US press hails MOU on child labour

The press in the United States has welcomed the recent memorandum of understanding (MOU) singed in Dhaka on gradual phasing out of child labour from garments industry and has reported positive impact of this in the American market, reports BSS.

"Boycott of Bangladesh textiles dropped after the child labour deal" was the caption of a prominent report in the 'Journal of Commerce' coming out from New York as the paper reported favourable trend in the United States following the signing of the MOU

"The Child Labour Coalition called off a boycott of Bangladesh textile and apparel products as the South Asian nations' garments industry agreed to phase out the employ ment of children under the age of 14, the journal said.

"This is an agreement that is as good as can be gotten" the report quoted Pharis J Harvey, co-chairman of the coalition, the Washington based collection of more than 40 human rights, unions, religious and consumers groups.

The United States is the largest market of Bangladeshi garments and the campaign against the use of child labour in Bangladesh garments industry by certain quarters in the United States had threatened smooth export of these garments to the United

The signing of the MOU by the **Bangladesh Garments Manufacturers** and Exporters Association (BGMEA), the UNICEF and the ILO on phasing out the under-aged and sending them to school has come in for praise from various quarters.

The recent signing of the MOU set at rest all speculations about the export of Bangladeshi garments to the American market. This is the first such agreement on the issue in the world" Foreign Minister A S M Mostafizur Rahman, who was the chief guest on the signing ceremony said on the occasion.

The "Journal of Commerce" also referred to the reactions in other relevant quarters in the United States on the MOU and said all have welcomed the development.

Islami Bank may launch rural dev scheme soon

Islami Bank Bangladesh Ltd is likely to launch a rural development scheme from this month with a view to establishing ideal and model villages in the country.

In an interview with The Daily Star, a senior official of the bank said the scheme is in the final stage.

He said the main objective of the programme is to create employment opportunities for unemployed rural youths and destitutes. It will also assist landless-assetless people to contribute to alleviate rural poverty. Under the scheme, the selected

branches of the bank will work to develop model villages through integrated investment. It will also provide fund for agricultural production, pisciculture and all types of off-farm activities.

Funds will also be made available for irrigation, agricultural and irrigation equipment, rickshaw, rickshaw-

van, rural transport, hand-tubewells and house-building materials.

Initially, the programme will be launched in 18 districts through 21 branches. Each branch will cover villages within 15 square miles of its surrounding area. The programme will be expanded gradually all over the coun-

The scheme will cover the districts of Dhaka, Chittagong, Narshingdi, Gazipur, Narayanganj, Jamalpur, Pabna, Bhola, Gaibandha, Manikgani, Bogra, Tangail, Chandpur, Rangpur, Naogaon, Sirajganj, Feni, and Noakhali.

According to bank sources, people who will be covered under the programme are farmers owning a maximum two acres of land, landless people engaged in off-farming activities, and tenant farmers.

The investment client must be a permanent inhabitant of the village.

Loan-defaulters of any financial institution will not be allowed to avail themselves of the investment opportunity in any way.


To disburse and recover the loans, a group of investment clients will be formed with five people from the same professional class. A larger group will be formed in case of investment.

These groups will help select borrowers, disburse and recover loans.

Against disbursed loans, the bank will collect an approximate profit of six per cent, supervision cost four per cent, contribution to risk fund two per cent per annum, compulsory sav-

ings Tk five and contribution to group fund Tk two in each week.

Moreover, bank supervisors will be appointed to operate, monitor, and control activities of the investment client.

Asia for greater EU market access NEW DELHI, July 13: Europe

should not impose hidden trade barriers on developing countries and should grant greater market access to Asian nations, a senior Indian official said vesterday. "If the European Union insists on antidumping investigations and stiff rules on packaging it will mean keeping the products of developing nations out of the European market," said Commerce Minister Palaniappan Chidambaram. He told a seminar on Indo-European trade here that Europe must give India more time to adjust to quality and other standards set by the European Union, reports AFP.

German, Chinese cos sign \$3.1b deals

BONN, July 13: German and Chinese firms today signed business deals which China's Foreign Minister Qian Qichen said were worth around 3.1 billion dollars. The signing was the centrepiece of a fiveday official visit to Germany by a Chinese delegation headed by President Jiang Zemin. In the biggest deal, Mercedes-Benz, the automotive unit of Daimler-Benz Ag, will hold 45 per cent of a joint company to produce 60,000 luxury vans and 100,000 diesel and petrol engines a year, reports Reuter.

Tatarstan ignores Russian budget MOSCOW, July 13: The oil-rich

republic of Tatarstan has decided to halt its contributions to the Russian federal budget temporarily due to Moscow's failure to pay for military hardware, the republic's Prime Minister Farid Mukhametshin said vesterday. The Russian ministry for the defence industry owes enterprises in Tatarstan 96 billion roubles (19.2 million dollars) for military hardware produced last year, said Mukhametshin, quoted by Itar Tass news agency, reports

Russia's GDP falls by 4 pc in 6 months MOSCOW, July 13: Russia's

Gross Domestic Product (GDP) fell by four per cent in the six first months of the year, while industrial output was down seven per cent. the State Statistics Office said yesterday. Although negative, the new figures in fact showed the rate of decline of Russia's output halting and even turning into growth, observers noted, reports AFP.

Yugoslav economy stabilises'

BELGRADE, July 13: Three years of trade sanctions have flattened rump Yugoslavia's economy, but the country's top central banker said on Wednesday the situation has stabilised and rapid recovery is on the cards once the embargo ends. Dragoslav Averamovic, the bank's governor who masterminded the programme that rescued the country from one of history's worst bouts of hyperinflation, said in an interview he was confident that inflation had been beaten back for good, reports Reuter.


