Graf regains Wimbledon crown





He now plays defending champion Pete Sampras who beat Goran Ivanisevic 7-6 (9-7), 4-6, 6-3, 4-6, 6-3 in a gruelling power-match which contained 59 aces - 38 of them coming from the 6ft 4in (1m94) Croatian. Becker, who had lost eight of 11






