

Hamad's seizure of power was largely symbolic. He has effectively been running the oil-exporting country for more than a decade.

The nation has a long history of power struggles within the ruling family, going back to its days as a British protectorate before 1971. Hamad's father, Khalifa Bin Hamad Al-I hani, seized power from his cousin Ahmed in 1972.

### Govt misusing relief fund, says Hasina

SYLHET, June 27: Awami League president Sheikh Hasina today blasted the government for not distributing relief materials properly in the flood affected areas, reports

"The government is misappropriating the relief fund ... Ministers and MPs have been given Tk 25 lakh for distribution among the disaster-hit people, but they have misused the money," she told a public meeting at the Companigani Thana Parishad

Hasina visited the remote areas of Sylhet and Sunamganj districts and inquired about the condition of the flood affected people who complained that scarcity of relief materials had added to their sufferings.

She addressed two public meetings at Companiganj in Sylhet and Chhatak and several spontaneous gatherings in the flood-hit areas.

### BNP stalwarts want to go by Constitution

Ruling party stalwarts are against staggering the issue of 90 days' continuous absence from the House by the Opposition MPs, believing it would be wiser to go by the Consti-

In a meeting with party chairperson and Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia at her office yesterday, senior cabinet members were said to be agreed that any extra-constitutional measure may be challenged in court which, in turn, may affect the entire politics including the next general elections.

"Should a court verdict go against the BNP's decision the image of the party would suffer," one minister told the meeting. "The Speaker should go by the Constitution.

According to the Constitution, a member of Parliament automatically loses his seat for remaining absent for 90

consecutive sittings of the Jatiya Sangsad without leave of absence from the House.

The Opposition MPs who have been boycotting JS ses-sions since March 1 last year have now stayed away for more than the permissible limit, which was crossed on June 19, the second day of the current budget session of the Fifth Parliament.

A BNP leader who attended the meeting, held at the PM's Teigaon office, said that a proposal suggesting the President seek an interpretation of the exact legal position on the issue from the Supreme Court was also discussed. But most of the senior ministers felt that it would not be proper for the Prime Minister to advise the President to seek the help of the highest court. Under Article 106 of the

### Speaker risking his credibility

The Honourable Speaker has no reason to delay informing the House about the fact that all the opposition MPs have crossed the 90-day limit on absenting themselves from the Parliament. Our Constitution, in Article 67(1)(a) clearly states that continuous days of absence by a member, without leave of the Parliament, will lead to automatic cancellation of his or her seat Article 178 of the Rules of Procedure of the Parliament unambiguously enjoins the Speaker to inform the House about it. Leaving aside the circumstances that preceded this event = and some may say, because of them - the Speaker should consider it to be his foremost duty, to inform the House immediately.

Yet he seems to be in no hurry to proceed in this matter. Why? We are being forced to think that it is because of political expediency. More this impression is getting currency, more is the Speaker losing credibility. His exalted status is slowly but surely being shorn of its position of being above partisan politics. This, we think, is causing a serious damage to the image of the office of the Speaker. His position as the ultimate upholder of ethics and fairplay now stands substantially When the Constitution is

very clear, and when he knows that the Rules of Procedure does not give any scope for interpretation — as, some may say, the resignation

situation did — then why is he jeopardising the prestige of his office, the credibility of his person, and the effectiveness of his role in the future, by delaying what he has no option but of doing.

There are few institutions as prestigious as that of the Speaker of the Parliament. Anyone who holds that office enjoys a supreme place in the hearts and minds of the people. There is immense veneration and high honour and dignity for that office, and for the person that occupies it. The nation expects the Speaker to uphold the letter and the spirit of the Constitution at all times, and under all circumstances. They expect the Speaker to be above

### Elimination of child labour

### Revised MOU to be signed Tuesday

The formal signing of the revised memorandum of understanding (MOU) to eliminate child labour from the country's garment sector is scheduled for Tuesday next.

According to official sources, signatories to the proposed MOU include the Unicef, the ILO and the Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters' Association (BGMEA)

The Government and the US embassy would remain as observers. However, an inter-ministe-

rial meeting earlier this week reviewed the draft and decided to seek some minor amendments. The Government is willing to cooperate in the implementation of the MOU provisions, but is reluctant to be "directly" involved in the process, the sources

Last week, the BGMEA executive committee had approved the revised draft of the MOU, which incorporates provisions for rehabilitating the retrenched children and for setting up an independent monitoring system to verify

# compliance with the proposed

ban on the use of child labour The Unicet, under the agreement, would coordinate

the rehabilitation programme for the children under 14 years of age currently working in the garment factories. It would include a schooling programme and a Tk 300 per month allowance for each individual child. The Unicef may initiate the involvement of NGOs to administer the programme at a later date.

The proposed MOU also stipulates the creation of a fund for the rehabilitation programme with contribution from the BGMEA, Unicef and the US government, the sources said

The ILO is expected to take up the role of monitoring compliance with the ban of the use of children in the garment factories.

The signing of the proposed MOU would bring to an end a crisis situation which began after the BGMEA rejected an earlier draft on May 17. The association's mem-

# Growth in industrial sector

Rahman in the preface of the review said," This Review is the first document of the gov ernment's policy-reform activities of the last few years. Although it is brief, the review states the latest economic data and gives an appropriate analysis.

The review said industries sector achieved the highest growth of 10 per cent during 94-95 as against 2.4 per cent in 90-91 but in agriculture sector the growth declined to 0.2 per cent from 1.6 in 90-91. The growth of large scale industry is 13 per cent, which was only 2 per cent in 90-91, and that of small industries it is 5 per cent as against 2.9 in 90-91.

In agriculture, growth of

crops declined to - (minus) 2 per cent in 94-95 from 1.2 in 90-91. However, under this sector forestry, livestock and fisheries marked notable growths. Growth in mineral re-

sources sector declined to 13.1 per cent from 90-91's 21.2. Power, gas, water and sanitation services declined to 15.0 per cent from 90-91's 20.6 and public administration and defence to 9 per cent from 9.7. Growth in construction increased to 6.5 per cent from

4.5 in 90-91, transportation to 6 per cent from 3.1, commercial services to 6 per cent from 3.9, housing to 5 from 3.4, bank and insurance to 4 See Page 12 Col 7
