Seles won eight Grand Slam titles, including two US Opens in a row, before she was stabbed April 30, 1993 in Hamburg, Germany.

She was ranked number one in the world when the stabbing occurred, but has since dropped out of the rankings.

A proposal to co-rank her at number one upon her return to competition was rejected by several top players at a WTA tour meeting during Wimbledon, although WTA tour president Martina Navratilova, now retired from singles play, was in favour of the special status. Seles will launch her comeback

with an exhibition match against Navratilova on July 29 in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Her competition schedule after that is not yet known.

However, Passarella overlooked the enormous improvement made by the United States in the past two years, their progress being underlined by wins over England two years ago and Colombia in the World Cup last

With striker Gabriel Batistuta,

who scored 26 goals for Fiorentina in the Italian Championship last season, suffering a miserable night, missing several easy chances, Argentina were

beaten 3-0. That pushed them into second place and they now face a trip to Rivera where they will take on a Brazil side who have improved with every

After needing late goals to overcome Ecuador 1-0 and Peru 2-0, the world champions steamrollered Colombia 3-0 for their eighth succes-

sive victory. A bout of flu appeared to have helped coach Mario Zagalo find his best side. Defender Ronaldao and midfielder Zinho were sidelined against Colombia and their replacements both performed well.


