Bright prospect for export of agri products: WB

By Rashed Mahmud Titumir

The World Bank sees potential for Bangladesh to break into new agricultural product market overseas against the backdrop of 'low level of non-traditional agricultural production for export from the country now.

This was contained in a World Bank report -Agricultural Diversification: Issues and Prospects - now being finalised by the Bangladesh Agricultural Diversification Mission of the

The report finds "A comparative advantage in producing a number of agricultural commodities for export including high-value fruits and vegetables - both fresh and

processed — for high income consumer markets and traditional ones for expatriate Bangladeshi communities," a highly placed WB source said.

Referring to the varying degree of market sophistication after 'successful' seizing of today's international market opportunities, the report, however, notes that those are "currently uncommon in Bangladesh."

Pointing to the presence of a few Bangladeshi entrepreneurs, who have launched or are considering non-traditional agricultural export, the report, suggests that "the high level of risk and broad number of constraints can be surmounted."

"Bangladesh's recent success in developing its aquacultural export is testimony to what can be accomplished with concerted effort", says the report, adding, "(she) can also learn from the experi-

ence of other countries." The report cited the example of Taiwan's agriculture which, it said, has shifted from one dominated by rice to one dominated by highvalue horticulture, livestock, and fish products in response to change in domestic and international consumption patterns.

Move to gear up DSE functioning

The government has decided to separate operational management of the Dhaka Stock Exchange (DSE) from the policymaking function in a move to revamp the country's lone bourse, dogged by complaints of irregularities. reports UNB.

The decision was taken at the second meeting of the Advisory Committee of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) yesterday to bring more accountability and transparency in the DSE. said a source at the Ministry of Finance.

Chief Executive Officer will be heading the operational management while the DSE Council will be responsible for policymaking.

Currently, the DSE Chairman is also ex-officio chief executive of the stock ex-- Star photo by Anisur Rahman

Presided over by Finance Minister Saifur Rahman, the meeting also issued a December 31 ultimatum to dormant DSE members to be active or to risk loss of membership.

The Stock Exchange has long been facing criticism that a large number of its members are inactive.

The matter came under critical scrutiny at the meeting. Out of the total 195 DSE members, only 120 are now participating in trading and the rest remain out of busi-

Nestle plans to expand manufacturing base

Nestle S. A. plans to furher expand its manufacturing base in Bangladesh in the near luture, said MWO Garrett, the visiting Executive Vice President of the Switzerland-based multinational company

"We already import a wide range of (Nestle) products and step by step we would like to extend our manufacturing base in Bangladesh." he added. "We are taking a long term view and we would like to build it as a substantial market within the Asian framework.

Last year the giant multinational commissioned a 10million US dollar manufacturing plant in Bangladesh under a joint venture with Transcom Ltd., the sole distributor of Nestle products in the country. Located at Sreepur in Gazipur district, the factory products sweetened condensed milk and repacks imported milk powder and infant cereals.

In an interview with The Daily Star yesterday at his hotel suit. Garrett observed that the Bangladesh market has "very big" potentials and identified three reasons for it: A big population: a growing buying power of the consumers: and, most importantly the country's commitment towards a free-mar-

Take tough line on 'illegal' structures

The World Bank has strongly advocated dealing firmly with unscrupulous people trying to realise undue resettlement benefits by erecting "illegal and speculation structures" on the Jamuna bridge sites, reports

I lood-affected people taking shelter at a high school at Marda in the city waiting for relief

A note sent to the government last week by a World Bank review mission that visited Bangladesh in May cautioned that giving in to the illegal compensation seekers would be a "dangerous precedence" and make future land acquisitions difficult.

The World Bank further warned that future infrastructure projects in Bangladesh some of them are due to come up in the same districts (Sirajganj and Tangail) might have to face similar hurdle if such practice is endorsed in the case of the Jamuna bridge project.

Parliament has already passed a law empowering the district administration to resist attempts of building structures overnight on the Jamuna bridge site with ill motive to get compensation The law, JMBA Land Acquisition Bill 1995, was passed on July 3

The World Bank mission's note also indicated that the bank still remained concerned at the large-scale erection of 'speculation structures' on the West end side of the under-construction Jamuna bridge and on a char land to be acquired in the process of construction.

It estimated that close to 10,000 speculative structures have been built in recent month on the West end side of the bridge and on the char The mission forecast a


heavy burden on the project cost if all those speculative structures are compensated. Based on the rate paid on the East end side, it estimated acquisition of those structures on the West side could amount to as much as 15-20 million US dollars. The World Bank mission

insisted on immediate steps on identifying speculation structures setting a new "cutoff" date. It preferred the June 1994 inauguration ceremony to be the 'cut-off' date. It also recommended to prepare, in consultation with

the Union Parishads, a list of households living on the land at the time of the June 1994 The mission has even asked to keep pending the
