# Quality service a far cry

The problem of health care in the city is not as much of physical infrastructures as it is of service standard.

In recent years the government mobilized more resources for development of medicare facilities in line with its plan for attaining 'Health for All by the Year 2000. But, the question of quality service remains unanswered.

People complaining about poor services in city hospitals and clinics is a common thing. To improve the services the government launched a special programme carly this year at the Dhaka Medical

College Hospital (DMCH). But, shockingly, the move tumbled due to protests by a section of the hospital staff who smelt a denationalization motive behind it.

The special programme styled 'Centre for Management Excellence and Quality Assurance' (CMEQA) was funded by the World Health Organization (WHO) after a study by a team of local experts last year.

Shop owner shot

One person was shot dead while three others were killed in road accidents in various parts of the city yesterday.

Another person, aged 25, was killed when a tempo knocked him down at Kazi Nazrul Islam Road at around 5:30 am.

Mamun, 15, wounded after falling from a running bus near the Cantonment Rail Station on Sunday, succumbed to his injuries at the DMCH yesterday.

member of the WHO funded study group, who teaches biochemistry in a government medical college and preferred not to be named.

The CMEQA programme was aimed at decentralization of hospital administration, reduction of waiting time' for patients, ensuring hygienic atmosphere and improving the quality of diet and management efficiency.

There was a plan to introduce the programme in other hospitals of the country after its success at the DMCH.

On an average, the number of indoor patients at the Dhaka Medical College Hospital stands around 1400 against its bed capacity of 1,000.

"There are some 1,500 class III and class IX employees at the DMCH as against an average of 1,400 patients. But, atmosphere in the hospital is unhealthy because of inefficient waste disposal," Serajul Haq. Deputy Minister for Health and Family Welfare told The Daily Star recently.

#### Hearing of writ continues

### Justice Rouf held 2 posts simultaneously, court told

Justice Mohammad Abdur Rouf held two posts simultaneously by an order of the then acting President and it (order) gets full protection of the 11th Amendment to the Constitution, said a government pleader, reports UNB.

Putting up the argument before a High Court Bench yesterday, Additional Attorney General Abdul Wadud Bhuiyan said all orders passed by acting President Justice Shahabuddin Ahmed were ratified and declared to have been validly made by the 11th amendment.

He was placing his arguments on a writ petition challenging the holding of two constitutional posts the Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) and a judge in a High Court Division—by Justice Rouf.

The writ was filed by Advocate M Saleem Ullah on July 11 last year and court issued rule nisi. Earlier, petitioner's lawyer Advocate M I Farooqui concluded his sub-

Wadud Bhuiyan argued, since the terms of appointment of Justice Rouf as the Chief Election Commissioner provide that he shall be deemed to be in actual service of a judge, shall get the benefits of a judge and be entitled to resume his office of the judge, it was a valid order as per Article 118 (5) of the Constitution and declared to

have been validly made by the 11th Amendment of the Constitution.

The terms of appointment of Justice Rouf were not liable to challenge unless the petitioner can establish that the 11th Amendment has destroyed the basic structure of the Constitution.

He cited the decision of the Appellate Division on the 8th Amendment and submitted that the 11th Amendment didn't destroy any of the basic features of the Constitu-

"This is a message to the whole world and not only Egypt that nothing will stop Sudan from completing its path despite plots by the enemies," the letter said.

Sudan has been mentioning Nile river waters while restating its claim to Halaib, a disputed triangle of land on the Egyptian-Sudan border. Egypt was awarded the area under a 1899 British accords but in 1902 it gave Sudan administrative control.

Sudan said yesterday that Egypt is massing troops in and around the disputed Halaib triangle prior to launching a military offensive to fully annex the area on the Red Sea border.

### Foreign micro-enterprise developers exchange ideas

A 15-member team of mioften neglected aspect of many Asian economies, leader of the team Mark Otter was quoted as saying. "While the details vary

from country to country, Micro-enterprises are operated by poor people who are on the fringes of the formal economy," said Otter, adding, recent studies suggest this informal sector accounts for between 30 and 60 per cent of the economically active population in developing countries particularly in Asia.

According to Otter, a programme officer with the Brisbane-based independent research organisation promoting international development cooperation, promotion of MED operation is a useful development strategy because it contributes directly to poverty alleviation, rather than relying on sometimes dubious 'trickledown' associated with large scale capital development.

"It is the best example of participatory or 'bottom-up' development, not requiring massive administrative bureaucracies," he said. It can be done by people with little or no education who can make a modest living on their own initiative, he added.

As many as 75,469 crimes were committed across the country in the year 1994, Home Minister Abdul Matin Choudhury told the Jatiya Sangsad yesterday. The accounts were based on police records.

Cases were filed against 2,65,965 persons and 78,851 of them were arrested. Of them, 1574 persons were arrested on charge of repressing women.

Replying to a question from Major (retd) Akhteruzzaman, the Home Minister said 68,726 of the cases filed in connection with the incidents were disposed of. None was held without trial, he added.

During the period, 12,799 acts of crime were recorded with the Dhaka Metropolitan Police, 2,109 with the Chittagong Metropolitan Police, 1,160 with the Khulna Metropolitan Police and 785 with the Rajshahi Metropolitan Police.
