ROME, July 17: Diego Maradona has told an Italian newspaper that his positive dope test at the 1994 World Cup was the result of "misunderstanding" or trap" and added that FIFA had wanted Brazil to win the competition all along, reports Reuter.

"I swear to you, as I have sworn on the heads of my daughters, that I wasn't doped," the Argentine told Daily La Stampa in an interview published today, the first anniversary of Brazil's victory over Italy in the final in the Rose Bowl, Pasadena. "It must have been

misunderstanding, Or if not a genuine misunderstanding, a trap," added Maradona thrown out of the tournament during the opening round after testing positive for a cocktail of banned stimulants.

Maradona, who is set to make a comeback with Ar gentine club Boca Juniors when his 15-month suspension expires in September said that both the American authorities and FIFA had reasons to frame him.

"It's true that my sympa thies for (Cuban leader Fidel) Castro irritated the Americans. And then FIFA as a whole was supporting Brazil. he added.

LONDON, July 17: Cleve don Town said on Monday that England soccer legend Sir Stanley Matthews will no be playing for them in a friendly match this month contradicting an announcement they made on Friday that he would do so, reports Reuter.

"It's all become rather embarrassing," said Steve Fey, the manager of the Minor League club from the west of England.

"The idea that Sir Stanley might play was a very tongue in-check comment - after all, he is 80. However we do not want the public to be disappointed at not seeing him playing and Sir Stanley has asked me to clarify the posi tion."

Last Friday Fey said that Matthews, one of the all-time greats of English soccer and still fit and sprightly at 80, would play for them for 15 minutes in a friendly match against second division Bristol City on July 30.

Fey met Sir Stanley when he spoke at a dinner in the Somerset town earlier in the summer.

On Friday Fey said he asked Matthews to play in the match, adding: "It was a bit cheeky but as a joke asked him if he would consider signing on as a player for us," said Fey.

BIRMINGHAM. England. July 17: Britain's world 400 metres hurdles champion Sally Gunnell said on Sunday she would not defend her title in Gothenburg next month because of injury, reports Reuter.

Gunnell has not competed this year because of a strained Achilles tendon.

Gunnell, who is also the Olympic champion, said she still hoped to be a member of the 4x400 metres relay squad in Gothenburg.

I've decided I can't get into shape to retain the title.' she said.

"It's very disappointing. but I've missed about two months training and the tendon is still jarring when I'm hurdling.

"I just want to get out there running again and hope I can be part of the 400 relay in Gothenburg."

Ivanisevic. Wimbledon semifinals earlier this month. powered past the Chinese-American Chang 6-4, 6-4, in last year's final.




