, brought his new county back into contention against Glamorgan by scoring

Surrey were in danger of following on after bowling out Glamorgan for 450 and then slipping to 121 for five, but Shahid teamed up with Adam Hollioake in a 149-run stand to help them reach 391 for

Tim Robinson led Nottinghamshire's solid reply to Kent's record-breaking firstinnings total of 533.

The former England batsman moved to within eight runs of his fourth century of the season to help Notts reach 201 for two by the close, leaving them a further 183 runs short of the followon target. Yorkshire openers Martin

Moxon and Michael Vaughan rescued some pride against champions Warwickshire with an unbroken 115-run stand.

Warwickshire built up a commanding 449 after bowling out Yorkshire for 96 on Thursday, but Vaughan finished unbeaten on 56 and Moxon survived a painful blow on his recently-injured thumb to reach 36.

Euro Basketball Championship

Croatia circumvent Russia

ATHENS, June 24: NBA prospect Arijan Komazec notched an impressive 30 points to lead Croatia to a bruising 100-94 overtime victory over Russia in a European basketball championship clash on Friday, reports Reuter.

The decisive Pool B victory made Croatia favourite for the gold medal along with Yugoslavia who beat Lithuania 70-61 earlier in the day in the top Pool A clash.

The Croats led throughout the match by as much as 10 points but a Russian recovery, inspired by guard Serbei Babkov (27 points) four minutes before time, tied the duel

Croatia took a two-point

lead in the dying seconds of the match but a clinical double by guard Vasili Karasev two seconds before time tied the Russians again 81-81 and the match went to overtime.

Komazec then took over to net eight vital free throws which gave the Croats their second straight win in the tournament after beating Slovenia 91-83 on Thursday.

Dino Radia of the Boston Celtics contributed 18 points for the Croats and Toni Kukoc of the Chicago Bulls added another 17. Croat pivot Stojan Vrankovic dominated the boards pulling down 10 rebounds.

It was sweet revenge for Croatia who lost to the Russians in last August's World Championship in Toronto, condemning them to the bronze medal. The Russians were silver medalists, losing in the final to the United States.

Playmaker Sergei Bazarevich and guard Igor Mudelin shared 15 points each for Russia who were forced to their first defeat after wins over Finland and France.

In the top clash of Pool A, 1990 world champions Yugoslavia beat Lithuania readily to underline their determinations for a glorious comeback after a three-year absence from international play because of United Nations sanctions.

They relied on the talent

and strength of guard Aleksandar Djordievic (18 points) and Los Angeles Lakers forward Vlade Divac (14) to win the match.

After a nervous start where the Yugoslavs led by as much as 13 points, Lithuania gradually cut the lead to six (35-29) at the interval and tied the match 35-35 two minutes into the second half.

Giant pivot Arvidas Sabonis used his 2.21 metres under the boards to keep his team ahead 48-46 midway through the second half but, the Lithuanian recovery ended there.

Djordjevic then took over

to lead Yugoslavia to its second straight victory sinking two straight triples. Zeljko Rebraca and Divac added two more baskets to put their team ahead 63-59 two minutes before time.

The Lithuanians then fouled deliberately to stop the clock but Djordjevic converted one free throw after the other for the final 70-61.

Djordjevic top scored for Yugoslavia with 18 points and Divac contributed 14. Sarunas Marculionis of the Seattle Supersonics netted 22 points, including three triples, for Lithuania and Sabonis added another 18.

Cantona ad to be probed

LONDON, June 24: Consumer watchdogs are investigating advertiséments for a soccer video game which glorify Eric Cantona's attack on a Crystal Palace supporter, reports AFP.

Posters for Fever Pitch Soccer show a caricature of the Manchester United star aiming a flying kick at a shaven-headed fan.

Other advertising for the game features characters called 'ernie le striker container, Jergan the cheat divermann" who appears to be based on former Tottenham striker Juergen Klinsmann, and "barry ten bellies barger' - thought to be based on Paul Gascoigne

None of the characters actually appear in the game, which is produced by Birmingham-based US Gold and is due to go on sale later this month.

The Video Standards Council said it would examine the advertisements and may ask the Advertising Standards Authority to investigate.

Football Association officials, who have dismissed the advertisements as "beneath contempt", are also thought to be considering making a complaint to the ASA. Geoff Brown, chief execu-

tive of US Gold, defended the ads, saying on Friday they were meant to be witty and appeal to youngsters. The company had received no complaints, he said.


